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28	SECTION 1. DO NOT	CODIFY. Legislative findings	and intent.
29	(a) The General As	ssembly finds that:	
30	(1) The Nat	ional Day of Racial Healing in	the State of Arkansas
31	is a statewide community	observance created by the Arkan	nsas Peace and Justice
32	Memorial Movement in 2020	O to provide citizens of the sta	ate with the
33	opportunity to come toge	ther to courageously discuss tr	uth, racial healing,
34	and transformation;		
35	(2) The orig	ginal National Day of Racial Hea	aling observance was
36	developed by the W.K. Ke	llogg Foundation in Battle Cree	k, Michigan, in 2016;

1	(3) In 2020, Governor William Asa Hutchinson II issued the
2	nation's first-ever gubernatorial proclamation for the National Day of Racial
3	Healing, and he repeated his action in 2021; and
4	(4) In 2021, the Arkansas Peace and Justice Memorial Movement,
5	in association with the Arkansas Municipal League and the Association of
6	Arkansas Counties, successfully encouraged nearly one hundred (100)
7	$\underline{\text{executives}}$ of political subdivisions throughout the state to issue their $\underline{\text{own}}$
8	proclamations.
9	(b) It is the intent of the General Assembly to:
10	(1) Establish a commission to promote truth and reconciliation
11	relating to incidents of documented extrajudicial, racial, religious, and
12	political injustice and violence;
13	(2) Encourage all county intergovernmental councils to establish
14	community remembrance committees and to assist the community remembrance
15	committees in their mission, including ensuring that the executives of all
16	political subdivisions of each county also commemorate the National Day of
17	Racial Healing in the state by the issuance of a proclamation;
18	(3) Provide for the creation of an academic course of study of
19	Arkansas Black culture; and
20	(4) Encourage the House of Representatives and the Senate to
21	convene jointly, along with all state government elected executive officials
22	and the justices of the Supreme Court, at a time certain during each regular
23	session on the National Day of Racial Healing in the state to hear the
24	Governor present and read an annual proclamation for the National Day of
25	Racial Healing in the state.
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27	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code Title 13 is amended to add an additional
28	chapter to read as follows:
29	CHAPTER 16
30	UNIFY ARKANSAS COMMISSION
31	
32	13-16-101. Unify Arkansas Commission — Creation and duties.
33	(a) The Unify Arkansas Commission is created.
34	(b) The commission shall:
35	(1) Promote truth and reconciliation relating to incidents of
36	documented extraindicial racial religious and political injustice and

1	violence, including without limitation lynching, discriminatory cleansing,	
2	expulsion, and racialized exploitation, that were perpetrated against	
3	citizens, veterans, and others in Arkansas throughout its history as a	
4	territory and as a state;	
5	(2) Cooperate and assist with the erection of historical markers	
6	at confirmed sites of the incidents identified in subdivision (b)(1) of this	
7	section to memorialize the victims of those incidents;	
8	(3) Coordinate and facilitate the public distribution of	
9	scholarly research, publications, and interpretation of the incidents	
10	identified in subdivision (b)(1) of this section;	
11	(4) Assist in the development of programs, legislation, and	
12	policies that promote truth and reconciliation relating to the incidents	
13	identified in subdivision (b)(1) of this section;	
14	(5) Obtain and maintain expertise concerning the incidents	
15	identified in subdivision (b)(1) of this section; and	
16	(6) In recognition of the one-hundredth anniversary of the	
17	Elaine Race Massacre, immediately streamline recommendations from community	
18	remembrance committees relating to the Elaine Race Massacre, including	
19	without limitation the full posthumous exoneration of all one hundred twenty-	
20	two (122) Black Arkansans who were wrongfully convicted of various crimes, as	
21	well as Robert L. Hill, the cofounder of the Progressive Farmers and	
22	Household Union of America, who fled to Kansas to avoid unjust arrest and	
23	prosecution.	
24		
25	13-16-102. Unify Arkansas Commission — Members — Meetings — Staffing.	
26	(a)(1) The Unify Arkansas Commission shall consist of the following	
27	members:	
28	(A) Two (2) members appointed by the Governor;	
29	(B) Two (2) members appointed by the Speaker of the House	
30	of Representatives;	
31	(C) Two (2) members appointed by the President Pro Tempore	
32	of the Senate; and	
33	(D) Three (3) members appointed by the Chair of the	
34	Arkansas Legislative Black Caucus.	
35	(2)(A) Except as provided in subdivision (a)(2)(B) of this	
36	section, a member of the Unify Arkansas Commission shall serve for a term of	

1	four (4) years.	
2	(B) The initial appointments to the Unify Arkansas	
3	Commission shall be for staggered terms.	
4	(b)(1) Except as provided in subdivision (b)(2) of this section, the	
5	Unify Arkansas Commission, in consultation with the Black History Commission	
6	of Arkansas, shall provide a list of at least three (3) but no more than five	
7	(5) qualified persons to each appointing official under this section from	
8	which each appointing official shall choose his or her appointees.	
9	(2) If the Unify Arkansas Commission fails to provide the list	
10	of qualified persons at least forty-five (45) days before the term of an open	
11	position on the Unify Arkansas Commission begins, the appointing official	
12	shall make the appointment without consulting the list.	
13	(c) The members of the Unify Arkansas Commission shall select a chair,	
14	who shall serve as the chair for two (2) years.	
15	(d)(1) If a vacancy occurs on the Unify Arkansas Commission, the	
16	vacancy shall be filled by the same process as the original appointment.	
17	(2) The person appointed to fill the vacancy shall serve the	
18	remainder of the vacating member's term.	
19	(e) A member of the Unify Arkansas Commission may receive expense	
20	reimbursement and stipends under § 25-16-901 et seq.	
21	(f)(1) The Unify Arkansas Commission shall establish rules and	
22	procedures for conducting its business.	
23	(2)(A) A majority of the voting members of the Unify Arkansas	
24	Commission shall constitute a quorum for transacting business of the Unify	
25	Arkansas Commission.	
26	(B) An affirmative vote of a majority of a quorum present	
27	shall be required for the passage of a motion or other action of the Unify	
28	Arkansas Commission.	
29	(g)(1) The Unify Arkansas Commission may:	
30	(A) Hire and retain staff;	
31	(B) Hire and employ consultants;	
32	(C) Fix the compensation, duties, authority, and	
33	responsibilities of the staff or consultants; and	
34	(D) Be funded through a public-private partnership using	
35	private funds held in trust by the Black History Commission of Arkansas.	
36	(2) If no appropriation is made for subdivision $(a)(1)$ of this	

1 section, the Secretary of the Department of Parks, Heritage, and Tourism 2 shall designate staff to assist the Unify Arkansas Commission. 3 (h) The Unify Arkansas Commission shall dissolve on December 31, 2034, 4 unless it is extended by the General Assembly at the request of the Unify 5 Arkansas Commission. 6 SECTION 3. DO NOT CODIFY. Unify Arkansas Commission initial 7 8 appointments. 9 (a)(1)(A) The Black History Commission of Arkansas, the Arkansas State Archives, and the Board of Trustees of the Arkansas Historical Association 10 shall convene a joint public meeting using a virtual platform no later than 11 12 forty-five (45) days after the effective date of this act. 13 (B) The date and time of the meeting required under 14 subdivision (a)(1)(A) of this section shall be set by the Chair of the Black History Commission of Arkansas, the Director of the Arkansas State Archives, 15 16 and the President of the Arkansas Historical Association. 17 (2) After soliciting and accepting public recommendations, the Black History Commission of Arkansas, the Arkansas State Archives, and the 18 19 Board of Trustees of the Arkansas Historical Association shall provide the 20 lists required under § 13-16-102(b) to the appointing officials no later than 21 sixty (60) days after the effective date of this act. 22 (b)(1) The first term of the appointees to the Unify Arkansas 23 Commission shall begin on January 1, 2022. 24 (2) The Governor's initial appointments under § 13-16-25 102(a)(1)(A) shall be as follows: 26 (A) One (1) member whose initial term shall end on 27 December 31, 2025; and 28 (B) One (1) member whose initial term shall end on 29 December 31, 2026. 30 (3) The initial appointments of the Speaker of the House of 31 Representatives under 13-16-102(a)(1)(B) shall be as follows: 32 (A) One (1) member whose initial term shall end on 33 December 31, 2024; and 34 (B) One (1) member whose initial term shall end on

(4) The initial appointments of the President Pro Tempore of the

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December 31, 2025.

1	Senate under § $13-16-102(a)(1)(C)$ shall be as follows:	
2	(A) One (1) member whose initial term shall end on	
3	December 31, 2024; and	
4	(B) One (1) member whose initial term shall end on	
5	December 31, 2025.	
6	(5) The initial appointments of the Chair of the Arkansas	
7	Legislative Black Caucus under § 13-16-102(a)(1)(D) shall be as follows:	
8	(A) One (1) member whose initial term shall end on	
9	December 31, 2024;	
10	(B) One (1) member whose initial term shall end on	
11	December 31, 2025; and	
12	(C) One (1) member whose initial term shall end on	
13	<u>December 31, 2026.</u>	
14	(c) The appointing officials under this act shall make their initial	
15	appointments before January 1, 2022.

18	amended to add additional subdivisions to read as follows:

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23	SECTION 5. Arkansas Code § 6-16-107(a), concerning patriotic	
24	observances in elementary and secondary schools, is amended to read as	
25	follows:	
26	(a) <u>February 1, as National Freedom Day,</u> February 22, as the birthday	
27	of George Washington, and such other days as may be designated by the State	
28	Board of Education for patriotic observance shall be observed with	
29	appropriate exercises.

31	SECTION 6. Arkansas Code Title 6, Chapter 16, Subchapter 1, is amended	
32	to add additional sections to read as follows:	
33	6-16-152. Elaine Remembrance Week.	
34	(a) To educate students about the role of Black Arkansans in labor and	
35	civil rights organizations and to highlight the sacrifices they made in	
36	advancing the cause of racial equity, the first seven (7) days of October	

shall be recognized as "Elaine Remembrance Week". 1 2 (b) During Elaine Remembrance Week, particular study shall be made of 3 the Elaine Race Massacre, the deadliest race massacre in United States 4 history. 5 (c) Curricula and materials to be used during Elaine Remembrance Week 6 shall be devised, approved, and distributed by the State Board of Education 7 in cooperation with the Black History Commission of Arkansas and the Unify 8 Arkansas Commission. 9 10 6-16-153. Arkansas Black culture course. (a)(1) The State Board of Education shall allow for an elective 11 12 academic study of Arkansas Black culture course that consists of a 13 nonpartisan, unbiased academic study of Arkansas and American Black culture and its influence on American literature, art, music, popular culture, and 14 15 politics, to be offered to students in public schools or school districts if 16 the academic study of Arkansas Black culture course meets the standards 17 listed in this section. 18 (2) The curriculum standards submitted by a public school or 19 school district for approval of an academic study of Arkansas Black culture 20 course shall meet the: 21 (A) Academic rigor and curriculum standards of other 22 elective courses approved by the state board; and 23 (B) Requirements of the Arkansas Constitution and the 24 United States Constitution. 25 (b)(1) A public school or school district that elects to offer an 26 academic study of Arkansas Black culture course shall implement the course in 27 accordance with state and federal law, including the manner in which the 28 course is taught in the classroom and the assignment of public school or 29 school district personnel teaching the course. 30 (2) Personnel assigned to teach the course shall be licensed to 31 teach in the State of Arkansas. 32 (c) A public school or school district that elects to offer an 33 academic study of Arkansas Black culture course shall use only the standards

(1) Evaluate textbooks for an academic study of Arkansas Black

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in this section to:

culture course; and

1	(2) Teach an academic study of Arkansas Black culture course.	
2	(d) The Division of Elementary and Secondary Education shall, by the	
3	2022-2023 school year, identify, develop, and approve an Arkansas Black	
4	culture course for high school credit that meets the requirements in	
5	subsections (a) and (b) of this section.	
6		
7	SECTION 7. Arkansas Code Title 14, Chapter 13, Subchapter 1, is	
8	amended to add an additional section to read as follows:	
9	14-13-101. Community remembrance committees.	
10	(a) Each county is encouraged to establish a community remembrance	
11	committee to facilitate and encourage participation in regular, courageous,	
12	ongoing dialogues among the citizens and elected officials of the county.	
13	(b) Community remembrance committees:	
14	(1) Shall be funded through a public-private partnership using	
15	private funds held in trust by the Black History Commission of Arkansas and	
16	accessed through the Unify Arkansas Commission;	
17	(2)(A) Shall publicly recommend actions to all elected executive	
18	branch officials on specific measures that the state should take to correct	
19	the unjust outcome of any incident of documented extrajudicial, racial,	
20	religious, or political injustice and violence, including without limitation	
21	lynching, discriminatory cleansing, expulsion, and racialized exploitation,	
22	that were perpetrated against citizens, veterans, and others in Arkansas	
23	throughout its history as a territory and a state.	
24	(B) Incidents regarding which a community remembrance	
25	committee recommends actions under subdivision (b)(2)(A) of this section	
26	shall have:	
27	(i) Been a subject of the work of the Unify Arkansas	
28	Commission for at least one (1) year; and	
29	(ii) Occurred at least seventy-five (75) years	
30	before the recommendation.	
31	(C) A community remembrance committee shall:	
32	(i) Not make more than three (3) recommendations	
33	under subdivision (b)(2)(A) of this section in one (1) year; and	
34	(ii) Publish each recommendation made under	
35	subdivision (b)(2)(A) of this section; and	
36	(3) May serve as committees of the Unify Arkansas Commission,	

1	giving local citizens input on the Unify Arkansas Commission's operations
2	within each of the counties of the state.
3	(c) A community remembrance committee is encouraged to:
4	(1) Work with the Unify Arkansas Commission and the Department
5	of Parks, Heritage, and Tourism to erect historical markers at confirmed
6	sites to memorialize the victims of documented extrajudicial, racial,
7	religious, or political injustice and violence throughout the history of
8	Arkansas as both a territory and a state; and
9	(2) Host regular public meetings and other activities that focus
10	on future-building through countywide solidarity and collaboration across
11	differences with the goal of addressing ordinances, policies, regulations,
12	norms, cultures, institutions, and narratives that have historically
13	fostered, either explicitly or implicitly, exclusion.
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
