19 TO CREATE THE ARKANSAS HUMAN HEARTBEAT
20 AND HUMAN LIFE CIVIL JUSTICE ACT; TO SAVE
21 THE LIVES OF UNBORN CHILDREN AND PROTECT
22 THE HEALTH OF WOMEN THROUGH CIVIL
23 LIABILITY; AND TO DECLARE AN EMERGENCY.
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27 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS:
28

29 SECTION 1. Arkansas Code Title 20, Chapter 16, is amended to add an
30 additional subchapter to read as follows:

31 Subchapter 26 – Arkansas Human Heartbeat and Human Life Civil Justice Act
32

33 20-16-2601. Title.

34 This subchapter shall be known and may be cited as the "Arkansas Human
35 Heartbeat and Human Life Civil Justice Act".
36



1 20-16-2602. Legislative findings.

2 (a) The General Assembly finds that:

3 (1) It is time for the United States Supreme Court to redress
4 and correct the grave injustice against humanity which is being perpetuated
5 by its decisions in Roe v. Wade, Doe v. Bolton, and Planned Parenthood v.
6 Casey;

7 (2) The United States Supreme Court committed a grave injustice
8 against humanity in the Dred Scott decision by denying personhood to a class
9 of human beings, African-Americans;

10 (3) The United States Supreme Court also committed a grave
11 injustice against humanity by upholding the “separate but equal” doctrine in
12 Plessy v. Ferguson, which withdrew legal protection from a class of human
13 beings who were persons under the United States Constitution, African-
14 Americans;

15 (4) An injustice against humanity occurs when a government
16 withdraws legal protection from a class of human beings, resulting in severe
17 deprivation of their rights, up to and including death;

18 (5) In Brown v. Board of Education, the United States Supreme
19 Court corrected its own grave injustice against humanity created in Plessy v.
20 Ferguson by overruling and abolishing the fifty-eight-year-old “separate but
21 equal” doctrine, thus giving equal legal rights to African-Americans;

22 (6) Under the doctrine of stare decisis, the three (3) abortion
23 cases mentioned in subdivision (a)(1) of this section meet the test for when
24 a case should be overturned by the United States Supreme Court because of
25 significant changes in facts or laws, including without limitation the
26 following:

27 (A) The cases have not been accepted by scholars, judges,
28 and the American people, evidenced by the fact that these cases are still the
29 most intensely controversial cases in American history and at the present
30 time;

31 (B) New scientific advances have demonstrated since 1973
32 that life begins at the moment of conception and that the child in a woman’s
33 womb is a human being;

34 (C) Scientific evidence and personal testimonies document
35 the massive harm that abortion causes to women;

36 (D) The laws in all fifty (50) states have now changed

1 through "Safe Haven" laws to eliminate all burdens of child care from women
2 who do not want to care for a child; and

3 (E) Public attitudes favoring adoption have created a
4 culture of adoption in the United States, with many families waiting long
5 periods of time to adopt newborn infants;

6 (7) Before the United States Supreme Court decision of Roe v.
7 Wade, Arkansas had already enacted prohibitions on abortions under § 5-61-101
8 et seq., and authorized the refusal to perform, participate, consent, or
9 submit to an abortion under § 20-16-601;

10 (8) Arkansas Constitution, Amendment 68, states that "the policy
11 of Arkansas is to protect the life of every unborn child from conception
12 until birth" and that "no public funds will be used to pay for any abortion,
13 except to save the mother's life";

14 (9) Arkansas passed the Arkansas Human Heartbeat Protection Act,
15 § 20-16-1301 et seq., in 2013, which shows the will of the Arkansas people to
16 save the lives of unborn children;

17 (10) Arkansas has continued to pass additional legislation in
18 2015, 2017, 2019, and 2021 that further shows the will of the Arkansas people
19 to save the lives of unborn children;

20 (11)(A) Since the decision of Roe v. Wade, approximately sixty-
21 two million five hundred two thousand nine hundred four (62,502,904)
22 abortions have ended the lives of unborn children.

23 (B) In 2015, six hundred thirty-eight thousand one hundred
24 sixty-nine (638,169) legal induced abortions were reported to the Centers for
25 Disease Control and Prevention from forty-nine (49) reporting areas in the
26 United States.

27 (C) The Department of Health reports that two thousand
28 nine hundred sixty-three (2,963) abortions took place in Arkansas during
29 2019, including abortions performed on out-of-state residents;

30 (12) Arkansas has a compelling interest from the outset of a
31 woman's pregnancy in protecting the health of the woman and life of an unborn
32 child; and

33 (13) The State of Arkansas urgently pleads with the United
34 States Supreme Court to do the right thing, as they did in one of their
35 greatest cases, Brown v. Board of Education, which overturned a fifty-eight-
36 year-old precedent of the United States, and reverse, cancel, overturn, and

1 annul Roe v. Wade, Doe v. Bolton, and Planned Parenthood v. Casey.

2 (b) It is the intent of this subchapter to ensure that abortion in
3 Arkansas is abolished and to establish civil liability for the violation of
4 abortion laws in order to protect the lives of unborn children.

5
6 20-16-2603. Definitions.

7 As used in this subchapter:

8 (1)(A) "Abortion" means the act of using, prescribing,
9 administering, procuring, or selling of any instrument, medicine, drug, or
10 any other substance, device, or means with the purpose to terminate the
11 pregnancy of a woman, with knowledge that the termination by any of those
12 means will with reasonable likelihood cause the death of an unborn child.

13 (B) An act under subdivision (1)(A) of this section is not
14 an abortion if the act is performed with the purpose to:

15 (i) Save the life or preserve the health of the
16 unborn child;

17 (ii) Remove a dead unborn child caused by
18 spontaneous abortion; or

19 (iii) Remove an ectopic pregnancy;

20 (2) "Entity" means a corporation, partnership, limited liability
21 company, association, joint venture, public corporation, any other legal or
22 commercial entity, fiduciary, or any organized group of persons whether
23 incorporated or not, including without limitation a church or religious
24 organization;

25 (3) "Fertilization" means the fusion of a human spermatozoon
26 with a human ovum;

27 (4) "Medical emergency" means a condition in which an abortion
28 is necessary to preserve the life of a pregnant woman whose life is
29 endangered by a physical disorder, physical illness, or physical injury,
30 including a life-endangering physical condition caused by or arising from the
31 pregnancy itself; and

32 (5) "Unborn child" means an individual organism of the species
33 Homo sapiens from fertilization until live birth.

34
35 20-16-2604. Prohibition.

36 (a) A person shall not purposely perform or attempt to perform an

1 abortion except to save the life of a pregnant woman in a medical emergency.

2 (b) This section does not:

3 (1) Authorize the charging or conviction of a woman with any
4 criminal offense in the death of her own unborn child;

5 (2) Permit a civil liability to be assessed against a woman upon
6 whom an abortion is performed in violation of this subchapter; or

7 (3) Prohibit the sale, use, prescription, or administration of a
8 contraceptive measure, drug, or chemical if the contraceptive measure, drug,
9 or chemical is administered before the time when a pregnancy could be
10 determined through conventional medical testing and if the contraceptive
11 measure, drug, or chemical is sold, used, prescribed, or administered in
12 accordance with manufacturer instructions.

13 (c) It is an affirmative defense under this section if a licensed
14 physician provides medical treatment to a pregnant woman which results in the
15 accidental or unintentional physical injury or death to the unborn child.

16
17 20-16-2605. Exemption for preemption and intergovernmental immunity.

18 The prohibition in § 20-16-2604 shall not apply to an abortion
19 performed at the behest of federal agencies, contractors, or employees that
20 are carrying out duties under federal law, if the prohibition on the abortion
21 would violate the doctrines of preemption or intergovernmental immunity.

22
23 20-16-2606. Limitation on public enforcement.

24 (a) Notwithstanding any other law, the requirements of this subchapter
25 shall be enforced exclusively through the private civil actions described in
26 § 20-16-2607.

27 (b) A direct or indirect enforcement of this subchapter may not be
28 taken or threatened by the state, a political subdivision, a district or
29 county attorney, or an executive or administrative officer or employee of
30 this state or a political subdivision against any person.

31 (c) A violation of this subchapter may not be used to justify or
32 trigger the enforcement of any other law, except as provided in § 20-16-2607.

33
34 20-16-2607. Civil liability.

35 (a) Any person or entity, other than the state, a political
36 subdivision of the state, or an officer or employee of a state or local

1 governmental entity in this state, may bring a civil action against any
2 person who:

3 (1) Performs or induces an abortion in violation of this
4 subchapter;

5 (2) Knowingly engages in conduct that aids or abets the
6 performance or inducement of an abortion, including paying for or reimbursing
7 the costs of an abortion through insurance or otherwise, if the abortion is
8 performed or induced in violation of this subchapter, regardless of whether
9 the person knew or should have known that the abortion would be performed or
10 induced in violation of this subchapter; or

11 (3) Intends to engage in the conduct described in subdivision
12 (a)(1) or subdivision (a)(2) of this section.

13 (b) If a claimant prevails in an action brought under this section,
14 the court shall award:

15 (1) Injunctive relief sufficient to prevent the defendant from
16 violating this subchapter or engaging in acts that aid or abet violations of
17 this subchapter;

18 (2) Statutory damages in an amount of not less than ten thousand
19 dollars (\$10,000) for each abortion that the defendant performed or induced
20 in violation of this subchapter, and for each abortion performed or induced
21 or aided or abetted in violation of this subchapter;

22 (3) Nominal and compensatory damages if the plaintiff has
23 suffered harm from the defendant's conduct, including without limitation loss
24 of consortium and emotional distress; and

25 (4) Costs and attorney's fees.

26 (c) Notwithstanding subsection (b) of this section, a court may not
27 award relief under this section in response to a violation of subdivision
28 (a)(1) or subdivision (a)(2) of this section if the defendant demonstrates
29 that the defendant previously paid the full amount of statutory damages under
30 subdivision (b)(2) of this section in a previous action for that particular
31 violation of this subchapter, or for the particular conduct that aided or
32 abetted an abortion performed or induced in violation of this subchapter.

33 (d) Notwithstanding any other law, a person may bring an action under
34 this section not later than the third anniversary after the date the cause of
35 action accrues.

36 (e) Notwithstanding any other law, the following are not a defense to

1 an action brought under this section:

2 (1) Ignorance or mistake of law;

3 (2) A defendant's belief that the requirements or provisions of
4 this subchapter are or were unconstitutional;

5 (3) A defendant's reliance on any court decision that has been
6 overruled on appeal or by a subsequent court, even if that court decision has
7 not been overruled when the defendant violated this subchapter;

8 (4) A defendant's reliance on any state or federal court
9 decision that is not binding on the court in which the action has been
10 brought;

11 (5) Nonmutual issue preclusion or nonmutual claim preclusion;

12 (6) The consent of the unborn child's mother to the abortion; or

13 (7) Any claim that the enforcement of this subchapter or the
14 imposition of civil liability against the defendant will violate the
15 constitutional rights of third parties, except as provided by § 20-16-2608.

16 (f)(1) It is an affirmative defense if:

17 (A) A person sued under subdivision (a)(2) of this section
18 reasonably believed, after conducting a reasonable investigation, that the
19 person performing or inducing the abortion had complied or would comply with
20 every requirement and provision of this subchapter; or

21 (B) A person sued under subdivision (a)(3) of this section
22 reasonably believed, after conducting a reasonable investigation, that the
23 person performing or inducing the abortion would comply with every
24 requirement and provision of this subchapter.

25 (2) The defendant has the burden of proving an affirmative
26 defense under subdivision (f)(1)(A) or subdivision (f)(1)(B) of this section
27 by a preponderance of the evidence.

28 (g) This section does not impose liability on any speech or conduct
29 protected by the First Amendment of the United States Constitution, as made
30 applicable to the states through the United States Supreme Court's
31 interpretation of the Fourteenth Amendment of the United States Constitution,
32 or by Arkansas Constitution, Article 2, § 6.

33 (h)(1) Notwithstanding any other law, neither the state, nor any of
34 its political subdivisions, nor any district or county attorney, nor any
35 executive or administrative officer or employee of this state or a political
36 subdivision may act in concert or participation with anyone who brings suit

1 under this section, nor may they intervene in any action brought under this
2 section.

3 (2) This subsection does not prohibit a person or entity
4 described in subsection (h)(1) of this section from filing an amicus curiae
5 brief in the action if that person or entity does not act in concert or
6 participate with the plaintiff or plaintiffs who sue under this section.

7 (i) Notwithstanding any other law, including § 16-22-309, a court may
8 not award costs or attorney's fees under the Arkansas Rules of Civil
9 Procedure or any other law to a defendant in an action brought under this
10 section.

11 (j) Notwithstanding any other law, a civil action under this section
12 may not be brought by a person who impregnated the woman who obtained an
13 abortion through an act of rape, sexual assault, incest, or any other act
14 prohibited under Title 5, Chapter 14.

15 (k) Notwithstanding any other law, a civil action under this section
16 may not be brought against a person who performed or aided or abetted an
17 abortion at the behest of federal agencies, contractors, or employees that
18 are carrying out duties under federal law if the prohibition on the abortion
19 would violate the doctrines of preemption or intergovernmental immunity.

20 (l) Notwithstanding any other law, a civil action under this section
21 may not be brought against a common carrier who transports a pregnant woman
22 to an abortion provider, if the common carrier is unaware that the women
23 intends to abort her unborn child.

24
25 20-16-2608. Civil liability – Defenses.

26 (a) A defendant against whom an action is brought under § 20-16-2607
27 may assert an affirmative defense to liability under this section if:

28 (1) The defendant has standing to assert the rights of a woman
29 or a group of women seeking to obtain an abortion under the tests for third-
30 party standing established by the Supreme Court of the United States; and

31 (2) The imposition of civil liability on the defendant will
32 result in an undue burden on that abortion-seeking woman or group of
33 abortion-seeking women.

34 (b) The defendant shall bear the burden of proving the affirmative
35 defense in subsection (a) of this section by a preponderance of the evidence.

36 (c) The affirmative defense under subsection (a) of this section is

1 not available if the United States Supreme Court overrules Roe v. Wade, 410
2 U.S. 113 (1973), or Planned Parenthood v. Casey, 505 U.S. 833 (1992),
3 regardless of whether the conduct on which the cause of action is based under
4 § 20-16-2607 occurred before the United States Supreme Court overruled either
5 of those decisions.

6 (d)(1) This section or subchapter does not in any way limit or
7 preclude a defendant from asserting the defendant's personal constitutional
8 rights as a defense to liability under § 20-16-2607.

9 (2) A court may not award relief under § 20-16-2607 if the
10 conduct for which the defendant has been sued was an exercise of state or
11 federal constitutional rights that personally belong to the defendant.

12 (e) This section or subchapter does not in any way limit or preclude a
13 defendant from asserting the unconstitutionality of any provision of Arkansas
14 law as a defense to liability under this subchapter.

15
16 20-16-2609. Civil liability – Venue.

17 (a) Notwithstanding any other law, a civil action brought under § 20-
18 16-2607 shall be brought in:

19 (1) The county in which all or a substantial part of the events
20 or omissions giving rise to the claim occurred;

21 (2) The county of residence for any one (1) of the natural
22 person defendants at the time the cause of action accrued;

23 (3) The county of the principal office in this state of any one
24 (1) of the defendants that is not a natural person; or

25 (4) The county of residence for the claimant if the claimant is
26 a natural person residing in this state.

27 (b) If a civil action is brought under § 20-16-2607 in any one (1) of
28 the venues described in subsection (a) of this section, the action shall not
29 be transferred to a different venue without the written consent of all
30 parties.

31
32 20-16-2610. Sovereign, governmental, and official immunity preserved –
33 Limits on jurisdiction.

34 (a) Notwithstanding any other law, the state of Arkansas shall have
35 sovereign immunity, each of its political subdivisions shall have
36 governmental immunity, and each officer and employee of this state or a

1 political subdivision shall have official immunity in any action, claim, or
2 counterclaim or any type of legal or equitable action that challenges the
3 validity of any provision or application of this subchapter, on
4 constitutional grounds or otherwise, or that seeks to prevent or enjoin the
5 state of Arkansas, its political subdivisions, or any officer or employee of
6 this state or a political subdivision from enforcing any provision or
7 application of this subchapter, unless that immunity has been abrogated or
8 preempted by federal law in a manner consistent with the Constitution of the
9 United States.

10 (b) Notwithstanding any other law, a provision of state law may not be
11 construed to waive or abrogate an immunity described by subsection (a) of
12 this section unless it expressly waives immunity by specific reference to
13 this section.

14 (c) Notwithstanding any other law, an attorney representing the state,
15 a political subdivision of the state, or any officer or employee of the state
16 or a political subdivision of the state is not authorized or permitted to
17 waive an immunity described in this section or take any action that would
18 result in a waiver of the immunity described in this section.

19 (d) Notwithstanding any other law, a court of this state shall not
20 have jurisdiction to consider any action, claim, or counterclaim that seeks
21 declaratory or injunctive relief to prevent the state, a political
22 subdivision of the state, any officer or employee of the state or a political
23 subdivision of the state, or any person from enforcing any provision or
24 application of this subchapter or from filing a civil action under this
25 subchapter.

26 (e) This section or subchapter shall not be construed to prevent a
27 litigant from asserting the invalidity or unconstitutionality of any
28 provision or application of this subchapter as a defense to any action,
29 claim, or counterclaim brought against the litigant.

30
31 20-16-2611. Award of attorney's fees in actions challenging abortion
32 laws.

33 (a) Notwithstanding any other law, any person, including an entity,
34 attorney, or law firm, that seeks declaratory or injunctive relief to prevent
35 this state, a political subdivision of this state, any governmental entity or
36 public official in this state, or any person in this state from enforcing any

1 statute, ordinance, rule, regulation, or any other type of law that regulates
2 or restricts abortion or that limits taxpayer funding for individuals or
3 entities that perform or promote abortions, in any state or federal court, or
4 that represents any litigant seeking such relief in any state or federal
5 court, is jointly and severally liable to pay the costs and attorney's fees
6 of the prevailing party.

7 (b) For purposes of this section, a party is considered a prevailing
8 party if a state or federal court:

9 (1) Dismisses any claim or cause of action brought against the
10 party that seeks the declaratory or injunctive relief described in subsection
11 (a) of this section, regardless of the reason for the dismissal; or

12 (2) Enters judgment in the party's favor on any such claim or
13 cause of action.

14 (c) Regardless of whether a prevailing party sought to recover costs
15 or attorney's fees in the underlying action, a prevailing party under this
16 section may bring a civil action to recover costs and attorney's fees against
17 a person, including an entity, attorney, or law firm, that sought declaratory
18 or injunctive relief described in subsection (a) of this section not later
19 than three (3) years after the date on which, as applicable:

20 (1) The dismissal or judgment described in subsection (b) of
21 this section becomes final on the conclusion of appellate review; or

22 (2) The time for seeking appellate review expires.

23 (d) It is not a defense to an action brought under subsection (c) of
24 this section that:

25 (1) A prevailing party under this section failed to seek
26 recovery of costs or attorney's fees in the underlying action;

27 (2) The court in the underlying action declined to recognize or
28 enforce the requirements of this section; or

29 (3) The court in the underlying action held that any provisions
30 of this section are invalid, unconstitutional, or preempted by federal law,
31 notwithstanding the doctrines of issue or claim preclusion.

32
33 20-16-2612. Severability.

34 (a) Mindful of *Leavitt v. Jane L.*, 518 U.S. 137 (1996), in which in
35 the context of determining the severability of a state statute regulating
36 abortion the Supreme Court of the United States held that an explicit

1 statement of legislative intent is controlling, it is the intent of the
2 General Assembly that every provision, section, subsection, sentence, clause,
3 phrase, and word of this subchapter, and every application of the provisions
4 of this subchapter, be severable from each other.

5 (b)(1) If any application of any provision of this subchapter to any
6 person, group of persons, or circumstances is found by a court to be invalid,
7 preempted, unconstitutional, or to impose an undue burden on any woman or
8 group of women seeking an abortion, then the remaining applications of that
9 provision to all other persons and circumstances shall be severed and
10 preserved, and shall remain in effect.

11 (2) All constitutionally valid applications of the provisions of
12 this subchapter, and every application of those provisions that can be
13 enforced without imposing an undue burden on women seeking abortions, shall
14 be severed from any applications that a court finds to be invalid, preempted,
15 unconstitutional, or to impose an undue burden on women seeking abortions,
16 and the valid applications shall remain in force, because it is the General
17 Assembly's intent and priority that the valid applications be allowed to
18 stand alone.

19 (3) Even if a reviewing court finds that a provision of this
20 subchapter to impose an undue burden in a large or substantial fraction of
21 relevant cases, the applications that do not present an undue burden shall be
22 severed from the remaining applications and shall remain in force, and shall
23 be treated as if the General Assembly had enacted a statute limited to the
24 persons, groups of persons, or circumstances for which the statute's
25 application does not present an undue burden.

26 (c) The General Assembly further declares that it would have enacted
27 this subchapter, and each provision, section, subsection, sentence, clause,
28 phrase, or word, and all constitutional applications of this subchapter,
29 irrespective of the fact that any provision, section, subsection, sentence,
30 clause, phrase, or word, or applications of this subchapter, were to be
31 declared invalid, preempted, unconstitutional, or to impose an undue burden.

32 (d) If any provision of this subchapter is found by any court to be
33 unconstitutionally vague, then the applications of that provision that do not
34 present constitutional vagueness problems shall be severed and remain in
35 force consistent with the requirements of subsections (a)-(c) of this
36 section.

1 (e)(1) A court may not decline to enforce the severability
2 requirements of subsections (a)-(d) of this section on the grounds that
3 severance would rewrite the statute or involve the court in legislative or
4 lawmaking activity.

5 (2) A court that declines to enforce or enjoins a state official
6 from enforcing a statutory provision does not rewrite a statute, as the
7 statute contains the same words as before the court's decision.

8 (3) A judicial injunction or declaration of unconstitutionality:

9 (A) Is nothing more than an edict prohibiting enforcement
10 that may subsequently be vacated by a later court if that court has a
11 different understanding of the requirements of the Arkansas Constitution or
12 the United States Constitution;

13 (B) Is not a formal amendment of the language in a
14 statute; and

15 (C) No more rewrites a statute than a decision by the
16 Governor not to enforce a duly enacted statute in a limited and defined set
17 of circumstances.

18 (f)(1) If any state or federal court disregards the severability
19 requirements of subsections (a)-(e) of this section, and declares or finds
20 any provision of this subchapter is facially unconstitutional, when there are
21 discrete applications of that provision can be enforced against a person,
22 group of persons, or circumstances without violating federal law, the United
23 States Constitution, or the Arkansas Constitution or imposing an undue burden
24 on women seeking abortions, then that provision shall be interpreted as if
25 the General Assembly had enacted a provision limited to the persons, groups
26 of persons, or circumstances for which the provision's application will not
27 violate federal law, the United States Constitution, or the Arkansas
28 Constitution or impose an undue burden on women seeking abortions.

29 (2) Every court shall adopt this saving construction of that
30 provision until the court ruling that pronounced the provision facially
31 unconstitutional is vacated or overruled.

32
33 SECTION 2. DO NOT CODIFY. Construction.

34 It is the specific intent of this act that the provisions of this act
35 are supplemental to, cumulative to, and in addition to existing laws, civil
36 or criminal, and shall not be construed to amend, repeal, or otherwise affect

1 those existing laws, including without limitation:

2 (1) The Arkansas Human Life Protection Act, § 5-61-301 et seq.;

3 (2) The Arkansas Unborn Child Protection Act, § 5-61-401 et
4 seq.;

5 (3) Section 20-16-603;

6 (4) Section 20-16-604;

7 (5) Section 20-16-701 et seq.;

8 (6) The Unborn Child Pain Awareness and Prevention Act, § 20-16-
9 1101 et seq.;

25 SECTION 3. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the
26 General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that legislation in other states
27 has created a situation in which individuals from other states are entering
28 Arkansas seeking abortions, which is burdening the healthcare system in this
29 state; that the General Assembly previously enacted legislation in the spring
30 to abolish abortions, which has been enjoined; that abortions have increased
31 in this state causing harm to unborn children and the health and safety of
32 pregnant women; and that this act is immediately necessary to protect the
33 lives of unborn children and the health and safety of pregnant women in this
34 state. Therefore, an emergency is declared to exist, and this act being
35 immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health, and
36 safety shall become effective on:

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(1) The date of its approval by the Governor;

(2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor, the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the bill; or

(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto.
