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15	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 6-20-2305(b)(4)(D)(i), concerning a school			
16	district report on the expenditure of national school lunch state categorical			
17	funds, is amended to read as follows:			
18	(D)(i) By the end of each school year, each school			
19	district shall submit to the Department of Education a report listing that:			
20	(a) Lists each program upon which funds			
21	allocated under this subdivision (b)(4) were expended;			
22	(b) <u>Identifies</u> the amount expended, <u>for each</u>			
23	program;			
24	(c) Documents the specific benefit of the			
25	program to the academic progress of low-income students; and			
26	(d) <u>Includes</u> any other information required by			
27	the Department of Education.			
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29	SECTION 3. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the			
30	General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that under its constitutional duty			
31	to provide an equal opportunity for an adequate education for all public			
32	school students, the state provides national school lunch state categorical			
33	funding for the purpose of improving the achievement levels of students in			
34	poverty; that this act directs the use and evaluation of the use of that			
35	funding for more than half of all public school students in this state; and			
36	that this is immediately personally for the State Board of Education to			

T	promutgate rules for the 2013-2014 school year for the use of this funding.
2	Therefore, an emergency is declared to exist, and this act being immediately
3	necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety shall
4	become effective on:
5	(1) The date of its approval by the Governor;
6	(2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor,
7	the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the
8	bill; or
9	(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is
10	overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto.
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
