24	SECTION 1. DO N	NOT CODIFY. <u>Findings.</u>		
25	<u>The General Asse</u>	embly finds that:		
26	<u>(1) Court</u>	ts have found that the electroni	c payment system

28	<u>(2) Elect</u>	tronic payment system networks s	et the level of credit

1	(6) In order to provide the desired convenience to consumers,		
2	most merchants must agree to accept credit and debit cards;		
3	(7) Some electronic payment system networks market themselves as		
4	providers of currency and promote use of their products as though they were a		
5	complete substitute for legal tender;		
6	(8) Due to the market power of the two (2) largest electronic		
7	payment system networks, merchants do not have the power to negotiate with		
8	regard to the contract for acceptance of credit and debit cards and the cost		
9	of the interchange fees for such acceptance;		
10	(9) Merchants are subject to contracts that allow the electronic		
11	payment system networks to change the terms without notice, subject merchants		
12	to staggering fines, or reinterpret the rules and hold the merchant

19	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code Title 4, Chapter 107, is amended to add an		
20	additional subchapter to read as follows:

22	Subchapter 4 - Prevention of Credit Card Company Unfair Business Practices		
23	<u>Act</u>		
24			
25	<u>4-107-401. Title.</u>		
26	This subchapter shall be known and may be cited as the "Prevention of		
27	Credit Card Company Unfair Business Practices Act".		
28			
29	<u>4-107-402. Definitions.</u>		
30	As used in this subchapter:		
31	(1) "Electronic payment system" means an entity, other than a		
32	national bank, that:		
33	(A) Directly or through licensed members, processors, or		
34	agents provides the proprietary services, infrastructure, and software that		
35	route information and data to facilitate transaction authorization,		
36	clearance, and settlement; and		

1	(B) A merchant uses in order to accept a brand of general-		
2	purpose credit cards, charge cards, debit cards, or stored value cards as a		
3	form of payment for goods or services; and		
4	(2) "Merchant" means a person or entity doing business in this		
5	state and that offers goods or services for sale in this state.		
6			
7	4-107-403. Protection of retail competition.		
8	An electronic payment system shall not, directly or through a member, a		
9	processor, an agent, or an acquirer of the electronic payment system:		
10	(1) Impose a requirement, condition, penalty, or fine in a		
11	contract with a merchant relating to the display of pricing for goods or		
12	services for sale by the merchant;		
13	(2) Inhibit the ability of a merchant to offer its customers a		
14	discount or other in-kind incentives for using a debit or credit card of		
15	another electronic payment system;		
16	(3) Inhibit the ability of a merchant to decide whether or not		
17	to accept the products of an electronic payment system at one (1) of its		
18	<u>locations;</u>		
19	(4) Prevent a merchant from setting a minimum or maximum dollar		
20	value for its acceptance of a credit card;		
21	(5) Limit the number of electronic payment systems that process		
22	a credit or debit card transaction to one (1) electronic payment system or to		
23	affiliated electronic payment systems; or		
24	(6) Inhibit a merchant from choosing the electronic payment		
25	system that processes a credit or debit card transaction other than as		
26	allowed in this subdivision (4).		
27			
28	4-107-404. Cartel price setting — Prohibited.		
29	An electronic payment system shall not establish a required, suggested,		
30	or default rate for the fees to be charged by its credit card issuer, member,		
31	processor, or agent of the electronic payment system for transactions in this		
32	state unless the credit card issuer, member, processor, or agent of the		
33	electronic payment system is the electronic payment system itself and not a		
34	separate legal entity.

1	(a) An electronic payment system that is found to have violated § 4-		
2	107-403 or § 4-107-404 of this subchapter shall:		
3	(1) Reimburse the affected merchants for all chargebacks, fees,		
4	and fines collected from affected merchants directly or through any member,		
5	processor, or agent of the electronic payment system during the time that the		
6	electronic payment system was in violation of this subchapter; and		
7	(2) Be liable for a civil penalty of ten thousand dollars		
8	(\$10,000) per chargeback, fee, or fine levied for violating this subchapter.		
9	(b) A merchant who is harmed by a violation of § 4-72-207 is entitled		
10	<u>to:</u>		
11	(1) Recover treble damages in a civil action;		
12	(2) If appropriate, obtain injunctive relief; and		
13	(3) Be reimbursed for reasonable attorney's fees and the cost of		
14	<u>litigation.</u>		
15	(c) The Attorney General or his or her designee may maintain a civil		
16	action for damages or equitable relief under this section to protect against		
17	violations of this subchapter.		
18			
19	<u>4-107-406. Severability.</u>		
20	If a court determines that a provision of this subchapter or the		
21	application of this subchapter is invalid, the determination shall not affect		
22	the provisions or applications of this subchapter that can be given effect		
23	without the invalid provision or application, and to that end the provisions		
24	of this subchapter are severable.
