7	(B) For the second year and each school year thereafter,

9	school shall be used for purposes of calculating the following for the adult

11	(i) The foundation funding amount; and	
12	(ii) The funding amounts for additional education	
13	categories provided under § 6-20-2305(b).	
14	(2) Professional development funding under § 6-20-2305(b)(5)	
15	shall be provided to an adult education charter school as follows:	
16	(A) For the first year of operation and in the first year	
17	in which a new campus is added to an adult education charter school, an adult	
18	education charter school shall receive professional development funding based	
19	on the initial projected enrollment student count as of July 1 of the current	
20	school year multiplied by the per-student professional development funding	
21	amount under § 6-20-2305(b)(5) for that school year; and	
22	(B) For the second year and each school year thereafter,	
23	professional development funding shall be based on the previous year average	
24	daily membership of an adult education charter school multiplied by the per-	
25	student professional development funding amount under § 6-20-2305(b)(5) for	
26	that school year.	
27	(3) The Division of Elementary and Secondary Education shall	
28	distribute funding for additional education categories under § 6-20-2305(a)	
29	and (b) for which an adult education charter school is eligible as provided	
30	under state law and rules.	
31	(4) An adult education charter school shall not be denied	
32	foundation funding or funding for additional education categories in the	
33	first year or any year of operation if the adult education charter school	
34	submits to the Department of Education the number of students eligible for	
35	funding as specified in applicable state board rules.	
36	(c) Foundation funding available to an adult education charter school	

1	under this section shall be paid in twelve (12) installments each liscal	
2	year.	
3	(b)(d) Funding for an adult education charter school may come from	
4	public or private sources, including from the eligible entity that operates	
5	an adult education charter school without limitation the following:	
6	(1) Funding from the eligible entity that operates the adult	
7	education charter school;	
8	(2) State and federal aids, grants, and revenue as may be	
9	provided by state and federal law; and	
10	(3) Gifts and grants from private sources in any manner that is	
11	available to public school districts.	
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
