2	(3) An activist movement is now gaining momentum to deny or		
3	obfuscate this history by claiming that the United States of America was not		
4	founded on the ideals of the Declaration of Independence, but rather on		
5	slavery and oppression;		
6	(4) This distortion of the history of the United States of		
7	America is being taught to students in public school classrooms via the New		
8	York Times' "1619 Project", which claims that "nearly everything that has		
9	truly made America exceptional" grew "out of slavery";		
10	(5) The 1619 Project is a racially divisive and revisionist		
11	account of history that threatens the integrity of the Union by denying the		
12	true principles on which it was founded; and		
13	(6) The State of Arkansas has a strong interest in promoting an		
14	accurate account of the history of the United States of America in public		
15	schools and forming young people into knowledgeable and patriotic citizens.		
16	(c) As used in this section, "public school" means:		
17	(1) A public school;		
18	(2) A public school district;		
19	(3) An open-enrollment public charter school; and		
20	(4) A state-supported two-year or four-year college or		
21	university.		
22	(d) State funding received by a public school shall not be used by a		
23	<pre>public school to:</pre>		
24	(1) Teach the 1619 Project curriculum in a public school; or		
25	(2) Facilitate the teaching of the 1619 Project curriculum in a		
26	<pre>public school.</pre>		
27	(e) A public school that teaches the 1619 Project curriculum shall:		
28	(1)(A) Have its state funding reduced in an amount equal to the		
29	cost associated with teaching the 1619 Project curriculum, which shall		
30	include without limitation planning and teaching time.		
31	(B) However, state funding for the following shall not be		
32	reduced based on a public school teaching the 1619 Project curriculum:		
33	(i) Programs for low-income public school students;

35	(ii) Programs for students with disabilities; and		
36	(2) Not receive Enhanced Student Achievement Funding under § 6-

2	(f)(l) The Division of Elementary and Secondary Education and Division
3	of Higher Education shall promulgate rules necessary to implement this

6	the final rules shall be filed with the Secretary of State for adoption under
7	§ 25-15-204(f):
8	(A) On or before January 1, 2022; or
9	(B) If approval under § 10-3-309 has not occurred by
10	January 1, 2022, as soon as practicable after approval under § 10-3-309.
11	(3) The Division of Elementary and Secondary Education and
12	Division of Higher Education shall file the proposed rules with the
13	Legislative Council under § 10-3-309(c) sufficiently in advance of January 1,
14	2022, so that the Legislative Council may consider the rule for approval
