8	TO HONOR WILLIE KAVANAUGH HOCKER AS THE CREATOR OF
9	THE ARKANSAS STATE FLAG ON THE 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF
10	THE FLAG; TO PROCLAIM FEBRUARY 26, 2013, AS WILLIE
11	KAVANAUGH HOCKER DAY; AND TO SUPPORT THE
12	ESTABLISHMENT OF A MEMORIAL IN WABBASEKA, ARKANSAS,
13	HONORING WILLIE KAVANAUGH HOCKER AND THE OFFICIAL
14	STATE FLAG THAT SHE DESIGNED.

18	TO HONOR WILLIE KAVANAUGH HOCKER AS THE
19	CREATOR OF THE ARKANSAS STATE FLAG; TO
20	COMMEMORATE THE 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE
21	ARKANSAS STATE FLAG; AND TO SUPPORT AN
22	APPROPRIATE MEMORIAL IN WABBASEKA,
23	ARKANSAS.
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27	WHEREAS, Willie Kavanaugh Hocker was born on July 21, 1862, in Madison
28	County, Kentucky, moved with her family to Arkansas in 1870, taught school in
29	Pine Bluff and Wabbaseka for 34 years and established residences in both
30	cities, was a published poet and short story author, best known for her poems
31	"Arkansas" and "Ozark Mountaineer", and died in her home in Wabbaseka on
32	February 6, 1944; and
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34	WHEREAS, Willie Hocker represented Arkansas at the National Federation
35	of Business and Professional Women Clubs' Pageant of Famous Women of the
36	United States in 1929, was a longtime member of the Daughters of the American

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1	Revolution, and on October 14, 1938, the respected educator was honored by
2	the Wabbaseka School Board's dedication of the first modern brick building in
3	Jefferson County, a newly built high school in her honor; and
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5	WHEREAS, in the early 1900's the U.S.S. Arkansas was a newly
6	commissioned Navy battleship, and the roots of the official state flag, which
7	originated in Jefferson County, can be traced to 1912 when the Pine Bluff
8	Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution resolved to present a
9	naval battalion ensign and a state flag for the new ship; and
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11	WHEREAS, at the chapter's urging, Secretary of State Earl W. Hodges
12	initiated a contest seeking potential designs for the flag and agreed to
13	chair a legislative committee to select the winning design; and
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15	WHEREAS, in 1913 the committee chose a red, white, and blue design
16	submitted by Willie Hocker of Wabbaseka, Arkansas, from among 65 entries, and
17	Willie Hocker is one of only two women in the United States to have her
18	design adopted as an official state flag; and
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20	WHEREAS, the design featured a rectangular red field upon which was
21	centered a white rhombus diamond bordered by twenty-five white stars on a
22	blue band, three blue stars centered on the flag's horizontal axis on a white
23	field within the rhombus completing the plan, and the three blue stars in the
24	center field bore several meanings: first, that Arkansas had successively
25	belonged to the three countries of France, Spain, and the United States
26	before statehood; second, that 1803 was the year of the Louisiana Purchase,
27	which included present-day Arkansas; and third, that Arkansas was the third
28	state created from the Louisiana Purchase; and
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30	WHEREAS, the design's twenty-five white stars symbolized that Arkansas
31	was the twenty-fifth state admitted to the Union; and the diamond marked
32	Arkansas's status as the nation's only diamond-producing state; and
33	
34	WHEREAS, the committee decreed that the flag ought to bear the state's
35	name; the designer of the flag assented and suggested that the three blue
36	stars be arranged with one above the name and two below; on February 26,

1 1913, the General Assembly adopted the design as the state's official flag; 2 the design remained unchanged until 1923, when the General Assembly added a 3 fourth star to the central diamond to represent Arkansas's membership in the 4 Confederate States of America; at first, the stars were arranged with two 5 above and two below the state's name, but the Second Extraordinary Session in 6 1924 placed three stars below and one above, with the three lower stars 7 arranged as an inverted triangle and a new element of symbolism was added by 8 the twin stars immediately below the state's name, suggesting the twin 9 relationship of Arkansas and Michigan, which were admitted to the Union 10 within approximately seven months of each other, maintaining the balance 11 between free and slave states in Congress; and 12 13 WHEREAS, the Arkansas state flag is today flown over thousands of 14 governmental and private locations throughout the state and the State of 15 Arkansas is proud to observe the 100th anniversary of the adoption of the 16 official state flag, 17 18 NOW THEREFORE, 19 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE EIGHTY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE 20 STATE OF ARKANSAS: 21 22 THAT the Senate honors the memory and accomplishments of Willie 23 Kavanaugh Hocker as the mother of the Arkansas state flag and salutes the 24 100th anniversary of the flag. 25 26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Senate declares February 26, 2013, Willie 27 Kavanaugh Hocker Day and supports and encourages the establishment of a 28 memorial in her hometown, Wabbaseka, Arkansas, honoring Willie Kavanaugh 29 Hocker and the official flag for the State of Arkansas that she designed. 30 31 32 33 34 35 36
