23	(a) (a) (1) The General Assembly finds that every public school	student in
24	this state has the right to receive his or her public education i	n a public
25	school educational environment that is reasonably free from subst	antial
26	intimidation, harassment, or harm or threat of harm by another st	udent.
27	(2) The school board of directors in every public sc	hool
28	district shall adopt policies to prevent pupil harassment, also k	nown as
29	bullying.	
30	(3)(b) As used in this subchapter section:	
31	(1) "Attribute" means an actual or perceived persona	<u>1</u>
32	characteristic including without limitation race, color, religion	, ancestry,
33	national origin, socioeconomic status, academic status, disabilit	y, gender,
34	gender identity, physical appearance, health condition, or sexual	
35	orientation;	
36	(A)(2) "Bullying" means the intentional harassment.	

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- intimidation, humiliation, ridicule, defamation, or threat or incitement of violence by a student against another student or public school employee by a

- 18 or image transmitted by means of an electronic device, including without

- 21 (C)(4) "Harassment" means a pattern of unwelcome verbal or
- 22 physical conduct relating to another person's constitutionally or statutorily

- 26 $\frac{(D)(5)}{(D)}$ "Substantial disruption" means without limitation that

- 30 (ii)(B) Inability of students or educational staff to
- 31 focus on learning or function as an educational unit because of a hostile
- 32 environment;
- 33 (iii)(C) Severe or repetitive disciplinary measures are
- 34 needed in the classroom or during educational activities; or
- 35 $\frac{\text{(iv)}(D)}{D}$ Exhibition of other behaviors by students or
- 36 educational staff that substantially interfere with the learning environment.

1 (c) Bullying of a public school student or a public school employee is 2 prohibited. 3 (d) A school principal or his or her designee who receives a credible 4 report or complaint of bullying shall promptly investigate the complaint or 5 report and make a record of the investigation and any action taken as a 6 result of the investigation. 7 (e)(1) The board of directors of every school district shall adopt 8 policies to prevent bullying. 9 (b)(2) The policies shall: 10 $\frac{(1)(A)}{(A)}(A)(i)$ Clearly define conduct that constitutes 11 bullying. 12 (B)(ii) The definition shall include without 13 limitation the definition contained in subsection (a) of this section; 14 (2)(B) Prohibit bullying: (A)(i) While in school, on school equipment or 15 16 property, in school vehicles, on school buses, at designated school bus stops, at school-sponsored activities, at school-sanctioned events; or 17 18 $\frac{(B)(i)}{(ii)}(a)$ By an electronic act that results in 19 the substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the school or 20 educational environment. 21 (ii)(b) This section shall apply to an 22 electronic act whether or not the electronic act originated on school 23 property or with school equipment, if the electronic act is directed 24 specifically at students or school personnel and maliciously intended for the 25 purpose of disrupting school, and has a high likelihood of succeeding in that 26 purpose; 27 (3)(C) State the consequences for engaging in the 28 prohibited conduct, which may vary depending on the age or grade of the 29 student involved; 30 (4)(D) Require that a school employee who has witnessed or 31 has reliable information that a pupil has been a victim of bullying as 32 defined by the district shall report the incident to the principal; 33 (5)(E) Require that the person or persons who file a 34 complaint will not be subject to retaliation or reprisal in any form; 35 (6)(F) Require that notice of what constitutes bullying, 36 that bullying is prohibited, and that the consequences of engaging in

1	bullying be conspicuously posted in every classroom, cafeteria, restroom,	
2	ymnasium, auditorium, and school bus in the district; and	
3	(7) (G) Require that copies of the notice of what	
4	constitutes bullying, that bullying is prohibited, and that the consequences	
5	of engaging in bullying be provided to parents, students, school volunteers,	
6	and employees. Each policy shall require that a full copy of the policy be	
7	made available upon request.	
8	(f) A school district shall provide training on compliance with the	
9	antibullying policies to all public school district employees responsible for	
10	reporting or investigating bullying under this section.	
11	(e)(g) A school employee who has reported violations under the school	
12	district's policy shall be immune from any tort liability that may arise from	
13	the failure to remedy the reported incident.	
14	(d)(h) The local school board of directors of a school district may	
15	provide opportunities for school employees to participate in programs or	
16	other activities designed to develop the knowledge and skills to prevent and	
17	respond to acts covered by this policy.	
18	$\frac{(e)(1)}{(i)(1)}$ The school district shall file with the Department of	
19	Education a copy of the policies adopted in compliance with this section.	
20	(2) The State Board of Education shall review the policies	
21	provided by the school districts and may recommend changes or improvements to	
22	the districts if the state board determines that the policies need	
23	improvement.	
24	(j) This section is not intended to:	
25	(1) Restrict a public school district from adopting and	
26	implementing policies against bullying or school violence or policies to	
27	promote civility and student dignity that are more inclusive than the	
28	antibullying policies required under this section; or	
29	(2) Unconstitutionally restrict protected rights of freedom of	
30	speech, freedom of religious exercise, or freedom of assembly.	
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
