28	rate in the United States with a drug overdose death rate of fourteen (14)	
29	per one hundred thousand (100,000) people; and

31	WHEREAS, in 2017, four hundred and sixteen (416) deaths occurred in	
32	Arkansas as a result of all types of drug overdoses; and

34	WHEREAS, the number of drug overdose deaths in Arkansas, a majority of	
35	which are from prescription drugs, has more than doubled since 1999 when the	<u> </u>
36	rate was four and four-tenths (4.4) per one hundred thousand (100,000)	



1 people; and 2 3 WHEREAS, Arkansas ranked 3rd in the nation in nonmedical use of 4 prescription pain relievers in the past year among people twelve (1) years of 5 age or older in 2012-2014; and 6 7 WHEREAS, nineteen three-tenths percent (19.3%) of high school students 8 taking prescription drugs without a doctor's prescription or differently than 9 how a doctor told them to use the prescription drug in 2017; and 10 11 WHEREAS, in 2017, Arkansas was ranked 2nd for the amount of opioids 12 prescribed by a state with one hundred five and four-tenths (105.4) opioid 13 prescriptions for every one hundred (100) persons; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the national average for the amount of opioids prescribed is 16 fifty-eight and seven-tenths (58.7) opioid prescriptions for every one 17 hundred (100) persons; and 18 19 WHEREAS, the misuse of prescription drugs can have dire consequences, 20 and the rapid rise of abuse requires a full-scale response from healthcare 21 providers, law enforcement, educators, public officials, and the Arkansas 22 community; and 23 24 WHEREAS, the people of Arkansas have a duty to educate our communities, 25 protect our drugs at home, properly dispose of unwanted or unneeded drugs, 26 promote responsible prescribing and dispensing of prescription drugs, 27 encourage proper safeguarding of prescription drug inventories, and help 28 those struggling to overcome prescription drug addictions, 29 NOW THEREFORE, 30 31 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SECOND GENERAL 32 ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS, THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN: 33 34 THAT the House of Representatives of the Ninety-Second General 35 Assembly, the Senate concurring, encourage continued collaboration among 36 healthcare providers, law enforcement, educators, public officials, and the
