12	FIGHT TO PROTECT SOCIAL SECURITY AND REQUESTING							
13	THAT THE ARKANSAS CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION WORK							
14	TO STRENGTHEN SOCIAL SECURITY AND TO OPPOSE							
15	EFFORTS TO DIVERT SOCIAL SECURITY CONTRIBUTIONS							
16	TO INVESTMENT ACCOUNTS.

19	TO COMMEND MEMBERS OF THE ARKANSAS							
20	CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION FOR EFFORTS TO							
21	PROTECT SOCIAL SECURITY AND TO REQUEST							
22	THAT THE DELEGATION WORK TO OPPOSE							
23	EFFORTS TO DIVERT SOCIAL SECURITY TO							
24	INVESTMENT ACCOUNTS.

27	WHEREAS, Senator Blanche Lincoln, Senator Mark Pryor, Congressman							
28	Marion Berry, Congressman Vic Snyder, and Congressman Mike Ross are leading							
29	the fight to protect Social Security; and							
30								
31	WHEREAS, ensuring that our senior citizens can live their retirement							
32	years in dignity is a promise that each new generation of Americans must make							
33	to the generation before, and we must honor our obligations; we must							
34	preserve, strengthen, and protect Social Security without putting it at risk;							
35	in Arkansas alone, more than five hundred thousand (500,000) of our citizens							
36	receive Social Security benefits; for many Arkansas seniors, Social Security							

1 is the only means they have to put a roof over their heads or food in their 2 mouths; this safety net must be maintained if we are to ensure that our 3 seniors will have a sound income in their golden years; and for many, it is 4 all that stands between years of dignity and years of poverty; and 5 6 WHEREAS, Social Security is the most popular and successful government 7 program in the nation's history, and the benefits that are paid from Social 8 Security are protected against inflation and the risk of stock market 9 collapses; privatizing Social Security would be devastating to Arkansas; and 10 it would weaken the program and jeopardize the retirement benefits that our 11 state's workers rely on; and 12 13 WHEREAS, Social Security works for working families and is essential to 14 workers who become disabled and to their families; nearly forty percent (40%) 15 of Arkansans who draw Social Security receive disability and survivor 16 benefits; a Government Accounting Office report shows most privatization 17 plans would mean a benefit cut for workers with disabilities; and without Social Security's disability insurance, fifty-five percent (55%) of families 18 19 with a worker with a disability would have incomes below the poverty line; 20 and 21 22 WHEREAS, women comprise the majority of Social Security beneficiaries, 23 representing almost sixty percent (60%) of all Social Security recipients age 24 65 and over; women are also less likely than men to have pensions or 25 retirement savings to supplement their Social Security checks; and without 26 Social Security, fifty-two percent (52%) of white women, sixty-five percent 27 (65%) of African-American women, and sixty-one percent (61%) of Hispanic 28 women over the age of 65 would live in poverty; and 29 30 WHEREAS, it is important that the impact of any changes in the Social 31 Security system does not fall disproportionately on lower income groups or on 32 those Americans whose work life has been physically demanding; Social 33 Security remains especially important to African-Americans and other racial 34 and ethnic groups as they have traditionally been at the low end of the 35 earning scale over their lifetimes; and as a result, Americans of color are 36 less likely to have substantial individual savings and are generally more

1	dependent on Social Security in their retirement years; and

3	WHEREAS, we should encourage working families to build private pensions						
4	and savings on top of Social Security as the carving out of payroll taxes to						
5	finance risky speculation in the stock market would undermine the assured						
6	income that Social Security provides to the elderly and the disabled; and						
7							
8	WHEREAS, today's younger workers would bear the brunt of the so-called						
9	transition costs in moving to an individual account system; private accounts						
10	that drain money out of Social Security would cut its guaranteed benefits,						
11	increase the national debt by \$2 trillion, and pass the bill on to future						
12	generations; and in addition to bearing the transition costs, workers						
13	becoming disabled or dying young would not have had time to build up their						
14	accounts; and						
15							
16	WHEREAS, privatizing Social Security would dismantle the program by						
17	permitting some to use their Social Security contributions to play the stock						
18	market and would cut guaranteed benefits by thirty percent (30%) even for						
19	workers who do not choose private accounts,						
20							
21	NOW THEREFORE,						
22	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE EIGHTY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE						
23	STATE OF ARKANSAS:						
24							
25	THAT the Senate of the State of Arkansas commends Senator Blanche						
26	Lincoln, Senator Mark Pryor, Congressman Marion Berry, Congressman Vic						
27	Snyder, and Congressman Mike Ross on their leadership in the fight to protect						
28	Social Security.						
29							
30	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Senate of the State of Arkansas						
31	requests that the Arkansas Congressional Delegation work to strengthen and						
32	protect Social Security and to oppose efforts to divert Social Security						
33	contributions to investment accounts.

35	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that upon adoption of this resolution, the						
36	Secretary of the Senate of the State of Arkansas shall transmit a copy to						

1	each	${\tt member}$	of	the	Arkansas	Congressional	Delegation.
