8 **HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION**

9 TO ENCOURAGE CONTINUED COLLABORATION AMONG HEALTHCARE
10 PROVIDERS, LAW ENFORCEMENT, EDUCATORS, PUBLIC
11 OFFICIALS, AND THE ARKANSAS COMMUNITY IN BATTLING THE
12 ABUSE OF PRESCRIPTION DRUGS IN ARKANSAS.

16 TO ENCOURAGE CONTINUED COLLABORATION
17 AMONG HEALTHCARE PROVIDERS, LAW
18 ENFORCEMENT, EDUCATORS, PUBLIC OFFICIALS,
19 AND THE ARKANSAS COMMUNITY IN BATTLING
20 THE ABUSE OF PRESCRIPTION DRUGS IN
21 ARKANSAS.

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24 *WHEREAS, in 2018, Arkansas had the thirty-fourth-highest drug-related*
25 *fatalities rate in the United States with a drug overdose death rate of*
26 *fifteen and seven-tenths (15.7) per one hundred thousand (100,000) people;*
27 *and*

28
29 *WHEREAS, in 2018, four hundred forty-four (444) deaths occurred in*
30 *Arkansas as a result of all types of drug overdoses; and*

32 *WHEREAS, the rate of drug overdose deaths in Arkansas, a majority of*
33 *which are due to the misuse of prescription drugs, has more than tripled*
34 *since 1999, when the age-adjusted rate was six and one-tenth (6.1) per one*
35 *hundred thousand (100,000) people, compared to twenty-one and seven-tenths*
36 *(21.7) per one hundred thousand (100,000) people in 2017; and*



1 WHEREAS, Arkansas ranked third in the nation in nonmedical use of
2 prescription pain relievers in the previous year among people twelve (12)
3 years of age or older in 2012-2014; and
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5 WHEREAS, *in 2019, seventeen and nine-tenths percent (17.9%)* of surveyed
6 Arkansas high school students reported taking prescription drugs either
7 without a doctor's prescription or differently than as prescribed; and
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9 WHEREAS, *in 2019*, Arkansas ranked second among the states for the
10 quantity of opioids prescribed, *with eighty and nine-tenths (80.9)* opioid
11 prescriptions for every one hundred (100) persons; and
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13 WHEREAS, *in 2019*, the national average for the amount of opioids
14 prescribed was *forty-six and seven-tenths (46.7)* opioid prescriptions for
15 every one hundred (100) persons; and
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17 WHEREAS, the misuse of prescription drugs can have dire consequences,
18 and the rapid rise in prescription drug abuse in the state requires a full-
19 scale response from healthcare providers, law enforcement, educators, public
20 officials, and the Arkansas community; and
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22 WHEREAS, the people of Arkansas have a duty to educate our communities,
23 protect our drugs at home, properly dispose of unwanted or unneeded drugs,
24 promote responsible prescribing and dispensing of prescription drugs,
25 encourage proper safeguarding of prescription drug inventories, and help
26 those struggling to overcome prescription drug addictions,

28 NOW THEREFORE,

29 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-THIRD GENERAL
30 ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS, THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN:
31

32 THAT the House of Representatives of the Ninety-Third General Assembly,
33 the Senate concurring, encourage continued collaboration among healthcare
34 providers, law enforcement, educators, public officials, and the Arkansas
35 community in battling the abuse of prescription drugs in Arkansas.
