22	(a) The Genera	1 Assembly finds that:	
23	<u>(1) More</u>	than four thousand six hundred (4,600	O) children are in

25	<u>(2) Ther</u>	e is a shortage of foster homes in Ark	kansas, especially

1	(7) Research shows that close to one-third $(1/3)$ of children in
2	foster care have math and reading skills below grade level and thirty PERCENT
3	(30%) to forty percent (40%) of youth in foster care are in special
4	education; and
5	(8) Children are often forced to change schools when entering
6	the foster care system, which places them at a disadvantage by hindering
7	their ability to form peer networks and support system, causes them to feel
8	stigmatized due to their foster care status, and forces them to resolve
9	different curricula and varying educational expectations.
10	(b) Through the passage of this act, the General Assembly intends:
11	(1) To require preferential consideration for temporary custody
12	to be given to the grandparents of a child if the biological parents of the
13	child are unable to care for the child and the grandparents have no felony
14	convictions;
15	(2) For the Department of Human Services to work closely with
16	the Department of Arkansas State Police for the purpose of processing an
17	immediate background check for grandparents seeking temporary custody of a
18	child following the transfer of the child into the custody of the state under
19	the supervision of the Department of Human Services;
20	(3) For grandparents to receive adoption consideration when
21	parental rights are relinquished, regardless of the age of the grandparents;
22	(4) To lessen the stress on a child who is placed in foster care
23	and to provide continuity of care for the child;
24	(5) To allow the family members of a child placed in foster care
25	to raise the child; and
26	(6) To lessen the burden of care on the state.
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28	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code Title 9, Chapter 28, Subchapter 1, is amended
29	to add an additional section to read as follows:
30	9-28-121. Rights of grandparents.
31	(a) A grandparent of a child who enters the foster care system shall
32	be given rights as a parent of the child for the purpose of receiving:
33	(1) Guardianship of the child; or
34	(2) Adoption consideration if the parental rights of the parent
35	of the child are relinquished.
36	(b) The Division of Children and Family Services of the Department of

3	(1) Parents of the child are unable to take temporary custody of		
4	the child before the child enters the foster care system; and		
5	(2) Grandparent does not have a felony conviction.		
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7	SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATE. This act shall be effective on and after		
8	July 1, 2017.		
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
