35	WHEREAS, the Nat	tional Center for Education Statistic	s indicates. as
36		tion Trust, that more classes in high	

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1	minority schools are taught by out-of-field teachers and that poor and		
2	minority students get more inexperienced teachers; and

4	WHEREAS, the Education Trust reports that of persons who graduate		
5	college by twenty-four (24) years of age, those from high-income families		
6	graduate from college at the rate of 75%, while those from low-income		
7	families graduate at the rate of 9%; and		
8			
9	WHEREAS, the Education Trust reports that Arkansas gets the fourth		
10	least amount of federal funding per poverty student. The Title 1 allocation		
11	per poor child in Arkansas is \$1,009 compared to Wyoming with \$2,957 and		
12	Vermont with \$2,794; and		
13			
14	WHEREAS, quality leadership is a factor in all schools but more funding		
15	would permit school districts with concentrated poverty to be able to compet		
16	to attract more highly qualified superintendents, principals and teachers,		
17			
18	NOW THEREFORE,		
19	BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:		
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21	SECTION 1. Arkansas Code § 6-20-2303, concerning definitions for		
22	public school funding, is amended to add an additional subsection to read as		
23	follows:		
24	(23)(A) "Poverty index" means an index for each school district		
25	with seventy percent (70%) or greater national school lunch students, as		
26	defined in this subsection (a), derived from three components:		
27	(i) The school district's percentage of national		
28	school lunch students;		
29	(ii) The number represented in the United States		
30	Census Bureau School District Estimates for 2004 data field for relevant age		
31	group of children who are five (5) to seventeen (17) years of age in familie		
32	in poverty; and		
33	(iii) The state wealth index for school districts.		
34	(B) The poverty index shall be calculated by the following		
35	method:		
36	(i) Multiplying the school district's percentage of		

1	national school lunch students by one hundred (100); then multiplied by
2	(ii) The number represented by subdivision
3	(a)(23)(A)(ii) of this section; and multiplied by
4	(iii) The school district's state wealth index.
5	
6	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 6-20-2305(b)(1), concerning categorical
7	funding for public schools, is amended to read as follows:
8	(b)(l) In addition to state foundation funding aid, each school
9	district shall receive funding for additional education categories as
10	provided in subdivisions $\frac{(b)(2)-(6)}{(b)(2)-(7)}$ of this section.
11	
12	SECTION 3. Arkansas Code § 6-20-2305(b), concerning categorical
13	funding for public schools, is amended to add an additional subdivision to
14	read as follows:
15	(7) For school years 2007-2008 and 2008-2009, concentrated poverty
16	funding shall be provided to each public school district with at least
17	seventy percent (70%) national school lunch students in the following amount:
18	(i) Ten dollars (\$10.00); multiplied by
19	(ii) The school district's poverty index; and
20	multiplied by
21	(iii) The previous school year's average daily
22	membership.
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
