
Result of States' Education Lawsuits


- Public education recognized as a state responsibility



 - Schools organized productively for student and teacher learning, providing time and opportunities for collaborative planning, and collective improvement activities



State Revenues for Education

- Public School Fund Account (PSF)
- Educational Excellence Trust Fund (EETF)
- Educational Adequacy Fund (AEF)
 - A 7/8 cent sales tax increase
 - The expansion of sales taxes to some services
 - An increase in vending machine decal fees
 - An increased minimum corporate franchise tax and tax rate, and
 - A portion of the six-cent per gallon dyed diesel tax.







AR Schools by October 1 Enrollment, 2023





Special Education High- Cost Occurrences	Help with high costs often associated with special education students with more severe diagnoses	\$14 million

The previous table indicates that about

- \$193 million of LEARNS Act money will flow through schools to benefit teachers each year
- \$8.5 million will flow to providers to benefit students
- Up to \$20 million will flow through schools to benefit students
- \$13.1 million will flow to **higher education** to support teacher preparation participants or recent completers.
