21	BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:

23	SECTION 1. DO NOT CODIFY. ACT 57 COMPLIANCE.
24	The General Assembly declares this act to be in concordance with the
25	study of the state's system of public education conducted in 2006 by the
26	Adequacy Study Oversight Subcommittee, the Senate Interim Committee on
27	Education, and the House Interim Committee on Education in compliance with
28	Act 57 of the Second Extraordinary Session of 2003.
29	
30	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 6-15-426(e)-(f), concerning school
31	improvement, is amended to read as follows:
32	(e) Any Each public school or school district classified as in school
33	improvement shall develop and file with the department a revised
34	comprehensive school improvement plan which shall be reviewed by the
35	department and shall be designed to ensure that all students have an
36	opportunity to obtain an adequate education and demonstrate proficiency on



1	all portions of the state-mandated criterion-referenced tests <u>assessments</u> .
2	(f) The comprehensive school improvement plan shall strategies
3	to address the achievement gap existing for any identifiable group or
4	subgroup as identified in the program and the gap of that subgroup from the
5	academic standard.:
6	(1) Be based on an analysis of student performance data and
7	other relevant data that provides a plan of action to address deficiencies in
8	student performance and any academic achievement gap evidenced in the
9	Arkansas Comprehensive Testing, Assessment, and Accountability Program; and
10	(2) Include the public school or school district's use of
11	categorical funding for:
12	(A) Alternative learning environments;
13	(B) Professional development;
14	(C) English-language learners; and
15	(D) National school lunch students, as defined by § 6-20-
16	<u>2303(12)(A).</u>
17	(g) Any public school or school district classified as in school
18	improvement under § 6-15-425 shall develop and file with the department a
19	revised comprehensive school improvement plan meeting the requirements of
20	this section and containing any additional requirements determined necessary

22	district have an opportunity to demonstrate proficiency on all portions of

24	(h)(1) At the end of each school year, the school district shall

30	district's compliance regarding its comprehensive school improvement plan,

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32	SECTION 3. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the
33	General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that in order to ensure an adequate
34	education for all Arkansas public school students, public schools or school
35	districts should be required to file detailed school improvement plans with

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1	compliance with those plans; and that this act is immediately necessary
2	because the determination of educational strategies and the use of public
3	funds to develop and implement school improvement plans depends on early
4	planning by public school districts; that if these plans are not developed by
5	the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the
6	<u>bill; or</u>
7	(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is
8	overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto.
