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3	SECTION 3. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the
4	General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that the current funding provided
5	for public schools is for the 2004-2005 school year; that it is necessary to
6	fund school districts for the remainder of the biennium; and that this act is
7	immediately necessary because changes in funding for school districts must be
8	available for the 2005-2006 school year. Therefore, an emergency is declared
9	to exist and this act being necessary for the preservation of the public
10	peace, health, and safety shall become effective on July 1, 2005.
