36	WHEREAS, because t	he United States consumes a disproportionate share o)f



1 the world's energy supply and the greenhouse gas emissions of developing 2 countries are rising rapidly, the United States, as a world economic leader, 3 should meet with other industrialized and industrializing nations to 4 negotiate mutually beneficial positions in future climate treaties; and 5 6 WHEREAS, any system designed to regulate greenhouse gas emissions 7 should be evaluated on its ability to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and its 8 potential economic impact; and 9 10 WHEREAS, mutual reductions in greenhouse gas emissions would be 11 economically beneficial to all states and countries; and 12 13 WHEREAS, a number of leading Arkansas industries have been early 14 adopters of energy efficient technologies and practices; and 15 16 WHEREAS, the Arkansas Governor's Commission on Global Warming has 17 recognized the role of national legislation and coordination in reducing 18 greenhouse gas emissions, 19 20 NOW THEREFORE, 21 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE EIGHTY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN: 22 2.3 24 That it is the sense of the Arkansas General Assembly that global 25 climate change is a local, state, national, and international issue and any 26 action taken by the Congress of the United States of America to address the 27 issue of global climate change and to reduce the emission of greenhouse gases 28 should be undertaken in an efficient, balanced, and coordinated manner that: 29 (1) Promotes U.S. jobs and a sustainable economy marked by high 30 paying jobs, through policies that include increased technology investments 31 and reduced dependency on imported energy; 32 (2) Provides a level playing field for economic development and 33 trade among the states and among the nations of the world; 34 (3) Provides U.S. citizens and industries with a reliable and 35 diverse energy supply at affordable prices;

(4) Rewards early adopters of practices and technologies that

2	(5) Prevents the loss or migration of industrial and
