18	TO RECOGNIZE BETTY FLANAGAN BUMPERS FOR
19	HER WORK TO PROMOTE CHILDHOOD
20	IMMUNIZATION; AND TO ENCOURAGE ARKANSAS
21	FAMILIES TO CONSIDER SERIOUSLY THE
22	IMPORTANCE OF CHILDHOOD IMMUNIZATION.

25	WHEREAS, Betty Bumpers has dedicated her life to addressing issues
26	affecting children's health; and
27	
28	WHEREAS, Mrs. Bumpers is a former elementary school teacher and the
29	wife of former Arkansas Governor and United States Senator Dale Bumpers; and
30	
31	WHEREAS, in 1971, while her husband was governor, Mrs. Bumpers began to
32	work on important issues of health and education affecting Arkansas families
33	and children; and
34	
35	WHEREAS, when Mrs. Bumpers became the First Lady, Arkansas had one of
36	the lowest immunization rates in the nation; and

2	WHEREAS, Mrs. Bumpers spearheaded the Every Child by '74 campaign of
3	volunteers, which immunized over 350,000 Arkansas children in one day,
4	achieving one of the highest immunization rates in the country; and
5	
6	WHEREAS, Mrs. Bumpers moved to Washington D.C. in 1974 after her
7	husband's election to the Senate where she promoted this program as a
8	national model along with help from the White House, Centers for Disease
9	Control and Prevention and the Department of Health and Human Services, known
10	then as the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare; and
11	
12	WHEREAS, in 1991, after a measles epidemic killed over 200 children,
13	Mrs. Bumpers and former First Lady Rosalyn Carter along with the Carter
14	Center launched the national Every Child by Two campaign, with the goal of
15	assuring immunizations for all children by the age of 2, which contributed to
16	an immunization rate of 90% for children under 2; and
17	
18	WHEREAS, in 1999, President Bill Clinton along with Congress created at
19	the National Institutes of Medicine the Betty and Dale Bumpers Vaccine
20	Research Center; and
21	
22	WHEREAS, in 2001, Mrs. Bumpers testified before the United States
23	Senate Health, Labor and Pensions Committee about the need for a systematic
24	delivery of vaccines and supported legislation to require health plans to
25	cover childhood immunizations; and
26	
27	WHEREAS, in light of serious health events currently affecting
28	children's health in our country and the increasing number of children who
29	do not receive essential vaccinations, the Senate encourages Arkansas
30	families to consult with healthcare professionals to discuss the benefits of
31	childhood immunizations and to give serious consideration to the value of
32	childhood immunizations,

34	NOW THEREFORE,
35	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETIETH GENERAL

3	recognizes Betty Flanagan Bumpers for her tireless efforts to promote
