24	rate in the United States, with twelve and five-tenths (12.5) per one hundred
25	thousand (100,000) people suffering drug overdose fatalities and prescription
26	drugs are most frequently named in drug-related death certificates; and
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28	WHEREAS, prescription drug overdoses account for at least one (1) death
29	per day in Arkansas; and
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31	WHEREAS, the number of drug overdose deaths in Arkansas, a majority of
32	which are from prescription drugs, has more than doubled since 1999 when the
33	rate was four and four-tenths (4.4) per one hundred thousand (100,000)
34	people; and
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36	WHEREAS, Arkansas ranks 5th in the nation in the percentage of people



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     twelve (12) years of age or older who used prescription pain relievers for
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     nonmedical purposes in 2012-2013, with twenty-two percent(22%) of high school
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     students taking prescription drugs without a doctor's prescription in 2008;
