8	SENATE MEMORIAL RESOLUTION
9	IN RESPECTFUL MEMORY OF MR. J. E. DUNLAP, JR.,
10	AND IN RECOGNITION OF HIS CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE
11	STATE OF ARKANSAS AND HIS LOCAL COMMUNITY.

14	IN RESPECTFUL MEMORY OF MR. J. E.
15	DUNLAP, JR., AND IN RECOGNITION OF HIS
16	CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE STATE OF ARKANSAS
17	AND HIS LOCAL COMMUNITY.

20	WHEREAS, Mr. J. E. Dunlap, Jr., of Harrison, Arkansas, died on
21	Wednesday, June 28, 2006, at the age of eighty-three (83), in Springfield,
22	Missouri; and
23	
24	WHEREAS, Mr. Dunlap was known simply as J.E. by presidents, governors,
25	senators, congressmen, and everyone he met on the street; and he thrived on
26	challenges, whether writing a convincing editorial, fishing for crappie,
27	interviewing presidents, or marching up and down the hills in Eureka Springs,
28	Arkansas, carrying and playing the bass drum in the Harrison High School
29	Band; and
30	
31	WHEREAS, he was quick-witted and known for his one-liners: "make
32	yourself useful as well as ornamental"; "go to the line on the third to get a
33	fifth for the fourth"; and "you can't sell newspapers if they aren't in the
34	rack"; and
35	
36	WHEREAS, Mr. Dunlap's timeline was marked by accomplishments He

1	worked as a stringer for the statewide Arkansas Democrat at age seventeen
2	(17) and at age eighty (80) was honored as the state's 2002 Outstanding Older
3	Worker; and
4	
5	WHEREAS, from the time he served as assistant sports editor of the high
6	school newspaper, printer's ink was his blood; he learned to use the
7	Intertype during free time in high school; was a 1940 graduate of Harrison
8	High School; and was then hired full time by the weekly Boone County
9	Headlight, where he ran the press half a week, wrote news the other half, and
10	served as editor during the owner's vacation; and
11	
12	WHEREAS, Mr. Dunlap returned to the Boone County Headlight after seeing
13	action during World War II where he had trained to be a B-25 bombardier-
14	navigator-gunner and served three (3) years in the Army Air Corps; and
15	
16	WHEREAS, Mr. Dunlap was named publisher of the Boone County Headlight
17	in 1945; self-taught, he carried the paper to the state's top honor five (5)
18	years later, winning the Arkansas Press Association/Arkansas Livestock Show
19	award for the best newspaper in Arkansas, weekly or daily; and at age thirty-
20	one (31), he was the youngest president of the Arkansas Press Association;
21	and
22	
23	WHEREAS, he negotiated the merger of the Boone County Headlight with
24	the third-generation Harrison Daily Times in 1954; was named publisher with
25	majority ownership; and over the next forty (40) years, expanded the
26	newspaper's coverage across six (6) counties and grew circulation from three
27	thousand four hundred (3,400) to eleven thousand (11,000); and
28	
29	WHEREAS, never content with mediocrity, he installed an offset press in
30	1972, was Arkansas' first publisher to finance an electronic newsroom, and
31	printed a two hundred-page sesquicentennial issue for July 4, 1986; and
32	
33	WHEREAS, Mr. Dunlap believed in using the power of the press for
34	economic and civic projects, such as the Urban Renewal program after the May
35	7, 1961, Flood, and the campaign to build the current Harrison Chamber of
36	Commerce building; and

2	WHEREAS, over his fifty (50) years as publisher, Mr. Dunlap was
3	nominated twice for Pulitzer Prize recognition; was presented the Arkansas
4	Community Development Program's Award of Exceptional Achievement; twice was
5	presented the APA President's Award; was awarded the Ernie Deane Award in
6	2000 for exemplifying the spirit, style, and courage of Ernie Deane; and was
7	presented the Arkansas Press Association's Distinguished Service Award in
8	2002; and
9	
10	WHEREAS, his other love was serving on the Arkansas State Police
11	Commission; he was the longest-serving member - twenty-two (22) years, two
12	(2) months - under five (5) governors; and he took great pride in serving the
13	commission and the law enforcement officers; and
14	
15	WHEREAS, he loved fishing and Razorback basketball and football; he was
16	known by sportswriters, some young enough to be his grandchildren, for
17	annually asking the first question at the Razorbacks' preseason media day; he
18	was unselfish, loyal, and enjoyed taking friends to Razorback football and
19	basketball games, always supplying tickets and paying for dinner; and he was
20	a regular coffee club member and enjoyed communicating with the newspaper's
21	community correspondents; and

23 24	WHEREAS, Mr. Dunlap embraced change but refused to budge on important traditions eating at the Extension Homemakers' Country Kitchen at the
25	district fair was as important to him as attending a presidential
26	inauguration; and
27	inauguration, and
28	WHEREAS, he was a member of the First Presbyterian Church since 1937
29	where he served as an ordained deacon; was a former member and officer of the
30	Junior Chamber of Commerce and a sixty-year member and former president of
31	the Harrison Chamber of Commerce; was named to the Tourism Hall of Fame in
32	2003; and served as a volunteer firefighter for many years; and
33	
34	WHEREAS, Mr. Dunlap was preceded in death by his parents, James E. and
35	Dennie (Knox) Dunlap; his wife, Leota "Sammy" Dunlap; and a brother, Bevan
36	Dunlap; and

2	WHEREAS, he is survived by a daughter, Jane Dunlap Christenson and her
3	husband, Jeff, of Harrison, Arkansas, and their daughter, Jennifer
4	Christenson of Boulder, Colorado; a son, Lee H. Dunlap and his long-time
5	companion, Karen Lair, of Harrison, Arkansas, and her daughter, Shelley
6	Dowell and her husband, Clayton, of Fayetteville, Arkansas; and grandson,
7	Cooper Dowell; and numerous other relatives and friends,
8	
9	NOW THEREFORE,
10	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE EIGHTY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE
11	STATE OF ARKANSAS:

13	THAT the Senate recognizes Mr. J. E. Dunlap's commitment, hard work,
14	dedication, and service to the State of Arkansas and his local community, and
15	commends him for his leadership.

18	express sincere condolences to the family of Mr. Dunlap, and upon adoption of
19	this resolution, an appropriate copy shall be provided to the family by the
