1	(4) The only non-profit psychiatric hospital beds for adults
2	with mental illness are located in Pulaski County and Jefferson County;
3	(5) In 2005, there were sixty-eight (68) counties in Arkansas
4	that had no acute inpatient psychiatric beds;
5	(6) According to the United States Department of Justice, in
6	2000 only sixteen percent (16%) of jail inmates reported either a mental or
7	emotional condition or an overnight stay in a mental hospital or program;
8	(7) In 2006 more than fifty percent (50%) of all prison and
9	state inmates reported mental health problems, including symptoms of major
10	depression, mania, and psychotic disorder;.
11	(8) It is estimated that seventy percent (70%) of jail inmates
12	with mental illnesses are incarcerated for nonviolent offenses;
13	(9) Jail diversion programs, including mental health courts,
14	have demonstrated that when jail diversion programs are part of a system,

6	designated public mental health services in the respective catchment areas of
7	the state;
8	(2) "Crisis Intervention Team" means a community-based
9	collaborative effort between law enforcement officers and jail personnel and
10	mental health professionals to help law enforcement officers and jail
11	personnel handle incidents involving persons with mental illness;
12	(3) "Inmate with mental illness" means a jail inmate who, after
13	being assessed by a person qualified by licensure to conduct an assessment,

16	(4) "Jail inmate" means a natural person who is in the custody
17	of law enforcement authorities within the confines of a county jail; and
18	(5) "Person with mental illness arrested by a law enforcement

20	to others or to need mental health evaluation for treatment.

22	<u>6-64-1203. Law Enforcement Training Committee Creation Duties.</u>
23	(a) The Law Enforcement Training Committee is created to:
24	(1) Identify mental health training needs for law enforcement
25	officers; and
26	(2) Develop a mental health training curriculum for law
27	enforcement officers and jail personnel to be delivered statewide.
28	(b)(1) The committee shall be led by the Criminal Justice Institute of
29	<u>the University of Arkansas System.</u>
30	(2) The committee shall include representatives of:

27	(2) The Crisis Intervention Team Training curriculum development
28	and delivery under subdivision (b)(3) of this section shall be supported by

30	(f)(l) A graduate of the Crisis Intervention Team Training shall
31	provide the local department in which he or she serves with information and
32	materials obtained at the crisis intervention training.
33	(2)(A) Each department that sends law enforcement officers to
34	receive Crisis Intervention Team training shall convene a meeting at least
35	annually to review and improve the program in the department.

12	(f) The goal of the Crisis Intervention Team Training program is to
13	establish a collaborative effort between law enforcement officers and jail
14	personnel and the community to provide appropriate services to persons with
15	mental illness who come into contact with the law enforcement system.
