19	6-21-804. Arkansas Public School Academic Facilities Program.
20	(a) The Division of Public School Academic Facilities and
21	Transportation shall develop a comprehensive Arkansas Public School Academic
22	Facilities Program that includes the following components:
23	(1) An Academic Facilities Master Plan Program that establishes
24	a process by which:
25	(A) Each school district develops and submits a facilities
26	master plan for review and approval by the division; and
27	(B) The division develops a comprehensive state master
28	plan for managing state financial participation in local academic facilities
29	projects across the state;
30	(2) An Academic Facilities Custodial, Maintenance, Repair, and
31	Renovation Manual that contains uniform standards to direct custodial,
32	maintenance, repair, and renovation activities in public school academic

18	new or continuing needs of the school district with regard to academic
19	facilities and equipment, and an accounting of any changes in the school
20	district's insurance coverage from the most recent submission.
21	(b) A facilities master plan shall include, at a minimum, the

1	(b)(1) The standards for technology systems, instructional materials,
2	and related academic equipment shall address the following areas:

10	(2) Any other condition of an academic facility or facilities in
11	a public school or school district that is determined by the division to have
12	a detrimental impact on educational services provided by that public school
13	or school district.
14	(b) The division shall provide written notice, via certified mail,
15	return receipt requested, to the president of the school board and the
16	superintendent of the public school or school district identified as being in
17	facilities distress.
18	(c)(l) A public school or school district identified as being in
19	facilities distress shall develop a facilities improvement plan within thirty
20	(30) days from the date of receipt of the notice and promptly submit the
21	facilities improvement plan to the division for review and approval.
22	(2) A public school or school district shall review and revise
23	its facilities improvement plan on a periodic basis as determined by the
24	division and submit the updated facilities improvement plan to the division
25	in order for the division to determine whether the public school or school
26	district is correcting its deficient areas of practice regarding academic

29	necessary to supplement and update its facilities master plan.
30	(d) In addressing school districts in facilities distress, the

36	distress status shall accept on-site technical evaluation and assistance from

2	(C) The recommendations of the division are binding on the
3	district, the superintendent, and the school board;
4	(2) Require the superintendent to relinquish all administrative
5	authority with respect to the school district;
6	(3) Appoint an individual in place of the superintendent to
7	administratively operate the school district under the supervision and
8	approval of the Director of the Division of Public School Academic Facilities
9	and Transportation and to compensate nondivision agents operating the school
10	district from school district funding;
11	(4) Suspend or remove all of the current board of directors and
12	call for the election of a new school board for the school district, in which
13	case the school district shall reimburse the county board of election
14	commissioners for election costs as otherwise required by law;
15	(5) Require the school district to operate without a local
16	school board under the supervision of the local superintendent or an
17	individual or panel appointed by the director of the division;
18	(6) Return the administration of the school district to the
19	former board or place the administration of the school district in a newly
20	elected school board;
21	(7) Require school district staff and employees to attend
22	training in areas of concern for the public school or school district;
23	(8)(A) Require a school district to cease immediately all
24	expenditures related to activities not defined as part of an adequate
25	education in § 6-20-2302 and place money that would have been spent on the
26	activities into an academic facilities escrow account to be released only
27	upon approval by the division for use in conjunction with a local academic
28	facilities project.
29	(B) School districts shall include a clause addressing
30	this contingency in all contracts with personnel who are involved with
31	activities not defined as part of an adequate education;
32	(9) Notify the public school or school district in writing that
33	the deficiencies regarding academic facilities shall be corrected within a

35	(10)(A) Petition the state board at any time for the
36	consolidation, annexation, or reconstitution of a school district in

1	facilities distress or take other appropriate action as allowed by this
2	subchapter in order to secure and protect the best interest of the
3	educational resources of the state or to provide for the best interests of
4	students in the school district.
5	(B) The state board may approve the petition or take other
6	appropriate action as allowed by this subchapter.
7	(C) The state board shall consolidate, annex, or
8	reconstitute any school district that fails to remove itself from the
9	classification of a school district in facilities distress within two (2)
10	consecutive school years of receipt of notice of identification of facilities
11	distress status by the division. A school district may appeal the action of
12	state board to the Commission for Public School Academic Facilities and
13	Transportation in accordance with procedures developed by the state board.
14	The commission may reverse the action of the state board if the commission
15	finds that the school district could not remove itself from facilities
16	distress due to impossibility caused by external forces beyond the school

21	(e) No school district identified by the division as being in
22	facilities distress may incur any debt without the prior written approval of

24	(f) A public school or school district in facilities distress may
25	petition the commission for removal from facilities distress status only
26	after the division has certified in writing that the public school or school
27	district has corrected all criteria for being classified as in facilities
28	distress and has complied with all division recommendations and requirements
29	for removal from facilities distress.
30	(g) The division shall submit a written evaluation on the status of
31	each school district in facilities distress to the commission and the state
32	board at least once every six (6) months.

34	<u>6-21-812.</u> Facilities distress — Student transfers.
35	(a) Any student attending a public school district classified as being
36	in facilities distress shall automatically be eligible and entitled under the

1	Arkansas Public School Choice Act of 1989, § 6-18-206, to transfer to another
2	geographically contiguous school district not in facilities distress during
3	the time period that a district is classified as being in facilities
4	distress. The student is not required to file a petition by July 1 but shall

1	SECTION 6. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the
2	General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that the Arkansas Supreme Court has
3	determined that current public school academic facilities in Arkansas are
4	inadequate and inequitable; that the General Assembly established the Joint
5	Committee on Educational Facilities to inventory the current condition of
6	public school academic facilities and recommend methods for bringing those
7	facilities into conformity with the court's constitutional expectations; that
8	the programs established in this act are derived from recommendations of the
9	joint committee and are part of a comprehensive state program for overseeing
10	the provision of constitutionally appropriate public school academic
11	facilities across the state; and that this program must be implemented
12	immediately for the good of public school students in the State of Arkansas.
13	Therefore, an emergency is declared to exist and this act being immediately
14	necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety shall
15	become effective on:
16	(1) The date of its approval by the Governor;
17	(2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor,
18	the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the
19	<u>bill; or</u>
20	(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is
21	overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto.
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
