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32	SECTION 6. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the	
33	General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that funding for public schools is

35	the duty of the General Assembly; and that this act is immediately necessary	
36	to ensure that funding is provided for the 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 school

2	emergency is declared to exist, and this act being immediately necessary for			
3	the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety shall become			
4	effective on:
