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19	WHEREAS, the expansion and abuse of federal regulatory authority
20	threaten the constitutional liberties of the citizens of the United States,
21	including those guaranteed by the Bill of Rights in the First, Second,
22	Fourth, and Fifth Amendments of the United States Constitution; and
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24	WHEREAS, federal regulators must be more accountable to elected
25	representatives of the people and not immune from such accountability; and
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27	WHEREAS, the United States House of Representatives has passed with
28	bipartisan support the Regulations from the Executive in Need of Scrutiny Act
29	of 2017, also referred to as the "REINS Act", to require that the United
30	States Congress approve major new federal regulations before they can take
31	effect; and
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33	WHEREAS, even if enacted, a law may be repealed or waived by a future
34	United States Congress and President of the United States; and
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36	WHEREAS, an amendment to the United States Constitution does not



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require the approval of the President of the United States and cannot be waived by a future United States Congress and or a future President of the United States, NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN: THAT the General Assembly urges the United States Congress to vote to propose the following amendment, to be known as the "Regulation Freedom Amendment", to the United States Constitution to read as follows: "Whenever one quarter of the members of the United States House of Representatives or the United States Senate transmits to the President their written declaration of opposition to a proposed federal regulation, it shall require a majority vote of the House of Representatives and the Senate to adopt that regulation." BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be transmitted by the Secretary of the Senate to each member of the United States Congress and the Speaker of the House of Representatives and President of the Senate of each state legislature in the United States.
