31	alternative learning environment students enrolled during the previous school
32	year.
33	(iii) Funding for students in alternative learning
34	environments shall be distributed based on rules promulgated by the State
35	Board of Education.
36	(B)(i) Beginning with the 2007-2008 school year, secondary
