24	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SECOND GENERAL		
25	ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS, THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN:

27	WHEREAS, in 2016, Arkansas had the 37th highest drug-related fatalities		
28	rate in the United States with a drug overdose death rate of fourteen (14)		
29	per one hundred thousand (100,000) people; and		
30			
31	WHEREAS, in 2017, four hundred and sixteen (416) deaths occurred in		
32	Arkansas as a result of all types of drug overdoses; and		
33			
34	WHEREAS, the number of drug overdose deaths in Arkansas, a majority of		
35	which are from prescription drugs, has more than doubled since 1999 when the		
36	rate was four and four-tenths (4.4) per one hundred thousand (100,000)		

1	people; and

3	WHEREAS, Arkansas ranked 3rd in the nation in nonmedical use of		
4	prescription pain relievers in the past year among people twelve (12) years		
5	of age or older in 2012-2014; and		
6			
7	WHEREAS, nineteen and three-tenths percent (19.3%) of high school		
8	students were taking prescription drugs without a doctor's prescription or		
9	differently than how a doctor told them to use the prescription drug in 2017		
10	and		
11			
12	WHEREAS, in 2017, Arkansas was ranked 2nd for the amount of opioids		
13	prescribed in a state with one hundred five and four-tenths (105.4) opioid		
14	prescriptions for every one hundred (100) persons; and		
15			
16	WHEREAS, the national average for the amount of opioids prescribed is		
17	fifty-eight and seven-tenths (58.7) opioid prescriptions for every one		
18	hundred (100) persons; and		
19			
20	WHEREAS, the misuse of prescription drugs can have dire consequences,		
21	and the rapid rise of abuse requires a full-scale response from healthcare		
22	providers, law enforcement, educators, public officials, and the Arkansas		
23	community; and

25	WHEREAS, the people of Arkansas have a duty to educate our communities,		
26	protect our drugs at home, properly dispose of unwanted or unneeded drugs,		
27	promote responsible prescribing and dispensing of prescription drugs,		
28	encourage proper safeguarding of prescription drug inventories, and help		
29	those struggling to overcome prescription drug addictions,

36	Assembly, the Senate concurring, encourage continued collaboration among
