## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THAT IN CONCORDANCE WITH THE 2006 ACT
57 ADEQUACY STUDY, THE HOUSE AND SENATE INTERIM COMMITTEES ON EDUCATION CONDUCT A STUDY TO DETERMINE WHETHER THERE ARE SUFFICIENT NUMBERS OF CERTIFIED TEACHERS AVAILABLE IN THE JOB MARKET TO MEET SCHOOL DISTRICT NEEDS FOR SUBSTITUTE TEACHERS.

## Subtitle

> REQUESTING A STUDY TO DETERMINE WHETHER THERE ARE SUFFICIENT NUMBER OF CERTIFIED TEACHERS AVAILABLE IN THE JOB MARKET TO MEET SCHOOL DISTRICT NEEDS FOR SUBSTITUTE TEACHERS.

WHEREAS, the educational adequacy funding matrix allocates fifty-nine dollars ( $\$ 59.00$ ) per pupil for substitute teachers in the foundation funding amount provided under Arkansas Code § 6-20-2305; and

WHEREAS, the results of site visits in 2006 by Lawrence O. Picus and Associates and the Bureau of Legislative Research, as well as a report by the Department of Education indicate that the public school district expenditures on salaries for substitute teachers may be too low to attract certified teachers; and

WHEREAS, the No Child Left Behind Act requires that long-term substitute teachers meet the definition of "highly qualified"; and

WHEREAS, research to date has raised the question as to whether there are a sufficient number of certified teachers available for employment as substitutes; and

WHEREAS, additional information is needed regarding all of these factors to determine whether the amount of funding provided in the foundation funding formula is sufficient for educational adequacy,

NOW THEREFORE,
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS, THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN:

THAT the House and Senate Interim Committees on Education conduct a study to determine whether there are sufficient numbers of certified teachers in the job market to meet school district needs for substitute teachers. The study should include:
(a) How many substitute teachers are needed, including state and federal requirements;
(b) What the qualifications of those substitute teachers should be;
(c) How many certified teachers are available for employment as substitutes;
(d) What factors lead a certified teacher to seek employment (or decide not to seek employment) as a substitute, including without limitation salary, certification, retirement implications, location, years of experience, and subject matter expertise; and
(e) Any other factors that the House and Senate Interim Committees on Education should consider for purposes of educational adequacy.

BE IT FURTHER PROPOSED that the House and Senate Interim Committees on Education prepare a report detailing the results of the study on or before May 1, 2008.
