22	WHERFAS Mr Kirk	bride Potts, a young bachelor, came to Arkansas by

27	WHEREAS, Mr. Pott	s homesteaded one hundred and sixty (160) acres, began
28	clearing and farming, a	nd was a respected citizen in the valley; like many
29	other Americans in the	late 1840's, Mr. Potts decided to mine for gold in
30	California but was not successful in that endeavor; but he recognized the	
31	opportunity to supply m	eat to the hungry prospectors and organized three (3)
32	successful cattle drive	s back to California; and

34	WHEREAS, with a l	arge family of eleven (11) children, Mr. Potts in the
35	1850's began the construction of a two-and-a-half story home, which was	
36	modeled after the great	houses back in his home state of Pennsylvania; almost

1 all of the wood used in construction was cut on the homesteaded acres and 2 hauled by oxen to Cagle's Mill, where it was sawed into lumber; the boards were hand-planed and marks of the plane bits are still visible in the attic; 3 4 the bricks used in the nine (9) fireplaces were made on the premises and the molds and racks used to make the bricks are on display in the house; the 5 6 doors and windows, many still with the original glass panes, were brought by 7 keel boat up the Arkansas River; mantel boards over the fireplaces and the 8 simple decorative woodwork in the parlor are the only architectural frills in 9 the house; it was a functional frontier home, stage depot stop, and a well-10 known social center between Memphis, Tennessee, and Fort Smith, Arkansas, in 11 those early days; and it took eight (8) years to complete the home; and 12

WHEREAS, the rooms on both the first and second floor are 20 x 20 with a 12-foot wide central hall; the parlor was used for state occasions, tea parties, and musicals; all of the Potts family daughters were married in front of the fireplace; governors, military officers, and Cherokee chiefs shared the hospitality and delicious fare assured by Mrs. Potts; and the home served as the first post office in the area and the original postal desk used by Mr. Potts is on display in the museum; and

21 WHEREAS, in 1857, the United States Government passed legislation to 22 establish an overland mail route to transport mail and passengers to 23 California; Mr. John Butterfield from upstate New York was awarded the huge 24 contract and the Potts home was a scheduled stop on the Butterfield Overland 25 Mail route; the stagecoach traveled almost three thousand (3,000) miles one way, and they accomplished the set goal with the first trip in September of 26 27 1858 taking less than the allotted time of twenty-four (24) days; but the 28 stage route was short-lived due to the beginning of the Civil War; and 29

WHEREAS, the Potts family provided legendary food and comfortable boarding for travelers and local visitors for three (3) generations; in 1970 the home was obtained by Pope County with the purpose of converting it to a museum; it is maintained by the Pope County Historical Foundation, a volunteer board; and in addition to the original well house and smoke house, there are several cabins on the grounds that display other facets of local history along with this jewel of Arkansas,
