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26	SECTION 1. TEM	PORARY LANGUAGE. DO NOT CODIFY	
27	<u>(a) The Genera</u>	l Assembly finds that:	
28	<u>(1) Agri</u>	culture is the backbone of the s	state's economy;
29	<u>(2) Twen</u>	ty-seven (27) out of every one i	hundred (100) jobs in
30	Arkansas are agricult	ure related;	
31	<u>(3) Arka</u>	nsas is the number one (1) rice	producing state in the
32	nation, growing fifty percent (50%) of the nation's rice and adding more than		
33	six billion dollars (\$6,000,000,000) to the state's o	economy each year;
34	<u>(4) Arka</u>	nsas is the number two (2) soyb	ean producing state in
35	the United States, ad	ding more than two billion dolla	ars (\$2,000,000,000) to
36	the state's economy e	ach vear:	

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1	(5) Arkansas ranks in the top ten (10) poultry-producing and		
2	egg-producing states in the nation;		
3	(6) Forest products added over three billion dollars		
4	(\$3,000,000,000) to the state's economy in 2012, supporting nearly twenty-		
5	five thousand (25,000) jobs;		
6	(7) Just under half of our state's population live in rural		
7	communities;		
8	(8) Although agriculture is the largest business in our state,		
9	Arkansas has not been at the forefront of integrating agriculture-based		
10	education initiatives in our education system;		
11	(9) Innovations in technology and equipment have transformed the		
12	agriculture industry, leaving businesses struggling to find qualified		
13	individuals to fill open positions; and		
14	(10) Creating kindergarten through grade twelve (K-12)		
15	agriculture schools across the state will provide deliberate, focused		
16	instruction that will address the needs of the state's agriculture-based		
17	economy.		
18	(b)(l) The Department of Career Education, in collaboration with the		
19	Department of Education, shall develop, administer, and oversee the		
20	Kindergarten through Grade Twelve (K-12) Agriculture School Pilot Program.		
21	(2) An agriculture school that is part of the pilot program		
22	shall be governed by a single seven (7) member board of directors of		
23	agriculture schools appointed by the Governor.		
24	(3) An agriculture school in the pilot program shall have a		
25	seven (7) member advisory board comprised of representatives from the:		
26	(A) Local agriculture business community;		
27	(B) Institutions of higher education;		
28	(C) Department of Agriculture;		
29	(D) Department of Career Education; and		
30	(E) Department of Education.		
31	(c)(1) To encourage small rural communities to participate in the		
32	pilot program, § 6-13-1501(a)(2) and § 6-13-1502 shall not apply to an		
33	agriculture school that is part of the pilot program.		
34	(2) All other laws and rules applicable to a public school are		
35	applicable to an agriculture school unless specifically exempted under this		
36	chapter.		

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1	(d) The pilot program shall provide for:		
2	(1) A mayor of a municipality, a county judge, or board of		
3	directors of a school district to apply for an agriculture school;		
4	(2) A partnership with an institution of higher education to		
5	expand program offerings and provide opportunities for dual enrollment and		
6	concurrent credit, including industry-based certifications upon graduation		
7	from an agriculture high school;		
8	(3) Students to transfer from other school districts to an		
9	agriculture school;		
10	(4) At least one (1) agriculture school for grades seven through		
11	twelve (7-12) for the 2015-2016 school year;		
12	(5) At least one (1) agriculture school for grades kindergarten		
13	through grade six (K-6) during the 2016-2017 school year; and		
14	(6) An agriculture school to focus on the type of agricultural		
15	industry in the local region.		
16	(e) An agriculture school opened as a part of the Kindergarten through		
17	Grade Twelve (K-12) Agriculture School Pilot Program may receive funding from		
18	the public school fund and other sources as allowed by law.		
19	(f) The Department of Career Education, in collaboration with the		
20	Department of Education, shall adopt rules to administer the Kindergarten		
21	through Grade Twelve Agriculture Pilot Program, including without limitation,		
22	rules that address:		
23	(1) Applications;		
24	(2) Administration; and		
25	(3) Reporting requirements.		
26			
27	SECTION 2. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the		
28	General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that agriculture play a key role in		
29	the state's economy; that there are a limited number of skilled individuals		
30	to fulfill the wide variety of agricultural industry jobs in the state; and		
31	that this act is immediately necessary to ensure that educational		
32	opportunities in the field of agriculture are available to students.		
33	Therefore, an emergency is declared to exist, and this act being immediately		
34	necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety shall		
35	become effective on:		
36	(1) The date of its approval by the Governor;		

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1	(2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor,
2	the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the
3	bill; or
4	(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is
5	overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto.
