25	5 <u>(a) As used in this section</u>	<u>:</u>	
26	6 <u>(1) "Extracurricular</u>	activity" means an intraschool activity not	
27	7 <u>included in a regular curriculum</u> ,	including without limitation sports and	
28	8 <u>special interest clubs or groups;</u>		
29	9 <u>(2)</u> "Funding" means t	he lesser of the amount of money specified

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1 Arkansas Activities Association; and 2 (4) "Pandemic emergency" means any period during which the 3 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention or the Department of Health 4 recommends the wearing of face masks, face shields, or face coverings in 5 schools. 6 (b) During a pandemic emergency, each local school district board of 7 directors shall establish a policy concerning quarantine requirements and 8 whether or not to impose a mandate in the school district's schools regarding 9 the use of face masks, face shields, or other face coverings. 10 (c)(1) Based on the policy established by a student's assigned public school or public school district under subsection (b) of this section, upon 11 12 the request of a parent, legal guardian, person standing in loco parentis, or 13 student if the student is over eighteen (18) years of age, a student may 14 transfer from his or her assigned public school district to: 15 (A) An alternate public school district or open-enrollment 16 public charter school; 17 (B) A private school; (C) A home school; or 18 19 (D) A virtual school offered within the State of Arkansas. 20 (2) Except as provided in subsection (d) of this section, a 21 transfer under subdivision (c)(l) of this section: 22 (A) May, upon the choice of the parent, legal guardian, 23 person standing in loco parentis, or student if the student is over eighteen 24 (18) years of age, operate as an irrevocable election for each subsequent 25 entire school year and remain in force until the student completes high school or the parent, legal guardian, person standing in loco parentis, or 26 27 student if the student is over eighteen (18) years of age timely makes application under a provision of law governing attendance in or transfer to 28 29 another public school district other than the student's assigned public 30 school district; and 31 (B) Shall take effect immediately upon the notification of application by a parent, legal guardian, person standing in loco parentis, or 32 33 student if the student is over eighteen (18) years of age to the alternate 34 public school district or open-enrollment public charter school, private 35 school, home school, or virtual school. 36 (d)(1) A school to which a student intends to transfer under

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subdivision (c)(l)(A) of this section shall not deny the student the ability 1 2 to attend the school under this section unless there is a limitation as 3 described in subdivision (d)(2) of this section at the school to which the 4 student seeks to transfer. 5 (2) A limitation may be claimed by a school to which a student 6 intends to transfer under subdivision (c)(l)(A) of this section only if the: 7 (A)(i) School to which a student intends to transfer has 8 reached the maximum student-to-teacher ratio allowed under federal law, state 9 law, the Standards of Accreditation of Arkansas Public Schools and School Districts, state rules, or other applicable federal regulations. 10 11 (ii) A public school district may accept the 12 application of a student transferring to the public school district under 13 this section even if enrolling the student would cause the public school 14 district to exceed the numerical net maximum limit on school choice transfers 15 under § 6-18-1906. 16 (iii)(a) An open-enrollment public charter school 17 may accept the application of a student transferring to the open-enrollment 18 public charter school under this section even if enrolling the student would 19 cause the open-enrollment public charter school to exceed the number of 20 students specified in its charter. 21 (b) Subject to any limitations stated in this 22 section, a student who transfers to an open-enrollment public charter school 23 shall be allowed to continue attending the open-enrollment public charter school regardless of whether the student's enrollment causes the open-24 25 enrollment public charter school to exceed the number of students specified 26 in its charter; 27 (B) Student who intends to transfer under this section has previously been expelled from a public school district, open-enrollment 28 29 public charter school, or private school; or 30 (C) School to which a student intends to transfer would 31 require additional building structures in order to accommodate the 32 transferring student. (e)(1) For purposes of determining a public school district's 33 34 foundation funding amount under § 6-20-2305, a nonresident student who 35 transfers to an alternate public school district or open-enrollment public 36 charter school under subdivision (c)(l)(A) of this section shall be counted

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1 as part of the average daily membership of the public school district to 2 which the student has transferred. 3 (2)(A) The funding associated with a student who transfers to a 4 private school, home school, or virtual school under subdivisions (c)(1)(B)-5 (D) of this section shall follow the student to the private school, home 6 school, or virtual school as applicable. 7 (B)(i) For a student transferring to an alternate public 8 school district or open-enrollment public charter school, private school, or 9 virtual school, funding shall be disbursed to the alternate public school 10 district or open-enrollment public charter school, private school, or virtual 11 sch<u>ool.</u> 12 (ii) For a student transferring to home school, 13 funding shall be disbursed to the parent, legal guardian, person standing in 14 loco parentis, or student if the student is over eighteen (18) years of age. 15 (f) Funding received by a nonpublic school under this section shall be 16 used for only the following expenses of the student: 17 (1) Tuition, fees, and the cost of required uniforms for the 18 nonpublic school; 19 (2) Textbooks required by a nonpublic school; 20 (3) Tutoring services provided by a: 21 (A) Teacher who is licensed by the State Board of 22 Education; 23 (B) Person qualified to be a substitute teacher under § 6-24 15-1004 and the rules of the state board; 25 (C) Person who has at least one (1) semester of teaching 26 experience at an institution of higher education; or 27 (D) Tutoring facility with a license to operate in this 28 state; 29 (4) Specific course materials, including without limitation any 30 required supplemental materials; (5) Fees for: 31 32 (A) Nationally standardized assessments, including without 33 limitation assessments required by the state board of all public students and 34 nationally recognized norm-referenced examinations; 35 (B) Advanced Placement exams; 36 (C) College placement examinations, including without

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1	limitation the ACT and the SAT;	
2	(D) Industry certification examinations; or	
3	(E) Other assessments necessary to complete an eligible	
4	student's course of study;	
5	(6) Fees for specialized after-school or summer education	
6	programs whose primary purpose is to provide academic instruction;	
7	(7)(A) Services that are provided by a public school district or	
8	an open-enrollment public charter school, including without limitation	
9	academic courses, nonacademic programs, and extracurricular programs.	
10	(B) A public school district or an open-enrollment public	
11	charter school that provides services to a student who transferred to a	
12	nonpublic school under this section is entitled to receive an amount that is	
13	not more than one-sixth $(1/6)$ of the state foundation funding amount that	
14	would be received by the public school district or open-enrollment public	
15	charter school under § 6-20-2305(a)(2) for each academic course in which the	
16	student is enrolled as described in § 6-18-232;	
17	(8) Tuition and fees at an in-state or out-of-state institution	
18	of higher education if the student is enrolled both in high school and an	
19	academic course at an in-state or out-of-state institution of higher	
20	education;	
21	(9) Textbooks and materials related to coursework at an	
22	institution of higher education if an student is enrolled in an academic	
23	course at an in-state or out-of-state institution of higher education;	
24	(10) Specialized services that are necessary to facilitate a	
25	student's education, including without limitation:	
26	(A) Applied behavior analysis as defined in § 23-99-418;	
27	(B) Audiology as defined in § 17-100-103;	
28	(C) Dyslexia support;	
29	(D) Occupational therapy as defined in § 17-88-102;	
30	(E) Physical therapy as defined in § 17-93-102;	
31	(F) Speech-language pathology as defined in § 17-100-103;

33	(G) Other services approved by the Division of Elementary	
34	and Secondary Education; and	
35	(11)(A) Transportation required for travel to and from a	
36	nonpublic school.	

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1	(B) Expenses related to transportation under subdivision		
2	(f)(ll)(A) of this section shall not exceed ten percent (10%) of the funding		
3	provided for the student for that academic year.		
4	(g) Funding received by a public school under this section shall be		
5	used only for the following expenses:		
6	(1) Public school technology enhancements, including without		
7	limitation:		
8	(A) Wireless access points;		
9	(B) Installation of cabling;		
10	(C) Wireless internet hot spots that are available for		
11	<u>check out;</u>		
12	(D) Laptop computers; and		
13	(E) Tablet computers;		
14	(2) Building upgrades and repairs for:		
15	(A) Heating, ventilation, and air conditioning upgrades		
16	and repairs; and		
17	(B) Roof repairs;		
18	(3) Resources for Response to Intervention (RTI);		
19	(4) Remote learning intervention platform technology;		
20	(5) Social and emotional well-being programming for public		
21	school students and parents of public school students;		
22	(6) Parent support centers for parents of public school students		
23	who are economically disadvantaged;		
24	(7) Parent support centers for parents of public school students		
25	with intellectual or developmental disabilities;		
26	(8) Professional development training for public school staff

8	(h) A student who transfers to an alternate public school district or	
9	open-enrollment public charter school, private school, home school, or	
10	virtual school under subsection (c) of this section shall be eligible to	
11	participate in extracurricular activities and interscholastic activities	
12	immediately upon his or her transfer to an alternate public school district	
13	or open-enrollment public charter school, private school, home school, or	
14	virtual school.	
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
