24	The General Assemb	ly finds that:

4	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 5-64-1103(c) concerns records of sales	
5	limits on ephedrine, pseudoephedrine, or phenylpropanolamine, is amended to	
6	read as follows:	
7	(c)(1)(A) A pharmacy shall maintain a written or electronic log or	
8	receipts of transactions involving the sale of ephedrine, pseudoephedrine, or	
9	phenylpropanolamine.	
10	(B)(i) Subject to the available funding, by November 15,	
11	2007, the Arkansas Crime Information Center shall provide access to a real-	
12	time electronic logbook to pharmacies within the State of Arkansas for	
13	entering any transaction required to be recorded under this subchapter.	
14	(ii) The real-time electronic logbook shall have the	
15	ability to calculate both state and federal purchase limitations.	
16	(C) Each pharmacy shall also enter into the real-time	
17	electronic logbook required under subdivision (c)(1)(B) of this section any	
18	transaction required to be recorded under this subchapter.	
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20	SECTION 3. Arkansas Code Title 5, Chapter 64, Subchapter 11 is amended	
21	to add four (4) additional sections to read as follows:	
22	5-64-1104. Confidentiality of information in the Real-Time Electronic	
23	Logbook.	
24	(a) Information entered into the real-time electronic logbook is	
25	confidential and shall not be subject to the Freedom of Information Act of	
26	1967, §25-19-101 et seq.	
27	(b) The Arkansas Crime Information Center shall ensure that the	
28	privacy and confidentiality of patients and patient information collected,	
29	recorded, transmitted, and maintained in the real-time electronic logbook is	
30	not disclosed to a person except as provided under §5-64-1105.	
31	(c)(1) The Arkansas Crime Information Center shall ensure that no	
32	individual pharmacy has access to purchase information involving the sale of	
33	ephedrine, pseudoephedrine, or phenylpropanolamine made at any other	
34	pharmacy.	
35	(2) No pharmacy shall be held liable for a sale of ephedrine,	
36	pseudoephedrine, or phenylpropanolamine occurring at another pharmacy in this	

1	state.
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3	5-64-1105. Access to the Real-Time Electronic Logbook.
4	The Arkansas Crime Information Center shall provide access to the real-
5	time electronic logbook to the following:
6	(1) A person authorized to prescribe or dispense a product
7	containing ephedrine, pseudoephedrine, and phenylpropanolamine for the
8	purpose of providing medical or pharmaceutical care for the person's
9	patients;
10	(2) A local, state, and federal law enforcement or prosecutorial
11	official acting pursuant to his or her official duties;
12	(3) Any other local, state, or federal official who requests
13	access to the real-time electronic logbook to facilitate a product recall
14	that is necessary to protect the public health and safety; and
15	(4) The Arkansas State Board of Pharmacy for the purpose of
16	accessing suspicious transaction reports reported under § 5-64-1006(a).
17	
18	5-64-1106. Penalties for improper use of Real-Time Electronic Logbook.
19	(a) A person who knowingly releases or discloses to any unauthorized
20	person any information collected and maintained under this subchapter upon
21	conviction is guilty of a Class A misdemeanor.
22	(b) A person who knowingly obtains information collected and
23	maintained under this subchapter for a purpose not authorized under this
24	subchapter upon conviction is guilty of a Class A misdemeanor.
25	
26	5-64-1107. Implementation of Real-Time Electronic Logbook.
27	(a) Subject to the available funding, the Arkansas Crime Information
28	Center shall promulgate rules necessary to implement the real-time electronic
29	logbook required by this subchapter on or before October 1, 2007.
30	(b) Subject to the available funding, the Arkansas Crime Information
31	Center may contract with a private vendor to implement the real-time
32	electronic logbook required by this subchapter.
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34	5-64-1108. Destruction of records.
35	All transaction records that are maintained in the real-time electronic
36	log shall be destroyed two (2) years after the date of the transmission,

1	unless the records are being used in:
2	(1) An ongoing criminal investigation; or
3	(2) A criminal proceeding.
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
