33	WHEREAS, the Eighty-Fifth General Assembly finds that	when military	
34	service personnel have been killed in action or have died as a result of		
35	their service to our country, their families should be afforded some		
36	protections to ensure that they are able to grieve their lo	ss in privacy and	

1	peace; and

3	WHEREAS, the Eighty-Fifth General Assembly finds that families of
4	military service personnel and other families who have lost a loved one have
5	a substantial interest in organizing and attending funerals, memorial
6	services, wakes, visitations, and burials for deceased relatives with a
7	deference to their privacy and peace; and
8	
9	WHEREAS, funerals, memorial services, wakes, visitations, and burials
10 11	are intensely emotional times for the families of those who have died; and
12	WHEREAS, the interests of families who are mourning the loss of
13	deceased relatives are violated when military and other funerals, memorial
14	services, wakes, visitations, or burials are targeted for picketing and other
15	public demonstrations; and
16	
17	WHEREAS, the State of Arkansas has historically given deference to
18	honoring those who have died and their grieving families and loved ones; and
19	
20	WHEREAS, the Eighty-Fifth General Assembly finds that it is imperative
21	that grieving families, friends, and loved ones are given an adequate
22	opportunity to mourn immediately before, during, and immediately after
23	funerals, memorial services, wakes, visitations, and burials free from
24	protesting and picketing; and
25	
26	WHEREAS, such a limited restriction strikes a balance between the
27	exercise of freedom of speech and other constitutional rights while still
28	affording families the right to mourn in peace,
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31	NOW THEREFORE,
32	BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:
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34	SECTION 1. Arkansas Code Title 5, Chapter 71, Subchapter 2 is amended
35	to add an additional section to read as follows:
36	5-71-230. Violation of the protection of peace for mourning at a

1	<u>funeral</u> .
2	(a) As used in this section:
3	(1)(A) "Funeral" means a ceremony or memorial service held in
4	connection with the burial or cremation of a person who has died.
5	(B) "Funeral" does not include a procession related to the
6	funeral; and
7	(2) "Picket" means to engage in the activity of protesting or
8	demonstrating to target a funeral.
9	(b) A person commits the offense of violation of the protection of
10	peace for mourning at a funeral if the person:
11	(1) Knowingly pickets a funeral;
12	(2) Intends to interfere with the funeral; and
13	(3) Pickets:
14	(A) Within one hundred fifty feet (150') of the funeral;
15	<u>and</u>
16	(B)(i) During the funeral;
17	(ii) Within thirty (30) minutes immediately before
18	the scheduled commencement of the funeral; or
19	(iii) Within thirty (30) minutes immediately
20	following the completion of the funeral.
21	(c)(l) Violation of the protection of the peace for mourning at a
22	funeral is a Class C misdemeanor.
23	(2) A person commits a separate offense for each funeral that
24	the person pickets in violation of this section.
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26	SECTION 2. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the
27	General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that when military service
28	personnel have been killed in action or have died as a result to their
29	service to our country, their families should be afforded some protection to
30	ensure that they are able to grieve their loss in privacy and peace; that
31	families of military personnel and other families who have lost a loved one
32	have a substantial interest in organizing and attending funerals, memorial
33	services, wakes, visitations, and burials for deceased relatives with $\underline{a}$
34	deference to their privacy and peace; and that this act is immediately
35	necessary because it is imperative that grieving families of military
36	personnel and other families who have lost a loved one are given an adequate

1	opportunity to mourn immediately before, during, and immediately after
2	funerals, memorial services, wakes, visitations, and burials free from
3	protesting and picketing and that such a limited restriction strikes a
4	balance between the exercise of freedom of speech and other constitutional
5	rights while still affording families the right to mourn in peace.
6	Therefore, an emergency is declared to exist and this act being immediately
7	necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety shall
8	become effective on:
9	(1) The date of its approval by the Governor;
10	(2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor,
11	the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the
12	<pre>bill; or</pre>
13	(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is
14	overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto.
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
