19	WHEREAS, Brenda Joyce Blagg of Fayetteville, Arkansas, died on December
20	14, 2022, at the age of seventy-five (75), and was a well-known Arkansas
21	journalist and defender of the Freedom of Information Act of 1967; and

23	WHEREAS, Ms. Blagg, was born, May 3, 1947, and as a native of Newport,
24	Arkansas, came to the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville to study
25	journalism and rose to the editorship of the Arkansas Traveler, the campus
26	newspaper; and

28	WHEREAS, Ms. Blagg, upon graduation, joined the Springdale News and
29	began a lengthy career as a journalist; and
30	
31	WHEREAS, in 1979, Ms. Blagg began a political column, "Between The
32	Lines," which ran until her health declined in October 2022 and this column
33	was one of the longest, continuous weekly columns in the state's modern
34	history; and

36	WHEREAS, Ms. Blagg was also a frequent guest journalist on the Arkansas

Educational Television Network's "Arkansas Week", for decades; and WHEREAS, Ms. Blagg took a great interest in the Northwest Arkansas Chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists and its subsequent scholarship fundraiser variety show, "Gridiron", a yearly theatrical production spoofing the past year's political leaders, events, and general politics of the state; and WHEREAS, Ms. Blagg played a well-known Ozark hill woman, Letitia Mae Stufflebeam, in these standup comedy sketches spoofing the political themes of the day, which are still playing on YouTube channels today; and WHEREAS, Ms. Blagg was also known as a quiet and serious soul, attending to the public needs of the state and region and she is credited by many for inspiring others, especially young women to pursue careers in journalism and to uphold the Freedom of Information Act of 1967, NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ARKANSAS: THAT the House of Representatives remember Brenda Joyce Blagg and honor her life and contributions to the State of Arkansas. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT upon adoption, a copy of this resolution be provided to Ms. Blagg's family by the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives.
