- 32 shall deliver a copy of the benefit report to the Secretary of State for
- 33 filing.
- 34 (2) The compensation paid to directors and financial or
- 35 proprietary informationist included in the benefit report may be omitted from
- 36 the benefit report as delivered to the Secretary of State.
