8	20-77-2102. Definitions.		
9	As used in this subchapter:		
10	(1) "Caregiver services" are services provided to an individual		
11	in the State of Arkansas to assist the recipient of the services in the		
12	activities of daily living, and the recipient of services is either:		
13	(A) Fifty (50) years of age or older at the time the		
14	services are provided; or		
15	(B) Regardless of age, suffering from a physical or mental		
16	incapacitation that prevents the individual from caring for himself or		
17	<pre>herself;</pre>		
18	(2) "Certified Personal Care Assistant" means an individual who		
19	has met the requirements of this subchapter and provides caregiver services;		
20	(3) "Compensation" means money or another type of property of		
21	value received by a provider of caregiver services in exchange for the		
22	services of the provider without regard to the source of payment of the money		
23	or other type of property; and		
24	(4) "Successful completion" means completion of training in		
25	acceptable core competencies in the physical skills under § 20-77-2103.		
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27	20-77-2103. Training requirement.		
28	(a) A person who applies for employment to provide caregiver services		
29	in this state for compensation shall provide documentation to a home health		
30	services agency of successful completion of training as a Certified Personal		
31	Care Assistant under this subchapter.		
32	(b) The Department of Human Services may issue documentation of		
33	successful completion of training as a Certified Personal Care Assistant		
34	under this subchapter to a person if the person:		
35	(1) Is eighteen (18) years of age or older;		
36	(2) Has not been convicted of a felony unless the conviction has		

1	been expunged or pardoned;		
2	(3) Has passed a drug test for illegal drug use within fifteen		
3	(15) days before initial licensure and passes a drug test for illegal drug		
4	use within fifteen (15) days before renewal of license; and		
5	(4)(A) Has successfully completed a caregiver training course		
6	addressing the following core competencies approved by the department		
7	including not less than forty (40) hours of training in:		
8	(i) Bodily functions;		
9	(ii) Behavioral issues, including changes in		
10	physical, mental, or psychological conditions;		
11	(iii) Body mechanics and safety precautions;		
12	(iv) Communication skills;		
13	(v) Dementia and Alzheimer's diseases;		
14	(vi) Emergency situations, including recognition of		
15	conditions and proper procedures;		
16	(vii) Household safety and fire prevention;		
17	(viii) Infection control and prevention, including		
18	maintaining a safe and clean working environment;		
19	(ix) Law and ethics;		
20	(x) Nutrition;		
21	(xi) Personal care;		
22	(xii) At least sixteen (16) hours covering physical		
23	skills and competent demonstration of such skills for:		
24	(a) Ambulation;		
25	(b) Basic housekeeping procedures, including		
26	laundry skills;		
27	(c) Bathing, shampooing, and shaving;		
28	(d) Dressing and undressing;		
29	(e) Meal preparation and clean up;		
30	(f) Oral hygiene;		
31	(g) Range of motion;

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7	20-77-2104. Exemptions.		
8	An individual may provide caregiver services without licensure under		
9	this subchapter if the person is a:		
10	(1) Certified Nursing Assistant;		
11	(2) Licensed practical nurse;		
12	(3) Parent, grandparent, child, grandchild, or sibling of the		
13	recipient of the services;		
14	(4) Physician;		
15	(5) Registered nurse; or		
16	(6) Service provider who does not receive compensation for his		
17	or her services.
