## For An Act To Be Entitled

9 AN ACT TO AMEND AND UPDATE THE ARKANSAS COMPREHENSIVE  
10 TESTING, ASSESSMENT, AND ACCOUNTABILITY PROGRAM; TO  
11 ALIGN POSTSECONDARY PREPARATORY PROGRAMS WITH THE  
12 STATE ASSESSMENT SYSTEM; TO DECLARE AN EMERGENCY; AND  
13 FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

## Subtitle

16 TO AMEND AND UPDATE THE ARKANSAS  
17 COMPREHENSIVE TESTING, ASSESSMENT, AND  
18 ACCOUNTABILITY PROGRAM; AND TO DECLARE AN  
19 EMERGENCY.  
20  
21  
22

23 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:  
24

25 SECTION 1. DO NOT CODIFY. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS.

26 The General Assembly finds that:

27 (1) The purpose of the Arkansas Comprehensive Testing,  
28 Assessment, and Accountability Program, § 6-15-401 et seq., is to provide the  
29 statutory framework necessary to ensure that all students in the public  
30 schools of this state have an equal opportunity to demonstrate grade-level  
31 academic proficiency through the application of knowledge and skills in core  
32 academic subjects consistent with state curriculum frameworks, performance  
33 standards, and assessments;

34 (2) To better meet their obligations and responsibilities under  
35 the Arkansas Comprehensive Testing, Assessment, and Accountability Program,  
36 and to facilitate the adoption of the Common Core State Standards, the State



1 Board of Education and Department of Education are working to transition the  
2 state's assessment program to a common set of next-generation assessments in  
3 English language arts and mathematics as approved by the state board;

4 (3) When fully implemented, these next-generation assessments  
5 will:

6 (A) Determine whether students are college and career  
7 ready or on track;

8 (B) Assess the full range of the Common Core State  
9 Standards;

10 (C) Measure the full range of student performance,  
11 including the performance of high-performing and low-performing students;

12 (D) Provide data to inform instruction, interventions, and  
13 professional development;

14 (E) Provide data for accountability, including measures of  
15 growth; and

16 (F) Incorporate innovative approaches throughout the  
17 assessment system;

18 (4) The next-generation assessments will improve on the  
19 consistency, frequency, and rigor of the state's existing assessment system  
20 while meeting the purposes and substantive obligations under the Arkansas  
21 Comprehensive Testing, Assessment, and Accountability Program;

22 (5) To facilitate this transition, amendments to the existing  
23 statutory framework are necessary to update terminology and provide  
24 flexibility in choice of assessments;

25 (6) The existing statutory requirement of high-stakes end-of-  
26 course assessments for Algebra I and English II are duplicative of the  
27 planned assessments that are expected to include:

28 (A) Annual mathematics assessments in grade three (3)  
29 through grade eight (8);

30 (B) End-of-course assessments in Algebra I and geometry;

31 (C) Annual English language arts assessments in grade  
32 three (3) through grade eleven (11); and

33 (C) College and career readiness measurements in both  
34 English language arts in grade eleven (11) and mathematics, including Algebra  
35 II;

36 (7) The total cost of implementing an English II high-stakes

1 end-of-course assessment as required by current law would be in excess of two  
 2 million dollars (\$2,000,000) based on estimates by the Department of  
 3 Education;

4 (8) With the implementation of the next-generation assessments,  
 5 implementation of a separate assessment for English II would be an imprudent  
 6 use of state funds with little or no instructional benefit; and

7 (9) It is in the best interest of the public school students of  
 8 Arkansas to replace existing high-stakes end-of-course assessments for  
 9 Algebra I and English II with the next-generation assessments that will  
 10 determine whether students are college and career ready, as defined in § 6-  
 11 15-419.

12  
 13 SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 6-15-404(j)(2), concerning program  
 14 implementation, is amended to read as follows:

15 (2) The results of ~~general and high-stakes~~ end-of-course testing  
 16 shall become a part of each student's transcript or permanent record and  
 17 shall be recorded on these documents in a manner prescribed by the state  
 18 board.

19  
 20 SECTION 3. The introductory language of Arkansas Code § 6-15-419(15),  
 21 concerning the definition of "general end-of-course assessment", is amended  
 22 to read as follows:

23 (15) "~~General end-of-course~~ End-of-course assessment" means a  
 24 criterion-referenced assessment taken ~~upon successful completion of~~ during a  
 25 course of study set by the State Board of Education:

26  
 27 SECTION 4. Arkansas Code § 6-15-419(19), concerning the definition of  
 28 "high-stakes end-of-course assessment", is repealed:

29 ~~(19) "High-stakes end-of-course assessment" means a criterion-~~  
 30 ~~referenced assessment taken upon the successful completion of both the~~  
 31 ~~Algebra I and the English II course of study under § 6-15-433(b)(3)(A)(iii);~~  
 32 ~~(A) To determine whether a student demonstrates, according~~  
 33 ~~to a requisite scale score established by rule of the state board, attainment~~  
 34 ~~of sufficient knowledge and skills to indicate a necessary and satisfactory~~  
 35 ~~passing standard of the subject level content in that particular end-of-~~  
 36 ~~course assessment; and~~

1                   ~~(B) For which failure to meet the requisite scale score~~  
 2 ~~requires that the student shall not receive academic credit for the course of~~  
 3 ~~study for which the assessment was taken until the student meets the~~  
 4 ~~requisite scale score on the initial, a subsequent, or an alternative high-~~  
 5 ~~stakes end-of-course assessment as allowed or required by Arkansas law or by~~  
 6 ~~state board rules;~~

7  
 8           SECTION 5. Arkansas Code § 6-15-419, concerning definitions of the  
 9 Arkansas Comprehensive Testing, Assessment, and Accountability Program, is  
 10 amended to add a new subdivision to read as follows:

11                   (37) "College and career readiness measurement" means a set of  
 12 criteria-referenced measurements of a student's acquisition of the knowledge  
 13 and skills the student needs to be successful in future endeavors, including  
 14 credit-bearing, first-year courses at a postsecondary institution, such as  
 15 two-year or four-year college, trade school, or technical school, or to  
 16 embark on a career.

17  
 18           SECTION 6. Arkansas Code § 6-15-420(a), concerning remediation and  
 19 intervention, is amended to read as follows:

20                   ~~(a)(1)~~ In order for students to be academically prepared to achieve  
 21 proficiency in ~~reading and writing literacy~~ English language arts and  
 22 mathematics, the Department of Education shall require each public school  
 23 serving students in kindergarten through grade four (K-4) to develop, select,  
 24 and implement ongoing, informal assessments ~~linked to the Arkansas frameworks~~  
 25 corresponding to the Common Core State Standards.

26                   ~~(2) Literacy assessment training and mathematics assessment~~  
 27 ~~training utilizing research-based diagnostic instruments or tools will be~~  
 28 ~~provided for teachers by the department. Where grant funds are available in~~  
 29 ~~the areas of highest need, a literacy coordinator may be trained.~~

30  
 31           SECTION 7. Arkansas Code § 6-15-433(b)(3)(A), concerning the statewide  
 32 assessment program, is amended to read as follows:

33                   (3)(A) Implement student achievement ~~testing~~ assessment as part  
 34 of the statewide assessment program, to be administered annually to measure  
 35 ~~reading, writing,~~ English language arts and mathematics, and includes:

36                           (i) Developmentally appropriate ~~testing~~ measurements

1 or assessments for grades kindergarten through two (K-2);

2 (ii) Either:

3 (a) Developmentally appropriate augmented,  
4 criterion-referenced, or norm-referenced assessments in kindergarten through  
5 grade twelve (K-12), as determined by the state board and as required by law;  
6 or

7 (b) Other assessments that are based on  
8 researched best practices as determined by qualified experts that would be in  
9 compliance with federal and state law;

10 ~~(iii)(a) High stakes end-of-course assessments~~  
11 ~~administered under § 6-15-2009 for Algebra I and English II only.~~

12 ~~(b) The state board shall identify by rule~~  
13 ~~Algebra I and English II high stakes courses and establish the high stakes~~  
14 ~~end-of-course assessments;~~

15 (iii) College and career readiness measurements in  
16 English language arts and mathematics as determined by state board rules;

17 ~~(iv) General end-of-course~~ End-of-course assessments  
18 administered for other content course subject areas as determined by state  
19 board rule; and

20 (v) Any other assessments required by the state  
21 board.

22  
23 SECTION 8. Arkansas Code § 6-15-441 is amended to read as follows:

24 6-15-441. Arkansas College and Career Readiness Planning Program.

25 (a) As used in this section:

26 (1) "College and career readiness" means ~~that a student is~~  
27 ~~academically ready to succeed in college level courses or in the workforce~~  
28 ~~without the need to enroll in remedial courses during the student's first~~  
29 ~~year~~ the acquisition of the knowledge and skills a student needs to be  
30 successful in future endeavors, including:

31 (A) Successfully completing credit-bearing, first-year  
32 courses at a postsecondary institution; and

33 (B) Embarking on a chosen career;

34 (2) "College and career readiness assessment" means a test ~~of~~  
35 ~~student educational development~~ that measures student readiness for ~~future~~  
36 postsecondary learning that is used by and is:

1                   (A) Institutions Administered under this section; or  
 2                   (B) Used by an institution of higher education as part of  
 3 ~~their~~ its admissions, placement, and scholarship processes; ~~and~~

4                   ~~(B) High schools to improve college and workforce~~  
 5 ~~readiness;~~

6                   (3) "EXPLORE" means the pre-ACT assessment designed by ACT, Inc.  
 7 to help students in grade eight (8) explore a broad range of options for  
 8 their future and focus not only on high school coursework but also on post-  
 9 high school choices as well;

10                  (4) "PLAN" means the pre-ACT assessment for students in grade  
 11 ten (10) used to help a student focus attention on improved academic  
 12 achievement, career preparation, and planning for post-high school years; and

13                  (5) "PSAT" means the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship  
 14 Qualifying Test that provides practice for the SAT Reasoning Test and gives  
 15 students feedback on individual strengths and weaknesses on college readiness  
 16 skills.

17                  (b)(1)(A) ~~Beginning with the 2010-2011 school year, each~~ A public  
 18 school that serves students in grade eight (8) shall administer EXPLORE to  
 19 each student enrolled in grade eight (8) at the public school.

20                  (B) ~~Beginning with the 2010-2011 school year, each~~ A  
 21 public school that serves students in grade ten (10) shall administer PLAN or  
 22 the PSAT to each student enrolled in grade ten (10) at the public school.

23                  (2) Funding for the college and career readiness assessments  
 24 listed in subdivision (b)(1) of this section may be paid by using Department  
 25 of Education at-risk funding.

26                  (3)(A) The department may designate alternative assessments  
 27 other than EXPLORE, PLAN, or PSAT to satisfy the purposes of this section.

28                  (B) The alternative assessments may include without  
 29 limitation next-generation assessments as approved by the State Board of  
 30 Education.

31                  (c)(1) Each public school administering the college and career  
 32 readiness assessments under this section shall use the college and career  
 33 readiness assessments to:

34                         (A) Assist students with college and ~~workforce~~ career  
 35 readiness skills, course selection in high school, and improved academic  
 36 achievement; and

1 (B) Provide the basis for the counseling under § 6-16-603  
 2 concerning postsecondary preparatory programs.

3 (2) Each public school shall fully incorporate the results from  
 4 college and career readiness assessments listed in ~~subdivision (b)(1)~~  
 5 subsection (b) of this section into the college and career planning process  
 6 for each student.

7 (d) Data collection shall be maintained by the Department of Education  
 8 for the purpose of:

- 9 (1) Increasing college and career readiness skills;
- 10 (2) Improving instruction;
- 11 (3) Enhancing school improvement plans;
- 12 (4) Reducing the college remediation rates of students; and
- 13 (5) Developing and implementing postsecondary preparatory

14 programs under § 6-16-601 et seq.

15 (e)(1) The department shall report to the House Committee on Education  
 16 and the Senate Committee on Education no later than December 31 of each year  
 17 on the:

18 (A) Implementation and effectiveness of the Arkansas  
 19 College and Career Readiness Planning Program; and

20 (B) Statistical analysis of postsecondary preparatory  
 21 programs under § 6-16-601 et seq. for each postsecondary preparatory program.

22 (2) The report may be posted on the department’s website with a  
 23 notification to the committees.

24 (f) ~~The department shall~~ State Board of Education may promulgate rules  
 25 to implement this section and shall monitor the use of college and career  
 26 readiness assessments administered under this section to ensure public school  
 27 compliance.

28  
 29 SECTION 9. Arkansas Code § 6-15-2009(a), concerning public school  
 30 assessments and remediation, is amended to read as follows:

31 (a)(1) Each student shall participate in the statewide program of  
 32 educational assessment required in §§ 6-15-419, 6-15-433, and this section  
 33 and by the State Board of Education.

34 (2) Each student in grades three through eight (3-8) shall  
 35 participate in ~~those benchmark~~ assessments required in §§ 6-15-419, 6-15-433,  
 36 and this section and by the state board.

1           (3) Students in appropriate grades shall participate in the  
2 ~~general~~ end-of-course assessments and ~~high-stakes end-of-course assessments~~  
3 college and career readiness measurements required by §§ 6-15-419 and 6-15-  
4 433 as established by the state board and this section.

5           (4)(A) The state board shall determine the requisite scale score  
6 of student performance on each assessment or measurement required in  
7 subdivisions (a)(1)-(3) of this section.

8           (B) ~~The requisite scale score for any high-stakes end-of-~~  
9 ~~course assessment shall be set only at the cut score necessary to demonstrate~~  
10 ~~the minimum satisfactory passing level of that subject~~ state board shall make  
11 its determination of the requisite scale score of student performance on  
12 college and career readiness measurements used for college placement in  
13 conjunction with the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

14           ~~(5) The state board shall establish by rule the requisite scale~~  
15 ~~score for a general end-of-course assessment and the requisite scale score~~  
16 ~~for high-stakes end-of-course assessments.~~

17  
18           SECTION 10. Arkansas Code § 6-15-2009(c), concerning public school  
19 assessments and remediation, is amended to read as follows:

20           (c)(1) ~~Beginning with the 2009-2010 school year, a~~ A student required  
21 to take ~~a general~~ an end-of-course assessment who is identified as not  
22 meeting the requisite scale score for a particular assessment shall  
23 participate in the remediation activities as required in the student's  
24 individualized academic improvement plan in the school year that the  
25 assessment results are reported in order to receive academic credit on his or  
26 her transcript for the course related to the end-of-course assessment.

27           (2) The individualized academic improvement plan shall include  
28 remediation activities focused on those areas in which a student failed to  
29 ~~pass a general~~ meet the requisite scale score of an end-of-course assessment.

30           ~~(3)(A)~~ A student who is identified as not meeting the requisite  
31 scale score for ~~a general~~ an end-of-course assessment shall not receive  
32 academic credit on his or her transcript for the course related to the  
33 ~~general~~ end-of-course assessment until the student is identified as having  
34 participated in remediation through an individualized academic improvement  
35 plan.

36           ~~(B) For the purpose of a general end-of-course assessment,~~



1 ~~remediation does not require that a student pass a subsequent end-of-course~~  
2 ~~assessment in order to receive academic credit for a course.~~

3  
4 SECTION 11. Arkansas Code § 6-15-2009(d) and (e), concerning public  
5 school assessments and remediation, are amended to read as follows:

6 ~~(d)(1)(A)(i) Beginning with the 2009-2010 school year, all initial~~  
7 ~~high-stakes end-of-course assessments for Algebra I shall be administered by~~  
8 ~~grade ten (10).~~

9 ~~(ii) Beginning with the 2014-2015 school year, all~~  
10 ~~initial high-stakes end-of-course assessments for English II shall be~~  
11 ~~administered by grade ten (10).~~

12 ~~(iii) A student from an Arkansas public school who~~  
13 ~~completed and received academic credit on an end-of-course assessment for~~  
14 ~~Algebra I before the 2009-2010 school year or for English II before the 2014-~~  
15 ~~2015 school year is not required to participate in and receive academic~~  
16 ~~credit from a high-stakes end-of-course assessment on or after the 2009-2010~~  
17 ~~school year for Algebra I or on or after the 2014-2015 school year for~~  
18 ~~English II.~~

19 ~~(iv) A student transferring into an Arkansas public~~  
20 ~~school on or after 2009-2010 for Algebra I or 2014-2015 for English II who~~  
21 ~~can demonstrate by official transcript from an out-of-state public, private,~~  
22 ~~or home school or an Arkansas private or home school that he or she has~~  
23 ~~previously obtained academic credit for Algebra I or English II is not~~  
24 ~~required to participate in and receive academic credit from an initial high-~~  
25 ~~stakes end-of-course assessment unless the public school district assesses~~  
26 ~~the student's educational status and determines the student does not possess~~  
27 ~~the requisite passing knowledge of Algebra I or English II.~~

28 ~~(B)(i) Beginning with the 2009-2010 school year, an~~  
29 ~~Arkansas public school student who is not in grade ten (10), grade eleven~~  
30 ~~(11), or grade twelve (12) in an Arkansas public school and has not~~  
31 ~~previously received proper academic credit on his or her transcript for~~  
32 ~~Algebra I but has successfully completed an Algebra I course is required to~~  
33 ~~complete and successfully meet the requisite scale score on a high-stakes~~  
34 ~~end-of-course assessment before the student is entitled to receive academic~~  
35 ~~credit on his or her transcript for Algebra I.~~

36 ~~(ii) Only a student who is in grade ten (10), grade~~

1 eleven (11), or grade twelve (12) in an Arkansas public school in the 2009-  
2 2010 school year is exempt from the requirement of taking a high-stakes  
3 Algebra I end-of-course assessment, but the student shall meet any general  
4 end-of-course assessment requirements for Algebra I.

5 (iii) Any other student, regardless of the school  
6 year or the grade level in which he or she completes an Algebra I course or,  
7 beginning with the 2014-2015 school year, the English II course, shall  
8 successfully complete an Algebra I and English II high-stakes end-of-course  
9 assessment and meet the requisite scale score in order to be entitled to  
10 receive academic credit for Algebra I or English II on the student's  
11 transcript, unless exempted under an individualized education program.

12 (iv) A student transferring into an Arkansas public  
13 school district without having obtained academic credit on his or her  
14 transcript in or after the 2009-2010 school year for Algebra I and in or  
15 after the 2014-2015 school year for English II is not exempt from the  
16 requirements of subdivision (d)(1)(B)(iii) of this section.

17 (C) Beginning with the 2014-2015 school year, an Arkansas  
18 public school student who is in grade ten (10) and who has not previously  
19 received academic credit under (d)(1)(A) for English II shall successfully  
20 complete the course and meet the requisite scale score on the English II  
21 high-stakes end-of-course assessment in order for the student to be entitled  
22 to receive academic credit for English II on the student's transcript.

23 (D)(i) A student who does not meet the requisite scale  
24 score on the relevant high-stakes end-of-course assessment shall participate  
25 in an individualized academic improvement plan.

26 (ii) An individualized academic improvement plan  
27 shall include research-based remediation activities and multiple  
28 opportunities for the student to take and pass subsequent high-stakes end-of-  
29 course assessments as long as the student remains enrolled in an Arkansas  
30 public school and has not reached twenty-one (21) years of age.

31 (iii) If after two subsequent high-stakes end-of-  
32 course assessments a student does not meet the requisite scale score on the  
33 initial high-stakes end-of-course assessment, the student shall participate  
34 in strand analysis or formative analysis remediation provided and supported  
35 by the department before taking a third or subsequent high-stakes end-of-  
36 course assessment.



1                   ~~(ii) An alternative assessment shall be an ACT~~  
 2 ~~assessment, SAT assessment, advanced placement test, or International~~  
 3 ~~Baccalaureate test.~~

4                   ~~(2)(A) A student identified as having not met the requisite~~

 7 ~~student meets the requirements of subdivision (e)(1) of this section.~~

8                   ~~(B) If a student does not meet the requisite scale score~~  
 9 ~~on an end of course assessment and does not satisfy the remedial requirements~~  
 10 ~~of subsection (e) of this section for general end of course assessments and~~  
 11 ~~subdivision (e)(1) of this section for high stakes end of course assessments,~~  
 12 ~~the student shall not be entitled to graduate with a high school diploma from~~  
 13 ~~an Arkansas public high school or public charter school.~~

14  
 15           SECTION 12. Arkansas Code § 6-15-2009(f)(1), concerning public school  
 16 assessments and remediation, is amended to read as follows:

17           ~~(f)(1)(A)(e)(1) The state board shall establish the high stakes end-~~  
 18 ~~of-course assessment program required in subsection (d) of this section for~~  
 19 ~~Algebra I beginning in the 2009-2010 school year and for English II beginning~~  
 20 ~~in the 2014-2015 school year.~~

21           ~~(B) Throughout this process, the The end-of-course~~  
 22 ~~assessment program shall be maintained in such a manner as to meet the~~  
 23 ~~requirements of state and federal law, including the full range of students~~  
 24 ~~with disabilities.~~

25  
 26           SECTION 13. Arkansas Code § 6-15-2009(f)(3) through (5), concerning  
 27 public school assessments and remediation, is amended to read as follows:

28           (3) Each year the department shall make public ~~at least fifty~~  
 29 ~~percent (50%) of the test questions on the most recent initial benchmark and~~  
 30 ~~end-of-course assessments item and task prototypes for the English language~~  
 31 ~~arts and mathematics assessments required by this section or a selection of~~  
 32 ~~actual items and tasks from the most recent assessments.~~

33           (4) The state board shall promulgate rules to establish cut  
 34 scores, remediation programs required in ~~(d)(1)(D)~~ this section, and other  
 35 components of the ~~general end of course~~ state assessment program ~~and high-~~  
 36 ~~stakes end of course assessment program~~ necessary to administer the

1 provisions of this ~~subsection~~ section.

2 (5)(A) Each school year, the department shall establish and  
3 publish by commissioner's memo an ~~end-of-course~~ assessment cycle for ~~general~~  
4 ~~end-of-course assessments and high stakes end-of-course~~ state-required  
5 assessments that a public school district shall follow unless the public  
6 school district has obtained a written waiver from the department.

7 ~~(B) The end-of-course assessment cycle shall include an~~  
8 ~~assessment cycle for a student who does not meet the requisite scale score~~  
9 ~~for an initial high stakes end-of-course assessment and is required under~~  
10 ~~this section to pass a subsequent end-of-course assessment before receiving~~  
11 ~~academic credit on the student's transcript for the course that corresponds~~  
12 ~~to the initial end-of-course assessment.~~

13  
14 SECTION 14. Arkansas Code § 6-15-2009(f)(8) and (9), concerning public  
15 school assessments and remediation, is repealed.

16 ~~(8) Within fifteen (15) business days from the date a public~~  
17 ~~school district receives a student's score that indicates the student did not~~  
18 ~~meet the requisite scale score on an initial and subsequent end-of-course~~  
19 ~~assessment required by this section, the public school district shall provide~~  
20 ~~written notice of the failure to the student's parent or guardian.~~

21 ~~(9) If a student with disabilities identified under the~~  
22 ~~Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C. § 1400 et seq., is~~  
23 ~~unable to meet the requirements of this section because of the nature of the~~  
24 ~~student's disabilities, the student may graduate from high school by~~

28 SECTION 15. Arkansas Code § 6-16-601(a)(1) through (3), concerning  
29 definitions for postsecondary preparatory programs, is amended to read as  
30 follows:

31 (a) As used in this section:

32 (1) "College and career readiness assessment" means ~~a test that~~  
33 ~~measures student readiness for postsecondary learning and is~~ a set of  
34 criterion-referenced measurements of a student's acquisition of the knowledge  
35 and skills the student needs to be successful in future endeavors, including:

36 ~~(A) Administered under the Arkansas College and Career~~

2 ~~(B) Used by institutions of higher education as part of~~  
3 ~~their admissions, placement, and scholarship processes;~~

23 other assessments, no later than the 2015-2016 school year.

25 SECTION 23. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the  
26 General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that it is the state's  
27 constitutional obligation to provide a general, suitable, and efficient free  
28 system of public schools in the state; that the transition from the state's  
29 existing assessment program to a common set of next-generation assessments in  
30 English language arts and mathematics is critical to the delivery of a  
31 constitutionally adequate education; and that this act is immediately  
32 necessary for school districts and educators to prepare for the  
33 implementation of the new assessment system. Therefore, an emergency is  
34 declared to exist, and this act being immediately necessary for the  
35 preservation of the public peace, health, and safety shall become effective

1       (1) The date of its approval by the Governor;

2       (2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor, the  
3 expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the bill;
