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29	SECTION 1. DO N	OT CODIFY. <u>Legislative finding</u>	s and intent.
30	(a) The General	Assembly finds that:	
31	<u>(1) Advan</u>	ced practice registered nurses	are nurses with advanced
32	education and clinical competencies in providing care to diverse populations		
33	in a variety of settings;		
34	<u>(2) Advan</u>	ced practice registered nurses	are nationally certified
35	and practice in all fi	fty (50) states;	
36	<u>(3) Twent</u>	y-one (21) states authorize adv	anced practice

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1	registered nurses to have full practice authority that includes full		
2	prescriptive authority without supervision;		
3	(4) Nearly fifty (50) years of research consistently support the		
4	high quality and cost-effectiveness of advanced practice registered nurses;		
5	(5) Since the 1960s, studies have found no difference in health		
6	outcomes, including patient health status, number of prescriptions written,		
7	return visits requested, or referral to other providers, of care delivered b		
8	an advanced practice registered nurse or physician;		
9	(6) Collaborative practice agreements do not add patient safety		
10	or added value to the healthcare system, but add to the cost of care for the		
11	<pre>consumer;</pre>		
12	(7) Negative impacts of mandatory collaborative practice		
13	agreements include without limitation:		
14	(A) Potential interruption or closing of an advanced		
15	practice registered nurse-operated clinic due to a loss of a collaborative		
16	<pre>practice physician;</pre>		
17	(B) Significant added cost to overhead of the practice due		
18	to higher fees charged by many collaborative physicians;		
19	(C) Added paperwork for the advanced practice registered		
20	nurse and the physician, which adds to the cost of care;		
21	(D) Decreased healthcare access by adding a barrier for		
22	advanced practice registered nurses who would like to establish a new clinic;		
23	(E) Inhibits the establishment of new healthcare access		
24	points in rural and medically underserved areas of the state; and		
25	(F) Acts as a disincentive to remain in the state to		
26	practice for new graduates of Arkansas advanced practice registered nurse		
27	programs;		
28	(8) The following major groups and organizations support full		
29	practice authority for advanced practice registered nurses:		
30	(A) The National Governors Association;		
31	(B) The Institute of Medicine;		
32	(C) The American Association of Retired Persons; and		
33	(D) The Federal Trade Commission; and		
34	(9) The State of Arkansas should modernize scope of practice		
35	laws for advanced practice registered nurses by removing the mandatory		
36	collaborative practice agreement for qualified advanced practice registered		

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1	nurses.
2	(b) It is the intent of the General Assembly to:
3	(1) Increase patient access to health care, reduce healthcare
4	costs, and promote efficient and timely health care in the State of Arkansas;
5	<u>and</u>
6	(2) Authorize qualified advanced practice registered nurses to
7	have full practice authority without a collaborative practice agreement.
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9	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 17-87-310 is amended to read as follows:
10	17-87-310. Prescriptive authority.
11	(a) The Arkansas State Board of Nursing may grant a certificate of
12	prescriptive authority to an advanced practice registered nurse who:
13	(1) Submits proof of successful completion of an Arkansas State
14	Board of Nursing-approved advanced pharmacology course that shall include
15	preceptorial experience in the prescription of drugs, medicines, and
16	therapeutic devices; and
17	(2) <u>Either:</u>
18	(A) Has a collaborative practice agreement with a
19	practicing physician who is licensed under the Arkansas Medical Practices
20	Act, \S 17-95-201 et seq., \S 17-95-301 et seq., and \S 17-95-401 et seq., and
21	who has training in scope, specialty, or expertise to that of the advanced
22	practice registered nurse on file with the Arkansas State Board of Nursing;
23	<u>or</u>
24	(B)(i) Is granted by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing
25	the removal of the collaborative practice agreement requirement if the
26	advanced practice registered nurse applies to the Arkansas State Board of
27	Nursing and has completed three thousand six hundred (3,600) hours of
28	practice experience.
29	(ii) Completion of three thousand six hundred
30	(3,600) hours of practice experience places an advanced practice registered
31	nurse in the status as a qualified advanced practice registered nurse.
32	(b)(l) An advanced practice registered nurse with a certificate of
33	prescriptive authority may receive and prescribe drugs, medicines, or
34	therapeutic devices appropriate to the advanced practice registered nurse's
35	area of practice in accordance with rules established by the Arkansas State
36	Board of Nursing.

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1 (2) An advanced practice registered nurse's prescriptive 2 authority shall extend: 3 (A) For an advanced practice registered nurse in a 4 collaborative practice agreement, only to drugs listed in Schedules III - V and, if expressly authorized by the collaborative practice agreement, also to 5 6 those hydrocodone combination products reclassified from Schedule III to 7 Schedule II as of October 6, 2014; and 8 (B) For a qualified advanced practice registered nurse, to 9 drugs listed in Schedules II - V. 10 (3)(A) The Arkansas State Board of Nursing shall promptly adopt 11 rules applicable to an advance practice registered nurse that are consistent 12 with the Arkansas State Medical Board's rules governing the prescription of 13 dangerous drugs and controlled substances. 14 (B) Prior to approval of the Arkansas State Board of 15 Nursing's rules, the Arkansas State Medical Board shall review the proposed 16 rules and verify that the proposed rules are consistent with the Arkansas 17 State Medical Board's rules concerning the prescription of dangerous drugs 18 and controlled substances. 19 (c) A collaborative practice agreement shall include, but not be 20 limited to, provisions addressing: 21 (1) The availability of the collaborating physician for 22 consultation or referral, or both; 23 (2) Methods of management of the collaborative practice, which 24 shall include protocols for prescriptive authority; 25 (3) Coverage of the healthcare needs of a patient in the 26 emergency absence of the advanced practice registered nurse or physician; and 27 (4) Quality assurance. 28 If a collaborative practice results in complaints of violations of 29 the Arkansas Medical Practices Act, § 17-95-201 et seq., § 17-95-301 et seq., and § 17-95-401 et seq., the Arkansas State Medical Board may review the role 30 31 of the physician in the collaborative practice to determine if the physician is unable to manage his or her responsibilities under the agreement without 32 an adverse effect on the quality of care of the patient. 33 34 (e) If a collaborative practice results in complaints of violations of

this chapter, the Arkansas State Board of Nursing may review the role of the

advanced practice registered nurse in the collaborative practice to determine

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1	if the nurse is unable to manage his or her responsibilities under the
2	agreement without an adverse effect on the quality of care of the patient.
