28	<u>(1) The St</u>	tate Plant Board's mission is to	serve the citizens of			
29	Arkansas and the agricu	altural and business communities	by providing			
30	information and unbiase	ed enforcement of laws and regula	ations;			
31	(2) The bo	oard has a responsibility to pro	mote agriculture while			
32	ensuring farmers and th	ne general public are protected	from harmful intrusions			
33	that cause property dan	mage and economic loss;				
34	(3) The st	cate of Arkansas has a diversity	of crops and natural			
35	environments that need	to be protected;				
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1	(4) Since 2017, the board has received hundreds of complaints				
2	per year regarding Dicamba drift and volatility, causing hundreds of				
3	thousands of dollars in economic losses;				
4	(5) According to the Arkansas Administrative Procedure Act, §				
5	25-15-201 et seq., an agency shall not adopt, amend, or repeal a rule unless				
6	the rule is based on the best reasonably obtainable scientific, technical,				
7	economic, or other evidence and information available;				
8	(6) Independent and academic research has demonstrated a				
9	correlation between ambient temperature and Dicamba volatility;				
10	(7) Scientific research has shown that Dicamba volatility				
11	increases once the ambient temperature reaches eighty-five degrees Fahrenheit				
12	(85°F);				
13	(8) States across the country have incorporated an eighty-five				
14	degrees Fahrenheit (85°F) temperature into their Dicamba rules or cutoff				
15	dates; and				
16	(9) Farmers and the public need certainty and confidence that				
17	board rules are based on science and data.

19	SECTION 2. Arkansas Code Title 2, Chapter 16, Subchapter 2, is amended				
20	to add an additional section to read as follows:				
21	2-16-215. Dicamba cutoff date.				
22	(a) The State Plant Board shall:				
23	(1) Review and consider scientific research on Dicamba drift and				
24	volatility conducted by independent and academic sources, including without				
25	limitation data from and research conducted by weed scientists affiliated				
26	with the Division of Agriculture of the University of Arkansas;				
27	(2) Review, consider, and incorporate data and research relating				
28	to Dicamba volatility and ambient temperature into a new rule on the use of				
29	Dicamba; and				
30	(3) Promulgate a new rule for the in-crop use of Dicamba,				
31	including without limitation a new cutoff date.				
32	(b) The board shall not approve a cutoff date under subdivision (a)(3)				
33	of this section that is earlier than April 1 or later than June 12.

35	SECTION 3. DO NOT CODIFY. Rules.				
36	The State Plant Board shall submit the rule required under this act to
