17	(c)(1) The independent evaluation shall include a survey of families		
18	that have left the program to examine their work experience, their sources of		
19	financial support, the barriers that affect their ability to work, the well-		
20	being of families and children, including whether adults face hardships in		
21	providing food, shelter, or other basic necessities for their families, and		
22	their perceptions of the program and their life after welfare.		
23	(2) The study shall utilize professionally recognized techniques		
24	for research on families leaving welfare, including statistical sampling and		
25	telephone and in-person surveys with rigorous follow-up to ensure adequate		
26	response rates.		
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
