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1 WHEREAS, Bonnie joined Jim Ed and Maxine upon her high school 2 graduation and the band recorded several major hits in 1955 and 1956; and 3 4 WHEREAS, in 1956 the group teamed with RCA Records producer Chet Atkins 5 to establish a vocal harmony unequalled in popularity by any brother-sister 6 trio; and 7 8 WHEREAS, The Browns, along with Jim Reeves, Faron Young, Ray Price, and 9 others, played an integral role in the pioneering of the "Nashville Sound" which revolutionized country music during the late 1950's and throughout the 10 11 1960's; and 12 WHEREAS, in 1959 the group's song "The Three Bells" spent ten (10) 13 weeks atop the country charts and four (4) weeks at number one on the pop 14 15 charts; and 16 17 WHEREAS, the success of the "The Three Bells" propelled the group to appearances on The Ed Sullivan Show, The Jimmy Dean Show, and American 18 19 Bandstand; and 20 21 WHEREAS, The Browns joined the Grand Ole Opry in 1963; and 22 WHEREAS, The Browns disbanded in 1967, with Jim Ed pursuing a solo 23 24 career and Maxine and Bonnie moving back to Arkansas to concentrate on their 25 families; and 26 27 WHEREAS, in 1997 The Browns were chosen for membership in the Arkansas 28 Entertainers Hall of Fame in recognition of their many contributions to and achievements in the field of music; and 29 30 31 WHEREAS, The Browns' unique harmony is still heard today on vintage 32 country music and pop radio stations and they continue to make special 33 appearances in concert and at the Grand Ole Opry; and 34 35 WHEREAS, The Browns' innovative harmony, characteristic sound, and 36 crossover success on the country and pop charts are indicative of their

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     talent and place in country music history; and
