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23	SECTION 1. DO NOT C	ODIFY. <u>Title.</u>	
24	This act shall be kn	own and may be cited as the "A	rkansas Healthy
25	Lifestyle Education Act of	<u>2019".</u>

27	SECTION 2. DO NOT C	ODIFY. <u>Legislative findings.</u>	
28	The General Assembly	finds that:	
29	(1) According	to a 2018 report by the Unite	d Health Foundation,
30	Arkansas ranks number fort	y-six (46) in the nation for o	verall health;
31	(2) Based on	the 2017 Centers for Disease C	ontrol and Prevention
32	Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance report, Arkansas ranks highest in the nation		
33	for the percentage of students who:		
34	<u>(A) Hav</u>	e considered suicide;	
35	<u>(B) Are</u>	considered obese;	
36	(C) Hav	e been forced to have sex; or	

1	(D) Use smokeless todacco;		
2	(3) According to data reported in 2016 by the Centers for		
3	Disease Control and Prevention, Arkansas ranked highest in the nation for		
4	teen birth rates; and		
5	(4) As a result of Arkansas's rankings in these nationwide		
6	findings, it is imperative that the General Assembly ensure that certain		
7	topics are addressed in the student health curriculum in our secondary public		
8	schools.

10	SECTION 3. Arkansas Code Title 6, Chapter 16, Subchapter 10, is		
11	amended to add an additional section to read as follows:		
12	6-16-1005. Health curriculum requirements.		
13	(a) Beginning in the 2019-2020 school year, each school district shall		
14	offer a health curriculum that provides evidence-based instruction to each		
15	student before grade eleven (11) on:		
16	(1)(A) Mental health issues.		
17	(B) The mental health curriculum required under this		
18	section shall include without limitation the following:		
19	(i) Suicide prevention methods; and		
20	(ii) Information regarding recognition of mental		
21	health crises;		
22	(2)(A) Substance abuse and addiction issues.		
23	(B) The substance abuse and addiction curriculum required		
24	under this section shall include without limitation the following:		
25	(i) Information regarding prescription drug abuse,		
26	illicit drug abuse, alcohol abuse, and other substances known to be abused		
27	during adolescence; and		
28	(ii) Substance abuse, consequences of substance		
29	abuse, and prevention methods;		
30	(3)(A) Diet and obesity issues.		
31	(B) The diet and obesity curriculum required under this		
32	section shall include without limitation the following:		
33	(i) Information aimed at preventing physical health		
34	issues, including without limitation:		
35	(a) Obesity;		
36	(b) Cardiovascular disease; and		

1	(c) Type 2 diabetes; and		
2	(ii) Materials designed to promote the role of		
3	proper nutrition and a physically active lifestyle in promoting optimal		
4	health;		
5	(4)(A) Tobacco use prevention and cessation.		
6	(B) The tobacco use prevention and cessation curriculum		
7	required under this section shall include without limitation information		
8	regarding the following:		
9	(i) Adverse health effects of using any form of		
10	tobacco or nicotine delivery system;		
11	(ii) E-cigarettes and vaping;		
12	(iii) Addiction; and		
13	(iv) Cessation; and		
14	(5)(A) Teenage pregnancy prevention.		
15	(B) The teenage pregnancy prevention curriculum required		
16	under this section shall include without limitation information regarding the		
17	<u>following:</u>		
18	(i) The prevention of unintended pregnancy and		
19	sexually transmitted infections through abstinence and contraception; and		
20	(ii) The topic of consent and healthy relationships		
21	(b) The health curriculum required under this section may be		
22	incorporated into a school district's existing course offerings.		
23	(c) The Department of Education shall:		
24	(1) Develop, in consultation with the University of Arkansas for		
25	Medical Sciences and the Department of Health, the health curriculum required		
26	under this section; and		
27	(2) Provide, with the cooperation of and in conjunction with the		
28	Department of Health, both online and in-person certification for teachers		
29	who are responsible for implementing the health curriculum required under		
30	this section.		
31	(d)(l) A parent or guardian may submit a written request for his or		
32	her child to be excused from all or any part of the health curriculum		
33	required under this section.		
34	(2) A school district shall not subject a student to		
35	disciplinary action or academic penalty if the student is excused from all or		
36	part of the health curriculum under subdivision (d)(1) of this section.
