2	state's assessment program to a common set of next-generation assessments in
3	English language arts and mathematics as approved by the state board;
4	(3) When fully implemented, these next-generation assessments
5	will:
6	(A) Determine whether students are college and career
7	ready or on track;
8	(B) Assess the full range of the Common Core State
9	<u>Standards;</u>
10	(C) Measure the full range of student performance,
11	including the performance of high-performing and low-performing students;
12	(D) Provide data to inform instruction, interventions, and
13	professional development;
14	(E) Provide data for accountability, including measures of
15	growth; and
16	(F) Incorporate innovative approaches throughout the
17	assessment system;
18	(4) The next-generation assessments will improve on the
19	consistency, frequency, and rigor of the state's existing assessment system
20	while meeting the purposes and substantive obligations under the Arkansas
21	Comprehensive Testing, Assessment, and Accountability Program;
22	(5) To facilitate this transition, amendments to the existing
23	statutory framework are necessary to update terminology and provide
24	flexibility in choice of assessments;
25	(6) The existing statutory requirement of high-stakes end-of-
26	course assessments for Algebra I and English II are duplicative of the
27	planned assessments that are expected to include:
28	(A) Annual mathematics assessments in grade three (3)
29	through grade eight (8);
30	(B) End-of-course assessments in Algebra I and geometry;
31	(C) Annual English language arts assessments in grade
32	three (3) through grade eleven (11); and
33	(C) College and career readiness measurements in both
34	English language arts in grade eleven (11) and mathematics, including Algebra
35	<u>11;</u>
36	(7) The total cost of implementing an English II high-stakes

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1 end-of-course assessment as required by current law would be in excess of two 2 million dollars (\$2,000,000) based on estimates by the Department of 3 Education; 4 (8) With the implementation of the next-generation assessments, 5 implementation of a separate assessment for English II would be an imprudent 6 use of state funds with little or no instructional benefit; and 7 (9) It is in the best interest of the public school students of 8 Arkansas to replace existing high-stakes end-of-course assessments for 9 Algebra I and English II with the next-generation assessments that will 10 determine whether students are college and career ready, as defined in § 6-11 15-419. 12 13 SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 6-15-404(j)(2), concerning program 14 implementation, is amended to read as follows: 15 (2) The results of general and high-stakes end-of-course testing 16 shall become a part of each student's transcript or permanent record and 17 shall be recorded on these documents in a manner prescribed by the state 18 board. 19 20 SECTION 3. The introductory language of Arkansas Code § 6-15-419(15), 21 concerning the definition of "general end-of-course assessment", is amended 22 to read as follows: 23 (15) "General end-of-course End-of-course assessment" means a 24 criterion-referenced assessment taken upon successful completion of during a 25 course of study set by the State Board of Education: 26 27 SECTION 4. Arkansas Code § 6-15-419(19), concerning the definition of 28 "high-stakes end-of-course assessment", is repealed: 29 (19) "High-stakes end-of-course assessment" means a criterion-30 referenced assessment taken upon the successful completion of both the 31 Algebra I and the English II course of study under § 6-15-433(b)(3)(A)(iii): 32  $(\Lambda)$  To determine whether a student demonstrates, according 33 to a requisite scale score established by rule of the state board, attainment 34 of sufficient knowledge and skills to indicate a necessary and satisfactory 35 passing standard of the subject level content in that particular end-of-36 course assessment; and

1 (B) For which failure to meet the requisite scale score 2 requires that the student shall not receive academic credit for the course of study for which the assessment was taken until the student meets the 3 4 requisite scale score on the initial, a subsequent, or an alternative high-5 stakes end-of-course assessment as allowed or required by Arkansas law or by 6 state board rules; 7 8 SECTION 5. Arkansas Code § 6-15-419, concerning definitions of the 9 Arkansas Comprehensive Testing, Assessment, and Accountability Program, is 10 amended to add a new subdivision to read as follows: 11 (37) "College and career readiness measurement" means a set of 12 criterion-referenced measurements of a student's acquisition of the knowledge 13 and skills the student needs to be successful in future endeavors, including 14 credit-bearing, first-year courses at a postsecondary institution, such as 15 two-year or four-year college, trade school, or technical school, or to 16 embark on a career. 17 18 SECTION 6. Arkansas Code § 6-15-420(a), concerning remediation and 19 intervention, is amended to read as follows: 20 (a) (1) In order for students to be academically prepared to achieve 21 proficiency in reading and writing literacy English language arts and 22 mathematics, the Department of Education shall require each public school 23 serving students in kindergarten through grade four (K-4) to develop, select, 24 and implement ongoing, informal assessments linked to the Arkansas frameworks 25 corresponding to the Common Core State Standards. 26 (2) Literacy assessment training and mathematics assessment 27 training utilizing research-based diagnostic instruments or tools will be provided for teachers by the department. Where grant funds are available in 28 29 the areas of highest need, a literacy coordinator may be trained. 30 31 SECTION 7. Arkansas Code § 6-15-433(b)(3)(A), concerning the statewide 32 assessment program, is amended to read as follows: 33 (3)(A) Implement student achievement testing assessment as part 34 of the statewide assessment program, to be administered annually to measure 35 reading, writing, English language arts and mathematics, and includes: 36 (i) Developmentally appropriate testing measurements

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1 or assessments for grades kindergarten through two (K-2); 2 (ii) Either: 3 (a) Developmentally appropriate augmented, 4 criterion-referenced, or norm-referenced assessments in kindergarten through 5 grade twelve (K-12), as determined by the state board and as required by law; 6 or 7 (b) Other assessments that are based on 8 researched best practices as determined by qualified experts that would be in 9 compliance with federal and state law; 10 (iii)(a) High-stakes end-of-course assessments 11 administered under § 6-15-2009 for Algebra I and English II only. 12 (b) The state board shall identify by rule 13 Algebra I and English II high-stakes courses and establish the high-stakes 14 end-of-course assessments; 15 (iii) College and career readiness measurements in 16 English language arts and mathematics as determined by state board rules; 17 (iv) General end-of-course End-of-course assessments 18 administered for other content course subject areas as determined by state 19 board rule; and 20 (v) Any other assessments required by the state 21 board. 22 23 SECTION 8. Arkansas Code § 6-15-441 is amended to read as follows: 24 6-15-441. Arkansas College and Career Readiness Planning Program. 25 (a) As used in this section: 26 (1) "College and career readiness" means that a student is 27 academically ready to succeed in college-level courses or in the workforce 28 without the need to enroll in remedial courses during the student's first 29 year the acquisition of the knowledge and skills a student needs to be 30 successful in future endeavors, including: 31 (A) Successfully completing credit-bearing, first-year 32 courses at a postsecondary institution; and 33 (B) Embarking on a chosen career; 34 "College and career readiness assessment" means a test of (2) 35 student educational development that measures student readiness for future 36 postsecondary learning that is used by and is:

1 (A) Institutions Administered under this section; or 2 (B) Used by an institution of higher education as part of 3 their its admissions, placement, and scholarship processes; and 4 (B) High schools to improve college and workforce 5 readiness; 6 (3) "EXPLORE" means the pre-ACT assessment designed by ACT, Inc. 7 to help students in grade eight (8) explore a broad range of options for 8 their future and focus not only on high school coursework but also on post-9 high school choices as well; 10 (4) "PLAN" means the pre-ACT assessment for students in grade 11 ten (10) used to help a student focus attention on improved academic 12 achievement, career preparation, and planning for post-high school years; and 13 (5) "PSAT" means the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship 14 Qualifying Test that provides practice for the SAT Reasoning Test and gives 15 students feedback on individual strengths and weaknesses on college readiness 16 skills. 17 (b)(1)(A) Beginning with the 2010-2011 school year, each A public 18 school that serves students in grade eight (8) shall administer EXPLORE to 19 each student enrolled in grade eight (8) at the public school. 20 (B) Beginning with the 2010-2011 school year, each A 21 public school that serves students in grade ten (10) shall administer PLAN or 22 the PSAT to each student enrolled in grade ten (10) at the public school. 23 (2) Funding for the college and career readiness assessments 24 listed in subdivision (b)(1) of this section may be paid by using Department 25 of Education at-risk funding. 26 (3)(A) The department may designate alternative assessments 27 other than EXPLORE, PLAN, or PSAT to satisfy the purposes of this section. (B) The alternative assessments may include without 28 29 limitation next-generation assessments as approved by the State Board of 30 Education. 31 (c)(1) Each public school administering the college and career 32 readiness assessments under this section shall use the college and career 33 readiness assessments to: 34 (A) Assist students with college and workforce career 35 readiness skills, course selection in high school, and improved academic 36 achievement; and

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1 (B) Provide the basis for the counseling under § 6-16-603 2 concerning postsecondary preparatory programs. (2) Each public school shall fully incorporate the results from 3 4 college and career readiness assessments listed in subdivision (b)(1) 5 subsection (b) of this section into the college and career planning process 6 for each student. 7 (d) Data collection shall be maintained by the Department of Education 8 for the purpose of: 9 (1) Increasing college and career readiness skills; 10 (2) Improving instruction; 11 (3) Enhancing school improvement plans; 12 (4) Reducing the college remediation rates of students; and 13 (5) Developing and implementing postsecondary preparatory 14 programs under § 6-16-601 et seq. 15 (e)(1) The department shall report to the House Committee on Education 16 and the Senate Committee on Education no later than December 31 of each year 17 on the: 18 (A) Implementation and effectiveness of the Arkansas 19 College and Career Readiness Planning Program; and 20 (B) Statistical analysis of postsecondary preparatory 21 programs under § 6-16-601 et seq. for each postsecondary preparatory program. 22 (2) The report may be posted on the department's website with a 23 notification to the committees. 24 The department shall State Board of Education may promulgate rules (f) 25 to implement this section and shall monitor the use of college and career 26 readiness assessments administered under this section to ensure public school 27 compliance. 28 29 SECTION 9. Arkansas Code § 6-15-2009(a), concerning public school assessments and remediation, is amended to read as follows: 30 31 Each student shall participate in the statewide program of (a)(l) 32 educational assessment required in §§ 6-15-419, 6-15-433, and this section 33 and by the State Board of Education. 34 (2) Each student in grades three through eight (3-8) shall participate in those benchmark assessments required in §§ 6-15-419, 6-15-433, 35 36 and this section and by the state board.

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(3) Students in appropriate grades shall participate in the
 general end-of-course assessments and high-stakes end-of-course assessments
 <u>college and career readiness measurements</u> required by §§ 6-15-419 and 6-15 433 as established by the state board and this section.

5 (4)(A) The state board shall determine the requisite scale score
6 of student performance on each assessment <u>or measurement</u> required in
7 subdivisions (a)(1)-(3) of this section.

8 (B) The requisite scale score for any high-stakes end-of-9 course assessment shall be set only at the cut score necessary to demonstrate 10 the minimum satisfactory passing level of that subject state board shall make 11 its determination of the requisite scale score of student performance on 12 college and career readiness measurements used for college placement in 13 conjunction with the Arkansas Higher Education Coordinating Board. 14 (5) The state board shall establish by rule the requisite scale

27 (2) The individualized academic improvement plan shall include
28 remediation activities focused on those areas in which a student failed to
29 pass a general meet the requisite scale score of an end-of-course assessment.

30 (3)(A) A student who is identified as not meeting the requisite 31 scale score for a general an end-of-course assessment shall not receive 32 academic credit on his or her transcript for the course related to the 33 general end-of-course assessment until the student is identified as having 34 participated in remediation through an individualized academic improvement 35 plan.
