EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the 27 28 General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that the Arkansas Supreme Court declared the public school funding system to be inadequate and that public 29 30 schools are operating under a constitutional infirmity which must be corrected immediately; that to correct the constitutional infirmity and to 31 32 ensure adequate funding for public education, the General Assembly must 33 revise the public school funding formula, revise laws regarding public school 34 facilities, provide funding for retirement increases and limit additional 35 increases; and enact other necessary reform measures; and that this act is necessary to ensure that reform measures are available to public schools for 36
