7	are used for the purposes delineated in this subdivision (b)(4);

9	and after-school academic programs that are either school-based or school-			
10	linked and that use research-informed and innovative strategies to integrate			
11	program content with curriculum frameworks across a variety of subject areas,			
12	including and the transportation to and from the programs;			
13	(3)(2) Prekindergarten programs			
14	coordinated by the Department of Human Services;			
15	(4)(3) Tutors, teachers' aides,			
16	counselors, social workers, nurses, and curriculum specialists;			
17	(5) Parent education;

30	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 6-20-2305(b)(4)(D)(i), concerning a school				
31	district report on the expenditure of national school lunch state categorical				
32	funds, is amended to read as follows:				
33	(D)(i) By the end of each school year, each school				
34	district shall submit to the Department of Education a report <del>listing</del> that:				
35	(a) Lists each program upon which funds				
36	allocated under this subdivision (b)(4) were expended <del>,</del> ;				

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1		<u>(</u> b)	Identifies the amount expended, for each		
2	program;				
3		<u>(c)</u>	Documents the specific benefit of each		
4	program to the academic progress of low-income students; and				
5		(d)	Includes any other information required by		
6	the Department of Education.				
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
