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23	WHEREAS, Mr. Sandy	Alexander Robinson, Jr. was born August 18, 1925, in
24	Keiser, Arkansas, to the	e late Sandy Alexander Robinson, Sr., and Babe Rose
25	(Cole) Robinson; and als	so preceding him in death were his brothers Colie
26	Robinson and John Robins	son, and his sisters, Jessie Culberson and Catherine
27	McIntosh; and	
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29	WHEREAS, Mr. Robin	nson was reared as a farmer of cotton, soybeans, and
30	corn; and his elementary	and high school years were at Carson Lake School and
31	Rosenwald High School; a	and
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33	WHEREAS, while ser	rving in the United States Army, his commanding
34	officer, Lieutenant Hood	d, was killed in action and he was ordered to take his
35	place without recognition or promotion in rank; was later transferred to For	
36	Reynolds, Pennsylvania,	and was the first African-American drill sergeant of

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1 his unit; and upon his honorable discharge, he received a WWII Victory 2 Ribbon, Good Conduct Medal, American Theatre Ribbon, KAME Theatre Ribbon, and 3 three (3) Bronze Stars; and 4 5 WHEREAS, his college educational background includes being a graduate 6 of Mississippi Industrial College in Holly Springs, Mississippi; Shorter 7 College in Little Rock, Arkansas; Alabama College in Huntsville, Alabama; 8 Christian Brothers College in Memphis, Tennessee; Arkansas State University 9 in Jonesboro, Arkansas; Philander Smith College in Little Rock, Arkansas; and 10 Tennessee State University in Nashville, Tennessee, where he received a 11 degree as a certified mortician and where he met his future wife; and 12 13 WHEREAS, Mr. Robinson accepted Christ into his life at an early age at 14 Pleasant Grove Missionary Baptist Church and later joined Gospel Temple 15 Church in Luxora, Arkansas, under the leadership of Pastor Lawrence Haley, 16 where he has served on the Board of Trustees; was an active member of Gospel 17 Temple until his health began to fail; and was also a member of Kappa Alpha 18 Psi; and 19 20 WHEREAS, Mr. Robinson married the love of his life, Mary L. Mabins, on 21 March 22, 1952, and to this union they were blessed with two (2) children; 22 and 23 24 WHEREAS, in 1952, he was employed by the Keiser Public School District 25 and managed with four (4) small rooms and three (3) teachers, including himself; was the principal, teacher, bus driver, and janitor; the school went 26 27 only to the eighth grade; because of segregation, once the eighth grade was 28 completed, African-American students in Keiser were finished with school with 29 no further educational opportunities; and he took it upon himself to add the ninth grade without the proper books or equipment but based solely on his 30 31 knowledge; and 32 33 WHEREAS, after years of seeing the plight of African-American students 34 and their lack of opportunity to further their education, Mr. Robinson fought 35 hard to have students completing the eighth grade to be allowed to transfer

to a neighboring school in Wilson, Arkansas; he would get up every morning at

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1 5:00 a.m. to pick up all the students in rural areas and in town; in the old 2 overcrowded, used bus, he would drop off the students at Keiser and then 3 drive to Wilson to drop off the older students; in the afternoon he would 4 drive back to Wilson and back to Keiser, repeating this same routine every day; and he would not arrive home sometimes until 5:30 or 6:00 in the 5 6 evening; and 7 8 WHEREAS, in 1962, the four-room school burned completely to the ground, 9 leaving students without a place for their education; nevertheless, Mr. 10 Robinson would still get up morning after morning to take the other students 11 to Wilson; with no other alternative and without help from the school board, 12 he petitioned the local African-American ministers of the Baptist Church and 13 the Church of God in Christ in Keiser to allow them to continue their classes 14 in the churches; this continued until the new three-room all-brick building 15 was completed; and by 1966, school segregation in Keiser had ended and Mr. 16 Robinson was no longer the principal and the janitor but still remained as 17 the teacher, bus driver, and advocate for higher learning for African-18 American students; and 19 20 WHEREAS, in 1987 after thirty-seven (37) years of teaching, Mr. 21 Robinson retired from Keiser Public School district, as his task had been 22 completed; had it not been for his fight for higher education for African-23 American students, many of them would not have gone on to become doctors, 24 lawyers, administrators, teachers, ministers, and much more; even today many 25 of his students, both African-American and white, still honor him as being the most influential and instrumental teacher in their lives; and 26 27 28 WHEREAS, Sandy will be best remembered by many family members and 29 friends, including his wife of fifty-eight (58) years, nine (9) months, and seventeen (17) days, Mary L. Robinson; one (1) daughter, Vickie Pugh-30 31 Richardson; one (1) son, Vonzell (Phyllis) Robinson; nine (9) grandchildren, Arthur Pugh, Corey Pugh, Vonzell Smith, Candace Smith, Torthell Robinson, 32 Jamal Robinson, Brandon Robinson, Antjuan Robinson, and Marcus Virgies; five 33 (5) great-grandchildren, including Robin Pugh; one (1) sister, Louise Dickens 34 35 of Talladega, Alabama; one (1) brother, Carl (Betty) Robinson of Detroit, 36 Michigan; four (4) sisters-in-law, Martha Moore, Pearlena Myles, Cloteria

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1	(Willie) Brown, and Wilma Mabins; and a host of loving nieces, nephews,
