6	Facilities and Transportation shall determine the extent to which a building,
7	space, or related area is used for extracurricular activities or organized
8	physical activities courses based on information supplied by the school
9	district and, if necessary, on-site inspection.
10	(C) Buildings or spaces, including related areas such as
11	the physical plant and grounds, used for prekindergarten education shall not
12	be considered academic facilities for purposes of this subchapter.
13	(D) District administration buildings and spaces,
14	including related areas such as the physical plant and grounds, shall not be
15	considered academic facilities for the purpose of this subchapter;
16	(2) "Academic facilities wealth index" means the total assessed
17	valuation of taxable real, personal, and utility property in a school
18	district as shown by the county assessment for the most recent year
19	multiplied by one (1) mill with the result divided by the average daily
20	membership of the district as computed on an annual basis;
21	(3)(A) "Average daily membership" means the total number of days
22	of school attended plus the total number of days absent by students in grades
23	kindergarten through twelve (K-12) during the first three (3) quarters of
24	each school year divided by the number of school days actually taught in the
25	school district during that period of time rounded up to the nearest
26	hundredth.
27	(B) As applied to this subchapter, students who may be
28	counted for average daily membership are:
29	(i) Students who reside within the boundaries of the
30	school district and who are enrolled in a public school operated by the
31	<pre>school district;</pre>
32	(ii) Legally transferred students living outside the
33	school district but attending a public school in the school district; and
34	(iii) Students who are eligible to attend and reside
35	within the boundaries of a school district and who are enrolled in the
36	Arkansas National Guard Youth Challenge Program, so long as the students are

1	participants in the program;
2	(4) "Facility condition index" means a methodology established
3	by the Division of Public School Academic Facilities and Transportation for
4	comparing the cost of repairing the condition of a public school academic
5	facility to the cost of replacing the public school academic facility with a
6	public school academic facility containing the same amount of square footage;
7	(5) "Immediate repair project" means a project involving a
8	public school academic facility necessary to resolve a deficiency that
9	presents an immediate hazard to:
10	(A) The health or safety of students, teachers,
11	administrators, or staff;
12	(B) The integrity of the public school academic facility
13	with regard to meeting minimum health and safety standards; or
14	(C) The extraordinary deterioration of the public school
15	academic facility;
16	(6) "Local enhancements" means the portion of any maintenance,
17	repair, or renovation project or new construction project that is designed to
18	bring an academic facility or related areas, such as the physical plant or
19	grounds, to a state of condition or efficiency that exceeds state academic
20	facilities standards;
21	(7) "Local resources" means any moneys lawfully generated by a
22	school district for the purpose of funding the school district's share of
23	$\underline{\text{financial participation in any academic facilities project for which a school}}$
24	district is eligible to receive state financial participation under
25	priorities established by the division;
26	(8) "Maintenance, repair, and renovation" means any activity or
27	improvement to an academic facility and, if necessary, related areas such as
28	the physical plant and grounds, that:
29	(A) Maintains, conserves, or protects the state of
30	condition or efficiency of the academic facility; or
31	(B) Brings the state of condition or efficiency of the
32	academic facility up to the facility's original condition of completeness or
33	<pre>efficiency;</pre>
34	(9) "Millage rate" means the millage rate listed in the most
35	recent tax ordinance approved by the county quorum court under the authority
36	of § 14-14-904;

1	(10)(A) "New construction" means any improvement to an academic
2	facility and, if necessary, related areas such as the physical plant and
3	grounds, that brings the state of condition or efficiency of the academic
4	facility to a state of condition or efficiency better than the academic
5	facility's original condition of completeness or efficiency.
6	(B) "New construction" includes additions to existing
7	academic facilities and new academic facilities;
8	(11) "Project" means an undertaking in which a school district
9	engages in:
10	(A) Maintenance, repair, and renovation activities with
11	regard to an academic facility;
12	(B) New construction of an academic facility; or
13	(C) Any combination of maintenance, repair, and renovation
L4	and new construction activities with regard to an academic facility; and
15	(12) "Space utilization" means the number of gross square feet
16	per student in a public school academic facility adjusted for academic
17	program, school enrollment, grade configuration, and type of public school in
18	accordance with rules promulgated by the Commission on Public School Academic
19	Facilities and Transportation.
20	
21	6-20-2503. State financial participation.
22	(a) The Division of Public School Academic Facilities and
23	Transportation shall compute the academic facilities wealth index for each
24	school district. The division shall use the academic facilities wealth index
25	to determine the amount of the state's share of financial participation in an
26	eligible local academic facilities project approved under priorities
27	established by the division.
28	(b)(1) The division shall rank all school districts according to their
29	academic facilities wealth index in order of the lowest wealth index per
30	student to the highest wealth index per student.
31	(2) The division shall divide the academic facilities wealth
32	index rankings into percentiles with the first percentile containing the one
33	percent (1%) of students with the lowest school district academic facilities
34	wealth index and the one-hundredth percentile containing the one percent (1%)
35	of students having the highest school district academic facilities wealth
36	index.

1	(c)(l) If a school district is eligible for state financial
2	participation in a local academic facilities project under priorities
3	established by the division, the school district's share of financial
4	participation is the percentage derived from dividing the school district's
5	academic facilities wealth index by the amount corresponding to the ninety-
6	fifth percentile of the academic facilities wealth index.
7	(2) If a school district is eligible for state financial
8	participation in a local academic facilities project under priorities
9	established by the division, the state's share of financial participation is
10	the percentage derived from subtracting the school district's percentage
11	share of financial participation from one hundred percent (100%).
12	
13	6-20-2504. Bonded debt assistance.
14	(a) The state will assist with retiring the outstanding bonded
15	indebtedness issued as of January 1, 2005 of all school districts eligible
16	for state financial participation under this section by providing an annual
17	cash payment to each eligible school district in an amount determined by the
18	Commission on Public School Academic Facilities and Transportation under
19	subsection (b) of this section. The amount of the state's annual cash
20	payment is based on the school district's bonded debt schedule as of January
21	$\underline{1}$, 2005 and the academic facilities wealth index for the district as computed
22	on an annual basis.
23	(b)(1) By June 1, 2005, the commission shall determine:
24	(A) The total amount required to satisfy the outstanding
25	bonded indebtedness sold as of January 1, 2005 for each school district;
26	(B) The annual amount due on a fiscal year basis from each
27	school district in accordance with the principal and interest payment
28	schedule in effect on January 1, 2005 for the outstanding bonded
29	indebtedness; and
30	(C) The date each school district is expected to satisfy
31	the outstanding bonded indebtedness.
32	(2) The commission shall determine the amount of the state's
33	annual cash payment by multiplying the annual principal and interest payment
34	for the school district as established under subdivision (b)(1)(B) of this
35	subsection by the district's academic facilities wealth index. The
36	commission shall determine the amount of the state's annual cash navment for

- 1 each eligible school district no later than July 15 of each year. The 2 commission shall certify the amount to the Department of Education for payment. 3 4 (c)(1) The state's annual cash payment is payable to each eligible school district in two equal installments. The department shall pay the 5 6 first installment by August 1 of each year and the second installment by 7 February 1 of each year. 8 (2) For tracking purposes, the school district shall account for 9 the funds received as state financial participation in debt assistance under 10 this section as restricted funds and shall account for the funds in 11 accordance with provisions of law, including without limitation, the Arkansas 12 Educational Financial Accounting and Reporting Act of 2005, § 6-20-2201 et seq. and rules established by the commission. 13 (d)(l) If a school district qualifies for state financial 14 15 participation under this section, the amount of state financial participation 16 shall not be reduced as a result of debt service savings produced by 17 refunding outstanding bonds if: 18 (A) The annual savings produced by the refunding is 19 deposited into a bond refunding savings fund to be used by the district 20 solely for the new construction of academic facilities or the purchase of 21 academic equipment; and 22 (B) Before the date that the refunding bonds are sold at 23 public sale, the school district certifies to the commission that the yearly 24 debt services saving will be used solely for the purposes described in 25 subdivision (d)(1) of this section. 26 (2) Nothing in this section shall prohibit a school district 27 from issuing second lien bonds. However, the amount of state financial 28
 - participation under this section shall not be altered or reduced as a result of the issuance of second lien bonds.
- 30 (3) Nothing in subsection (d) of this section shall prevent the annual adjustment of state financial participation under this section in 31 32 accordance with annual variations in a school district's academic facilities 33 wealth index and the school district's principal and interest payment 34 schedule in effect on January 1, 2005.

(e) The state shall not assume any debt of a school district or incur 35 36 any obligation with regard to a school district's bonded indebtedness by

1	providing the financial assistance described in this section. The school
2	district receiving cash assistance is and will remain independently liable
3	for all outstanding indebtedness.
4	
5	6-20-2505. Academic Facilities Immediate Repair Program.
6	(a) There is established the Academic Facilities Immediate Repair
7	Program under which the Division of Public School Academic Facilities and
8	Transportation shall provide school districts with state financial
9	participation for eligible repair projects based on the school district's
10	academic facilities wealth index.
11	(b) A school district may apply for state financial participation in
12	an immediate repair project if:
13	(1) The school district's application is received by the
14	division no later than July 1, 2005;
15	(2) The condition for which the repair is needed was in
16	existence on January 1, 2005;
17	(3) The facility condition index of the academic facility
18	involved in the proposed repair project is less than a threshold amount
19	determined by the division; and
20	(4) The repair project involves one (1) of more of the
21	<pre>following:</pre>
22	(A) Heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems;
23	(B) Floors;
24	(C) Roofs;
25	(D) Sewage systems;
26	(E) Water supplies;
27	(F) Asbestos abatement;
28	(G) Fire alarm systems;
29	<pre>(H) Exterior doors;</pre>
30	(I) Emergency exit or egress passageway lighting;
31	(J) Academic program or facility accessibility for
32	individuals with disabilities; and
33	(K) Any other repair to a building system necessary to
34	satisfy life-safety code requirements as determined by the division.
35	(c) As part of its application for state financial participation in an
36	immediate repair project, a school district shall provide the division with

1	<pre>evidence of:</pre>
2	(1) The deficiency in need of correction and how it presents an
3	<pre>immediate hazard to:</pre>
4	(A) The health or safety of students, teachers,
5	administrators, or staff of a school district;
6	(B) The integrity of the public school academic facility
7	with regard to meeting minimum health and safety standards; or
8	(C) The extraordinary deterioration of the public school
9	academic facility;
10	(2) The estimated cost of the immediate repair project, which
11	shall be a minimum of one hundred dollars (\$100) per student or fifty
12	thousand dollars (\$50,000), whichever is less;
13	(3) The availability of insurance and any other public or
14	private emergency assistance to pay for the immediate repair project; and
15	(4) Whether or not the academic facility is reasonably expected
16	to close or be substantially replaced within three (3) years.
17	(d)(1) The division shall evaluate a school district's immediate
18	repair application and may conduct an on-site inspection prior to making a
19	decision on the application as it deems necessary.
20	(2) The division shall notify the school district of the
21	division's decision on the application and, if applicable, the amount of
22	state financial participation. The division shall base its decision on
23	several factors, including, without limitation:
24	(A) The seriousness of the deficiency that the immediate
25	repair project is intended to correct;
26	(B) Compliance with current academic facility standards,
27	including, without limitation, appropriate space utilization;
28	(C) The amount and availability of insurance and any other
29	public or private emergency assistance;
30	(D) Whether the academic facility is reasonably expected
31	to close or be substantially replaced within three (3) years;
32	(E) The academic facilities wealth index of the school
33	district; and
34	(F) The prudent and resourceful expenditure of state funds
35	with regard to public school academic facilities.
36	(e)(l) If a school district qualifies for state financial

- 1 participation under this section, the division shall certify the amount of
- 2 <u>state financial participation to the Commission on Public School Academic</u>
- 3 <u>Facilities and Transportation for oversight purposes. The commission shall</u>
- 4 certify the amount to the Department of Education for payment.
- 5 (2) For tracking purposes, the school district shall account for
- 6 the funds received as state financial participation under this section as
- 7 restricted funds and shall account for the funds in accordance with
- 8 provisions of law, including, without limitation, the Arkansas Educational
- 9 Financial Accounting and Reporting Act of 2005, § 6-20-2201 et seq. and rules
- 10 established by the State Board of Education and the commission.
- 11 (f) Every effort shall be made to conform an immediate repair project
- 12 to current academic facilities standards, including, without limitation,
- 13 appropriate space utilization requirements, unless in the judgment of the
- 14 division it is impractical to conform the immediate repair project to current
- 15 standards.
- 16 (g) A school district shall use state financial participation in an
- 17 immediate repair project to pay the cost of only the portion of an immediate
- 18 repair project that is not covered by insurance or other public or private
- 19 emergency assistance received by or payable to the school district.

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- 21 6-20-2506. Transitional Academic Facilities Program.
- 22 (a) There is established the Transitional Academic Facilities Program
- 23 under which the Division of Public School Academic Facilities and
- 24 Transportation shall provide state financial participation based on a school
- 25 <u>district's academic facilities wealth index in the form of reimbursement to a</u>
- 26 school district for eligible new construction projects for which debt is
- 27 incurred or funds are spent after January 1, 2005, and on or before June 30,
- 28 2006.
- 29 (b) Under the transitional academic facilities program, a school
- 30 district may proceed with new construction of an academic facility through
- 31 the expenditure of local resources prior to the school district's eligibility
- 32 for state financial participation and may apply the expenditure of local
- 33 resources after January 1, 2005, and on or before June 30, 2006, toward
- 34 meeting the school district's share of financial participation in the cost of
- 35 the new construction project when, and if, the school district becomes
- 36 eligible for state financial participation.

I	(c) In order to apply for state financial participation under the
2	transitional academic facilities program, the school district shall provide
3	the division with evidence of:
4	(1) A new construction project for which debt was incurred or
5	funds were spent after January 1, 2005, and on or before June 30, 2006;
6	(2) The total cost of the new construction project;
7	(3) The new construction project's conformance with sound
8	educational practices;
9	(4)(A) The new construction project's compliance with current
10	academic facilities standards, including, without limitation, appropriate
11	space utilization of existing academic facilities in the district as
12	determined by the division.
13	(B) The academic facilities standards in effect on the
14	date the plans are submitted to the Division of Public Academic Facilities
15	and Transportation are the academic facilities standards that will apply to
16	the new construction project;
17	(5) The allocation of project costs between new construction
18	activities and maintenance, repair, and renovation activities if the new
19	construction project includes improvements that could be classified as
20	maintenance, repair, and renovation; and
21	(6) How the new construction project supports the prudent and
22	resourceful expenditure of state funds and improves the school district's
23	ability to deliver an adequate and equitable education to public school
24	students in the district.
25	(d)(1) The division shall evaluate a school district's application for
26	state financial participation under the transitional academic facilities
27	program and shall conduct an on-site inspection prior to making a
28	determination of the new construction project's eligibility for reimbursement
29	from the state.
30	(2) During the on-site inspection, the division shall evaluate
31	all of the following:
32	(A) Student health and safety, including, without
33	limitation, critical health and safety needs;
34	(B) The new construction project's compliance with current
35	academic facilities standards, including, without limitation, appropriate
36	space utilization of existing academic facilities in the district;

1	(c) The new construction project's conformance with sound
2	educational practices;
3	(D) Curriculum improvement and diversification, including,
4	without limitation, the use of instructional technology, distance learning,
5	and access to advanced courses in science, mathematics, language arts, and
6	social studies;
7	(E) Multischool, multidistrict, and regional planning to
8	achieve the most effective and efficient instructional delivery system;
9	(F) Reasonable travel time and practical means of
10	addressing other demographic considerations; and
11	(G) Regularly scheduled maintenance, repair, and
12	renovation.
13	(3) The division shall notify the school district of the
14	division's decision on the application and, if applicable, the amount of
15	reimbursement from the state. The division shall base its decision, on
16	several factors, including, without limitation:
17	(A) The reasonableness and necessity of the features of
18	the academic facility according to criteria developed by the division;
19	(B) Compliance with current academic facility standards,
20	including, without limitation, appropriate space utilization;
21	(C) The academic facilities wealth index of the school
22	district; and
23	(D) The prudent and resourceful expenditure of state funds
24	with regard to public school academic facilities.
25	(e)(l) If a school district qualifies for state financial
26	participation under this section, the division shall certify the amount of
27	state financial participation to the Commission on Public School Academic
28	Facilities and Transportation for oversight purposes. The commission shall
29	certify the amount to the Department of Education for payment.
30	(2) For tracking purposes, the school district shall account for
31	the funds received as state financial participation under this section as
32	restricted funds and shall account for the funds in accordance with
33	provisions of law, including, without limitation, the Arkansas Educational
34	Financial Accounting and Reporting Act of 2005, § 6-20-2201 et seq. and rules
35	established by the State Board of Education and the commission.
36	(f) Every effort shall be made to conform a new construction project

1	to current academic facilities standards, including, without limitation,
2	appropriate space utilization requirements, unless in the judgment of the
3	division it is impractical to conform the new construction project to current
4	standards.
5	
6	6-20-2507. Academic Facilities Partnership Program.
7	(a) There is established the Academic Facilities Partnership Program
8	under which the Division of Public School Academic Facilities and
9	Transportation shall provide state financial participation based on a school
10	district's academic facilities wealth index in the form of cash payments to \underline{a}
11	school district for eligible new construction projects.
12	(b) In order to apply for state financial participation in a new
13	construction project, a school district shall provide the division with \underline{a}
14	copy of the design plans for the project and evidence of:
15	(1) Preparation for the new construction project as demonstrated
16	by inclusion of the new construction project in the school district's
17	facilities master plan;
18	(2)(A) The adoption of a resolution certifying to the division
19	the school district's dedication of local resources to meet the school
20	district's share of financial participation in the new construction project.
21	(B) The resolution shall specify the approximate date that
22	the board of directors of the school district intends to seek elector
23	approval of any bond or tax measures or to apply other local resources to pay
24	the school district's share of financial participation in the new
25	<pre>construction project;</pre>
26	(3) The total estimated cost of the new construction project;
27	(4) The new construction project's conformance with sound
28	educational practices;
29	(5) The new construction project's compliance with current
30	academic facilities standards, including, without limitation, appropriate
31	space utilization of existing academic facilities in the district as
32	determined by the division;
33	(6) The allocation of project costs between new construction
34	activities and maintenance, repair, and renovation activities if the new
35	construction project includes improvements that could be classified as
36	maintenance, repair, and renovation; and

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1	(7) How the new construction project supports the prudent and
2	resourceful expenditure of state funds and improves the school district's
3	ability to deliver an adequate and equitable education to public school
4	students in the district.
5	(c) The division shall use criteria to evaluate a school district's
6	application for state financial participation in a new construction project,
7	which shall include, without limitation, the following:
8	(1) How the school district's facilities master plan and current
9	academic facilities do not address the following:
10	(A) Student health and safety, including, without
11	limitation, but not limited to, critical health and safety needs;
12	(B) Compliance with current academic facilities standards,
13	including, without limitation, appropriate space utilization of existing
14	academic facilities in the district;
15	(C) Conformance with sound educational practices;
16	(D) Curriculum improvement and diversification, including,
17	without limitation, the use of instructional technology, distance learning,
18	and access to advanced courses in science, mathematics, language arts, and
19	social studies;
20	(E) Multischool, multidistrict, and regional planning to
21	achieve the most effective and efficient instructional delivery system;
22	(F) Reasonable travel time and practical means of
23	addressing other demographic considerations; and
24	(G) Regularly scheduled maintenance, repair, and
25	renovation;
26	(2) How the school district's facilities master plan and any new
27	construction project under the facilities master plan address the following:
28	(A) Student health and safety, including, without
29	limitation, critical health and safety needs;
30	(B) Compliance with current academic facilities standards,
31	including, without limitation, appropriate space utilization of existing
32	academic facilities in the district;
33	(C) Conformance with sound educational practices;
34	(D) Curriculum improvement and diversification, including,
35	without limitation, the use of instructional technology, distance learning,
36	and access to advanced courses in science mathematics language arts and

1	social studies;
2	(E) Multischool, multidistrict, and regional planning to
3	achieve the most effective and efficient instructional delivery system;
4	(F) Reasonable travel time and practical means of
5	addressing other demographic considerations; and
6	(G) Regularly scheduled maintenance, repair, and
7	renovation;
8	(3) How the new construction project supports the prudent and
9	resourceful expenditure of state funds and improves the school district's
10	ability to deliver an adequate and equitable education to public school
11	students in the district;
12	(4) How the new construction project has been prioritized by the
13	school district; and
14	(5) The allocation and expenditure of funds in accordance with
15	this subchapter and the Arkansas Public School Academic Facility Program Act,
16	§ 6-21-801 et seq.
17	(d)(1) State financial participation under the academic facilities
18	partnership program is not available until July 1, 2006. The division shall
19	give priority in state financial participation to school district proposals
20	relating to academic facilities with the highest facilities condition index.
21	(2)(A) With regard to an academic facilities project for which a
22	school district intends to apply for state financial participation during
23	fiscal year 2006-2007, the division shall notify the school district of the
24	division's decision on the application and, if applicable, the estimated
25	amount of state financial participation in the new construction project no
26	later than May 1, 2006.
27	(B) Beginning in 2007, the division shall notify the
28	school district of the division's decision on the application and, if
29	applicable, the estimated amount of state financial participation in the new
30	construction project no later than May 1 of each odd-numbered year.
31	(3) The division's notice of its decision on a school district's
32	application for state financial participation in a new construction shall
33	include an explanation of the evaluative factors underlying the decision of
34	the division to provide or not provide state financial participation in
35	support of the new construction project.
36	(e)(1) If the division determines that the new construction project is

1	eligible for state financial participation, the division and the school
2	district shall enter into an agreement specifying the terms of the state's
3	financial participation and the conditions that must be satisfied by the
4	school district.
5	(2) At a minimum, the agreement shall:
6	(A) Identify the estimated amount of local financial
7	participation and state financial participation in the new construction
8	<pre>project;</pre>
9	(B) Define the method of and schedule for transferring
10	state financial participation funds to the school district;
11	(C) Identify whether the new construction project includes
12	any improvements that are classified as maintenance, repair, and renovation,
13	and how the project costs will be allocated between new construction
14	activities and maintenance, repair, and renovation activities;
15	(D) Provide that changes to the plans for the new
16	construction project shall be made in consultation with the division;
17	(E) Provide that the division or any person acting on
18	behalf of the division may conduct on-site inspections of the new
19	construction project as frequently as the division deems necessary to assure
20	the prudent and resourceful expenditure of state funds with regard to public
21	school academic facilities;
22	(F) Determine how risk will be allocated between the
23	school district and the state if the new construction project is not
24	<pre>completed;</pre>
25	(G) Describe how changes in the school district's wealth
26	index over the course of the new construction project will be treated; and
27	(H) Specify that the agreement is void and the state will
28	have no further obligation to provide state funds to the school district for
29	the new construction project that is the subject of the agreement if the
30	school district does not raise local resources and apply local resources
31	toward the new construction project as provided under the agreement.
32	(f)(l) If a school district qualifies for state financial

14	(2) For tracking purposes, the school district shall account for
15	the funds received as state financial participation under this section as
16	restricted funds and shall account for the funds in accordance with

20	(f) Every effort shall be made to conform a catastrophic project to

25	catastrophic program to pay the cost of only the portion of a catastrophic
26	project that is not covered by insurance or other public or private emergency

29	6-20-2509. Project cost guidelines.
30	(a)(l) The Division of Public School Academic Facilities and
31	Transportation shall establish formulas that shall be updated annually for
32	determining the basic project cost per student for various types of new
33	construction projects, including, without limitation:
34	(A) New academic facilities;
35	(B) Additions to existing academic facilities; and
36	(C) Major improvements to academic facilities that bring

1	the state of condition or efficiency of the academic facility to a state of

19	Committee on Educational Facilities to inventory the current condition of

28	necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety,
29	Section 2 of this act shall be effective on July 1, 2005, and Section 1 of
30	this act shall become effective on:
31	(1) The date of its approval by the Governor;
32	(2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor,
33	the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the
34	bill; or
35	(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is
36	overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto.
