- 31 (2)(A) For the $\frac{2021-2022}{2023-2024}$ school year, the foundation
- 32 funding amount is equal to seven thousand one hundred eighty-two dollars
- 33 (\$7,182) seven thousand six hundred eighteen dollars (\$7,618) multiplied by
- 34 the school district's average daily membership for the previous school year.
- 35 (B) For the $\frac{2022-2023}{2024-2025}$ school year and each
- 36 school year thereafter, the foundation funding amount is equal to seven

1 thousand four hundred thirteen dollars (\$7,413) seven thousand seven hundred 2 seventy-one dollars (\$7,771) multiplied by the school district's average 3 daily membership for the previous school year. 4 5 SECTION 3. Arkansas Code § 6-20-2305(b)(2)(A), concerning per-student 6 categorical funding amounts for alternative learning environments, is amended 7 to read as follows: 8 (2)(A)(i) For the $\frac{2021-2022}{2023-2024}$ school year, alternative 9 learning environment funding shall be four thousand seven hundred ninety-four 10 dollars (\$4,794) four thousand nine hundred eighty-seven (\$4,987) multiplied 11 by the number of identified alternative learning environment students 12 enrolled during the previous school year. 13 (ii) For the $\frac{2022-2023}{2024-2025}$ school year, 14 alternative learning environment funding shall be four thousand eight hundred 15 ninety dollars (\$4,890) five thousand eighty-six dollars (\$5,086) multiplied 16 by the number of identified alternative learning environment students 17 enrolled during the previous school year. 18 (iii) Funding for students in alternative learning 19 environments shall be distributed based on rules promulgated by the State 20 Board of Education. 21 22 SECTION 4. Arkansas Code § 6-20-2305(b)(3), concerning per-student 23 state categorical funding amounts for English-language learners, is amended 24 to read as follows: 25 (3)(A) For the 2021-2022 2023-2024 school year, funding for 26 students who are identified as English-language learners shall be three 27 hundred fifty nine dollars (\$359) three hundred sixty-six (\$366) for each 28 identified English-language learner. (B) Funding for English-language learners shall be 29 30 distributed to public school districts for students who have been identified 31 as not proficient in the English language based upon a state-approved English 32 proficiency assessment instrument. 33 (C) Funds allocated for English-language learners to 34 public school districts under this subchapter shall be expended only for 35 eligible activities as identified in current rules promulgated by the State 36 Board of Education and are a supplement to funding for national school lunch

1 students provided in subdivision (b)(4) of this section. 2 (D) For the $\frac{2022-2023}{2024-2025}$ school year and each 3 school year thereafter, funding for students who are identified as English-4 language learners shall be three hundred sixty-six dollars (\$366) for each 5 identified English-language learner. 6 7 SECTION 5. Arkansas Code § 6-20-2305(b)(4)(A), concerning per-student 8 Enhanced Student Achievement Funding, is amended to read as follows: 9 (4)(A) Enhanced Student Achievement Funding for each identified 10 national school lunch student shall be as follows: 11 (i) For a public school district in which ninety 12 percent (90%) or more of the previous school year's enrolled students are 13 national school lunch students, the amount of per-student Enhanced Student 14 Achievement Funding for the 2021-2022 2023-2024 school year is one thousand 15 five hundred ninety-four dollars (\$1,594) one thousand six hundred thirteen 16 (\$1,613) and for the 2022-2023 2024-2025 school year is one thousand six 17 hundred thirteen dollars (\$1,613); 18 (ii) For a public school district in which at least 19 seventy percent (70%) but less than ninety percent (90%) of the previous 20 school year's enrolled students are national school lunch students, the 21 amount of per-student Enhanced Student Achievement Funding for the 2021-2022 22 2023-2024 school year is one thousand sixty three dollars (\$1,063) one 23 thousand seventy-six dollars (\$1,076) and for the 2022-2023 2024-2025 school 24 year is one thousand seventy-six dollars (\$1,076); and (iii) For a public school district in which less 25 26 than seventy percent (70%) of the previous school year's enrolled students 27 are national school lunch students, the amount of per-student Enhanced Student Achievement Funding for the 2021-2022 2023-2024 school year is five 28 29 hundred thirty two dollars (\$532) five hundred thirty-eight dollars (\$538) and for the $\frac{2022-2023}{2024-2025}$ school year is five hundred thirty-eight 30 31 dollars (\$538). 32 SECTION 6. Arkansas Code § 6-20-2305(b)(5), concerning per-student 33 34 state categorical funding amounts for professional development, is amended to 35 read as follows:

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(5)(A) For each school year, professional development funding

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1 shall be equal to an amount of up to forty dollars and eighty cents (\$40.80) 2 forty-one dollars (\$41.00) multiplied by the school district's previous school year average daily membership. 3 4 (B) Funding for professional development for teachers in 5 Arkansas public schools required under the Teacher Excellence and Support 6 System, § 6-17-2801 et seq., other law or rule, or by the school district 7 shall be used for professional development activities and materials that: 8 Improve the knowledge, skills, and effectiveness (i) 9 of teachers; 10 (ii) Address the knowledge and skills of 11 administrators and paraprofessionals concerning effective instructional 12 strategies, methods, and skills; 13 (iii) Lead to improved student academic achievement; 14 and 15 (iv) Provide training for school bus drivers as 16 outlined in rules promulgated by the Commission for Arkansas Public School 17 Academic Facilities and Transportation. 18 (C)(i) For the 2021-2022 school year, additional funding 19 up to fourteen million five hundred thousand dollars (\$14,500,000) and for 20 the 2022-2023 2023-2024 school year and each school year thereafter, 21 additional funding up to sixteen million five hundred thousand dollars 22 (\$16,500,000), provided for professional development above the amount in 23 subdivision (b)(5)(A) of this section shall be used by the Division of 24 Elementary and Secondary Education for the development and administration of 25 professional learning communities for the benefit of public school districts. 26 (ii)(a) The Division of Elementary and Secondary 27 Education shall promulgate rules to administer the additional professional 28 development funding under subdivision (b)(5)(C)(i) of this section. 29 (b) The Division of Elementary and Secondary 30 Education may partner with or choose a person, firm, corporation, or 31 education service cooperative to provide the knowledge, skills, experience, 32 and expertise for the development of a research-based process for the 33 implementation of professional learning communities.

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SECTION 7. Arkansas Code § 6-20-2305(b)(6)(A), concerning per-student state categorical funding amounts for teacher salary equalization funding, is

2	(6)(A)(i) Beginning with the 2021-2022 school year, for school		
3	districts identified by the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education a		
4	having an average annual teacher salary below the statewide target average		
5	annual salary, teacher salary equalization funding shall be equal to one		
6	hundred eighty-five dollars (\$185) multiplied by the average daily membership		
7	of the school district for the previous school year.		
8	(ii) For the $\frac{2021-2022}{2023-2024}$ and $\frac{2022-2023}{2024}$		
9	$\underline{2025}$ school years, the statewide target average annual salary shall be fifty		
10	one thousand eight hundred twenty-two dollars (\$51,822).		
11	(iii) The House Committee on Education and the		
12	Senate Committee on Education shall set jointly the statewide target average		
13	annual salary for the $\frac{2023-2024}{2025-2026}$ and $\frac{2024-2025}{2026-2027}$ school		
14	years, and each biennium thereafter, as part of the adequacy review process		
15	required under § 10-3-2102.		
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17	SECTION 8. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. It is found and determined by the		
18	General Assembly of the State of Arkansas that funding for public schools is		
19	the obligation of the state; that ensuring that adequate funding is provided		
20	is the duty of the General Assembly; and that this act is immediately		
21	necessary to ensure that funding is provided for the 2023-2024 and 2024-2025		
22	school years so that school districts can budget accordingly. Therefore, an		
23	emergency is declared to exist, and this act being immediately necessary for		
24	the preservation of the public peace, health, and safety shall become		
25	effective on:		
26	(1) The date of its approval by the Governor;		
27	(2) If the bill is neither approved nor vetoed by the Governor,		
28	the expiration of the period of time during which the Governor may veto the		
29	bill; or		
30	(3) If the bill is vetoed by the Governor and the veto is		
31	overridden, the date the last house overrides the veto.		
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
