17	AMONG HEALTHCARE PROVIDERS, LAW
18	ENFORCEMENT, EDUCATORS, PUBLIC OFFICIALS,
19	AND THE ARKANSAS COMMUNITY IN BATTLING
20	THE ABUSE OF PRESCRIPTION DRUGS IN

24	WHEREAS, in 2016, Arkansas had the thirty-seventh-highest drug-related
25	fatalities rate in the United States with a drug overdose death rate of
26	fourteen (14) per one hundred thousand (100,000) people; and
27	
28	WHEREAS, in 2017, four hundred and forty-six (446) deaths occurred in
29	Arkansas as a result of all types of drug overdoses; and
30	
31	WHEREAS, the number of drug overdose deaths in Arkansas, a majority of
32	which are due to the misuse of prescription drugs, has more than doubled
33	since 1999 when the rate was four and four-tenths (4.4) per one hundred
34	thousand (100,000) people; and
35	
36	WHEREAS. Arkansas ranked third in the nation in nonmedical use of



1	prescription pain refrevers in the previous year among people twerve (12)
2	years of age or older in 2012-2014; and
3	
4	WHEREAS, in 2017, nineteen and three-tenths percent (19.3%) of surveyed
5	Arkansas high school students reported taking prescription drugs either
6	without a doctor's prescription or differently than as prescribed; and
7	
8	WHEREAS, in 2017, Arkansas ranked second among the states for the
9	quantity of opioids prescribed, with one hundred five and four-tenths (105.4)
10	opioid prescriptions for every one hundred (100) persons; and
11	
12	WHEREAS, in 2018, the national average for the amount of opioids
13	prescribed was fifty-one and four-tenths (51.4) opioid prescriptions for
14	every one hundred (100) persons; and
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16	WHEREAS, the misuse of prescription drugs can have dire consequences,
17	and the rapid rise in prescription drug abuse in the state requires a full-
18	scale response from healthcare providers, law enforcement, educators, public
19	officials, and the Arkansas community; and
20	
21	WHEREAS, the people of Arkansas have a duty to educate our communities,
22	protect our drugs at home, properly dispose of unwanted or unneeded drugs,
23	promote responsible prescribing and dispensing of prescription drugs,
24	encourage proper safeguarding of prescription drug inventories, and help
25	those struggling to overcome prescription drug addictions,
