1	(5) Each year, between twenty-live thousand (25,000) and thirty-
2	two thousand (32,000) women in the United States become pregnant as a result
3	of sexual assaults, and approximately twenty-two thousand (22,000) of these
4	pregnancies could be prevented if these women used emergency contraception;
5	(6) Standards of emergency care established by the American
6	College of Emergency Medicine and the American Medical Association require
7	that sexual assault survivors be counseled about their risk of pregnancy and
8	offered emergency contraception;
9	(7) The National Protocol for Sexual Assault Medical Forensic
10	Examinations issued by the United States Department of Justice Office on

5	(B) "Emergency contraception" does not include RU-486,
6	mifepristone, or any other drug or device that induces a medical abortion;

8	(2) "Sexual assault survivor" means a female who:
9	(A) Alleges or is alleged to have been the victim of
10	sexual assault or to have been raped; and
11	(B) Presents as a patient for treatment with regard to the
12	sexual assault or rape.

14	20-13-1403. Emergency contraception information required.
15	(a) All health care facilities that are licensed in this state and
16	provide emergency care to sexual assault survivors shall amend their
17	evidence-collection protocols for the treatment of sexual assault survivors
18	to include informing the survivor in a timely manner of the availability of
19	emergency contraception as a means of pregnancy prophylaxis and educating the
20	sexual assault survivor on the proper use of emergency contraception and the
21	appropriate follow-up care.
22	(b) This section does not require:
23	(1) A health care professional who is employed by a health
24	care facility that provides emergency care to a sexual assault survivor to
25	inform the sexual assault survivor of the availability of emergency
26	contraception if the health care professional refuses to provide the
27	information on the basis of religious or moral beliefs; or
28	(2) A health care facility to provide emergency contraception to
29	a sexual assault survivor who is not at risk of becoming pregnant as a result
30	of the sexual assault or who was already pregnant at the time of the sexual
31	assault.
32	(c) If a licensed pharmacy does not have nonprescription emergency
33	contraception in stock, the pharmacy shall place a conspicuous notice in the
34	area where customers obtain prescription drugs that states in capital letter
35	in at least 18-point bold type "EMERGENCY CONTRACEPTION NOT AVAILABLE".
36	(d) The General Assembly encourages each health care facility to

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1	provide training to emergency room staff concerning the efficacy of emergency
2	contraception and the time-sensitive nature of the drug.
3	(e)(1) Because emergency contraception is time-sensitive and a sexual
4	assault survivor may seek information on or direct access to emergency
5	contraception to prevent an unintended pregnancy resulting from the assault
6	instead of or before seeking hospital treatment, it is critical that a sexual
7	assault survivor has accurate information about the availability and use of
8	emergency contraception.
9	(2) Therefore, the General Assembly encourages:
10	(A) An entity offering victim assistance or counseling and
11	rape crisis hotlines to include information concerning the availability and
12	use of emergency contraception; and
13	(B) A licensed or registered pharmacy in the state of
14	Arkansas to distribute information concerning the availability and use of
15	emergency contraception.
