31	SECTION 1. DO NO	OT CODIFY. <u>Legislative findings.</u>	
32	The General Asser	nbly finds that:	
33		ight to Read Act, § 6-17-429, add	·
34	reading for current ed	icators and those in an undergrad	uate teaching program;
35	<u>(2) If ed</u>	icators do not have an understand	ing of scientific
36	reading instruction, ma	any students will not receive the	reading instruction

1	necessary to read at grade level;	
2	(3) The percentage of Arkansas students in grade three (3) who	
3	were "ready" or "exceeding" in reading on the 2018 ACT Aspire test was	
4	thirty-eight percent (38%);	
5	(4) Dyslexia programs in Arkansas should be aligned to	
6	structured literacy as outlined by the International Dyslexia Association;	
7	<u>and</u>	
8	(5) Educators throughout the state are in the process of	
9	completing the appropriate professional development requirements with respect	
10	to the science of reading and structured literacy, but public school	
11	districts have not provided those teachers with the necessary materials and	
12	resources to implement the methods required by science of reading and	
13	structured literacy programs in their classrooms.	
14		
15	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code § 6-15-2914(b), concerning the annual	
16	submission of school-level improvement plans, is amended to read as follows:	
17	(b)(1) $\underline{(A)}$ Beginning on May 1, 2018, and by May 1 annually thereafter,	
18	a public school shall submit to its public school district a school-level	
19	improvement plan for approval by the public school district and public school	
20	district board of directors for implementation in the following school year.	
21	(B)(i) A public school district and an open-enrollment	
22	public charter school shall include a literacy plan in the annual school-	
23	level improvement plan required under subdivision (b)(1)(A) of this section.	
24	(ii) The literacy plan required under subdivision	
25	(b)(l)(B)(i) of this section shall include without limitation a curriculum	
26	program and a professional development program that are:	
27	(a) Aligned with the literacy needs of the	
28	public school district; and	
29	(b) Based on the science of reading as defined	
30	by $\S 6-17-429(k)(1)$ .	
31	(2) School-level improvement plans shall be posted on the public	
32	school district's website by August l of each year.

34	SECTION 3. Arkansas Code § 6-17-429(c), concerning the professional	
35	development requirements under the Right to Read Act, is amended to read as	
36	follows:	

Ţ	(c)(1) Beginning with the 2018-2019 school year, a public school		
2	district and an open-enrollment public charter school shall provide the		
3	following professional development in scientific reading instruction:		
4	(A) For teachers licensed at the elementary level $\underline{ ext{in}}$		
5	kindergarten through grade six (K-6), teachers with a special education		
6	license in kindergarten through grade twelve (K-12), and teachers licensed as		
7	reading specialists in kindergarten through grade twelve (K-12), professional		
8	development for one (1) of the prescribed pathways to obtaining a proficiency		
9	credential in knowledge and practices in scientific reading instruction; and		
10	(B) For teachers licensed at a level other than the		
11	elementary level in kindergarten through grade six $(K-6)$ , teachers with a		
12	special education license in kindergarten through grade twelve (K-12), and		
13	teachers licensed as reading specialists in kindergarten through grade twelve		
14	(K-12), professional development for one (1) of the prescribed pathways to		
15	obtaining an awareness credential in knowledge and practices in scientific		
16	reading instruction.		
17	(2) Beginning with the 2020-2021 school year, a public school $\underline{\text{or}}$		
18	open-enrollment public charter school that does not provide the professional		
19	development under subdivision (c)(1) of this section shall:		
20	(A) Be placed in probationary status; and		
21	(B) Provide notice to parents that the public school		
22	district has not met the requirements of this section.		
23			
24	SECTION 4. Arkansas Code § 6-17-429(e)-(g), concerning educator		
25	preparation and professional development programs required under the Right to		
26	Read Act, are amended to read as follows:		
27	(e) A provider of a state-approved educator preparation $ exttt{prop}$		
28	graduate program, or alternative preparation program shall include in its		
29	annual report to the Department of Education a description of the provider's		
30	program to prepare educators to teach reading using scientific reading		
31	instruction.		
32	(f) By the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year, the department		
33	shall identify and create an approved list of materials, resources, and		
34	curriculum programs for public school districts and open-enrollment public		
35	charter schools that are supported by the science of reading and based on		
36	instruction that is explicit, systematic, cumulative, and diagnostic,		

1	including without limitation:		
2	(1) Dyslexia programs that are evidence-based and:		
3	(A) Aligned to structured literacy; or		
4	(B) Grounded in the Orton-Gillingham methodology;		
5	(2) Evidence-based reading intervention programs; and		
6	(3) Evidence-based reading programs that are grounded in the		
7	science of reading.		
8	(g)(1) By the beginning of the 2021-2022 school year, any public		
9	school district and open-enrollment public charter school purchasing a		
10	$\underline{\text{curriculum program shall choose a curriculum program from the department's}}$		
11	approved list of curriculum programs created under subsection (f) of this		
12	section.		
13	(2) A public school district or open-enrollment public charter		
14	school that chooses to purchase a curriculum program that is not from the		
15	department's approved list of curriculum programs shall submit the following		
16	to the department for approval of the alternative curriculum program:		
17	(A) A rationale for choosing the alternative curriculum		
18	program; and		
19	(B) Evidence-based research regarding the alternative		
20	curriculum program.		
21	(h) By the beginning of the 2019-2020 school year, a public school		
22	district and an open-enrollment public charter school shall establish a		
23	professional development program as required by § 6-15-2914(b)(1)(B) that		
24	shall:		
25	(1) Include without limitation instruction based on the science		
26	of reading; and		
27	(2) Be provided on an annual basis after the professional		
28	development required under subdivision (c)(1) of this section is complete.		
29	(f)(1)(A) A public school district or an open-enrollment public		
30	<u>charter school</u> that employs an educator in violation of this section or that		
31	does not provide the professional development as required under this section		
32	shall be in violation of the Standards for Accreditation of Arkansas Public		
33	Schools and School Districts and may be placed in probationary status by the		
34	department.		
35	(B) A public school district or an open-enrollment public		
36	charter school placed in probationary status under subdivision $\frac{(f)(1)(\Lambda)}{(1)(\Lambda)}$		

1	(i)(1)(A) of this section shall send written notification to the parents of
2	the students in the public school district of the reason for being placed in
3	probationary status.
4	(2) A provider of a state-approved educator preparation program
5	graduate program, or alternative preparation program that does not comply
6	with the requirements of this section may be subject to penalties up to and
7	including having the provider's approval status revoked.
8	(g)(j)(1) The department is vested with the authority to and shall
9	enforce:
10	(1) Enforce this section; and
11	(2) The department shall promulgate Promulgate rules to
12	implement this section.
13	(k) As used in this section:
14	(1) "Science of reading" means the study of the relationship
15	between cognitive science and educational outcomes; and
16	(2) "Structured literacy" means an approach by which licensed
17	personnel teach reading in an explicit, systematic, cumulative, and
18	diagnostic manner.
